Muleshoe High School Coach Scott Murray said the high school gym will be open to the public from 7-10 p.m. effective July 2. The gym will be available for basketball and work-out on the exercise equipment.

Coach Murray said the gym will be open Monday-Tuesday, Thursday and Friday until July 29.

City Secretary Mary Hicks said the city will be sprayed for mosquitos early Monday, July 2, weather permitting. If the weather does not permit spraying, it will be conducted the first morning during the week that weather permits.

She said City Manager Dave Marr determined that due to recent rains, the mosquitos are beginning to become a problem.

Muleshoe City Librarian Anne Camp said the Muleshoe Public Library will be closed on Wednesday, July 4 for Independence Day.

They will resume normal operations on Thursday, July 5.

Bailey County Farm Bureau Board of Directors will meet on Thursday, July 5 at 8:30 p.m. in the Farm Bureau meeting room.

Everything is all set for the huge Independence Day Celebration in Muleshoe on Wednesday, July 4th. Many local businesses will be closed to allow their employees to join in the fun on that day.

Two added attractions this year are expected to brighten the eyes of the youngest to the oldest when they watch the 5 p.m. parade.

Featured in the parade will be the masked Red Raider from Texas Tech at Lubbock, and Yosemite Sam, also from Texas Tech.

The well-known characters appear at football games, athletic events, parades, rodeos and elementary schools, as well as some civic activities.

The 1984-85 Texas Tech University Red Raider, Zurick Labrier of Dalhard, grew up on the back of a horse.

"I actually can't remember the first time I rode a horse, that's probably because my dad sat me on the saddle in front of him before I was old enough to ride a horse by myself," Labrier said.

Labrier first saw the Red Raider mascot at Texas Tech's Jones Stadium when he was a senior at Dalhart High School. He decided at that time he wanted to be a part of Texas Tech sports.

"One of my goals when I came to Tech was to try out for the Red Raider," he said.

"Tech has a lot of pride and tradition in the Red Raider and, because of my background with horses, that encouraged me to try out I felt I had something to offer," the animal production junior said.

But being the Red Raider isn't all glamour and glory. The horse, Happy VI-II, must be worked out two or three times a week and groomed.

Labrier, 21, estimated that it takes about two hours to wash and dry Happy VI-II. It's a 40 minute drive out to the stable and back, then another half hour to get himself ready.

With the masking of the 1984-85 Red Raider, Labrier carries on a tradition that is 30 years old. In 1954 the underdog Red Raiders were boosted at the Gator Bowl against Auburn by their flashy mascot.

Dressed in a black hat, red shirt, black cape and jeans, Texas Tech student Joe Kirk Fulton and his borrowed

Educational Team At 3-Day Seminar

An educational team from Muleshoe I.S.D. attended a three-day conference June 24-27 at the Holiday Inn Civic Center, Lubbock. This conference was sponsored by Texas Tech University and focused on school improvement. Team members from Muleshoe were H. John Fuller, superintendent; Julie Cage, board member; Elizabeth Watson, assistant superintendent; Wayland Ethridge, high school principal; Norma Prather, kindergarten teacher; Chera Foster and Jane Hunnicut, third and fourth grade teachers.

Two representatives from Johnson City, N.Y., reviewed the Mastery Learning Program to which they are committed. Superintendents from Ralls and McAllen related their experiences with the Program for Excellence.

Dr. John R. Champlin, associate professor from Texas Tech University, was the chairman of the conference. He defines the philosophy of mastery learning in this way... "Mastery Learning assumes that virtually all students can learn, and that learning can be improved greatly, providing favorable learning conditions are present."

Dr. Yvonne Katz, associate commissioner from Texas Education Agency, gave the keynote address at the dinner re-eting. Dr. Katz presented the critical issues contained in the new educational H.B. or Chapter 75, which was recently passed by the Texas Legislature.

On Tuesday, June 26, Dr. William Spady, executive director of Far West Ed. Lab, San Francisco, gave a "Comprehensive Approach to Overall School Excellence."

Approximately 150 superintendents, board members, central office personnel, principals, and teachers attended this conference and exchanged ideas, defined common problems, and discussed critical issues in small and large group meetings.

Summer Computer Camp

High school students may gain knowledge and experience with computers during The West Texas State University Summer Computer Camp July 8-13.

The camp is sponsored by the WTSU School of Business and will be directed by Dr. Philip Gensler, professor of computer information systems, and Jerry Harber, assistant professor of CIS.

The camp is open to students who have completed the eighth grade through students who have recently graduated from high school and who have not enrolled in any college level courses. Prior computer knowledge is not a requirement. Instruction will be available on beginner and advanced levels.

Campers will check in from 1 p.m. to 5 p.m. on Sunday, July 8. During the five-day camp, they will live in WTSU residence halls and eat at the East Dining Hall. Recreational activities also will be available.

The students will work in the School of Business computer laboratory at the Classroom Center with 30 IBM personal computers. A variety of other brands of microcomputers will be available for students during time outside classroom instruction.

Students in the beginning level will be introduced to computer terminology, the components of a computer and the fundamental concepts of programming using the BASIC language. They also will learn the care and use of floppy disks and the use of other software including games.

At the advanced level, students will study advanced programming techniques including file maintenance, graphics, advanced BASIC language and additional languages.

Cost of the camp is \$295 which includes room, meals, in-

struction, supplies, computer use, special projects and a camp T-shirt.

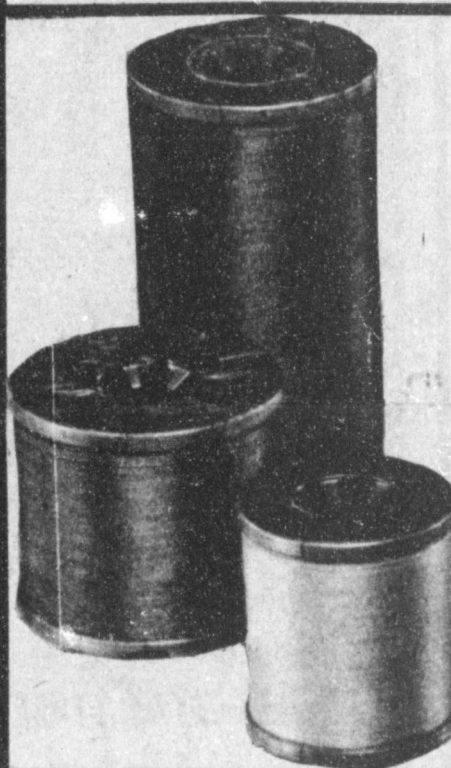
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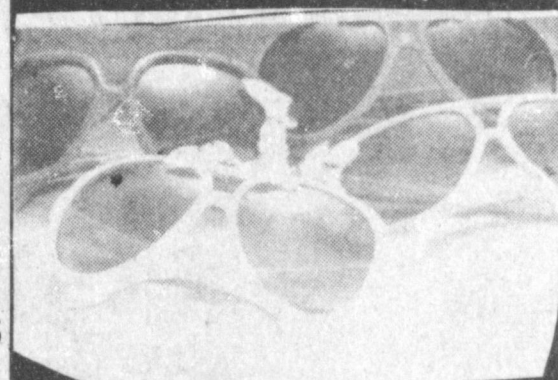

Texas Assessment Of Basic Skills Results

Results of the fifth annual Texas Assessment of Basic Skills tests for the Sudan I.S.D. were reported at the board of trustees meeting last Monday by Kenneth Noles, district superintendent.

In 1979 the 66th Legislature set a goal for 85 percent of graduating seniors to pass the math and reading minimum competency by 1983 and the writing minimum competency by 1985. According to the results of the ninth graders tested, 92 percent of 39 students passed the minimum competency standard in math; 84 percent of 38 students passed the minimum competency standard in reading; and 59 percent of 37 students passed the minimum competency standard in writing.

Also taking the test during February were third and fifth graders, as well as those in the 10th, 11th, and 12th grades who had failed to pass or did not take the test previously.

Elementary students were not assigned a total average like the ninth graders, but the 25 third graders tested scored above the 85 percent mark in seven of 10 areas of math, seven of eight areas in reading, and four of five areas in writing. The 27 fifth graders tested scored above the 85 percent mark in 11 of 12 areas of math, eight of 11 areas of reading and five of six areas in writing.

Instituted in 1979, the TABS test is given in Texas public schools to test students' mastery of certain skills. Texas law does not require successful completion of the TABS test of high school graduation, but 10th, 11th, and 12th graders must take the test until they show mastery.

Results in the Sudan ISD since 1979 have showed a continuing improvement in most areas. One of the major concerns in the future will be "written composition."

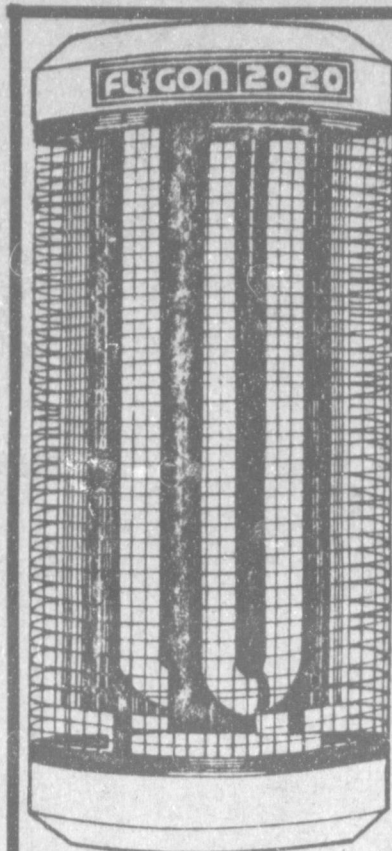

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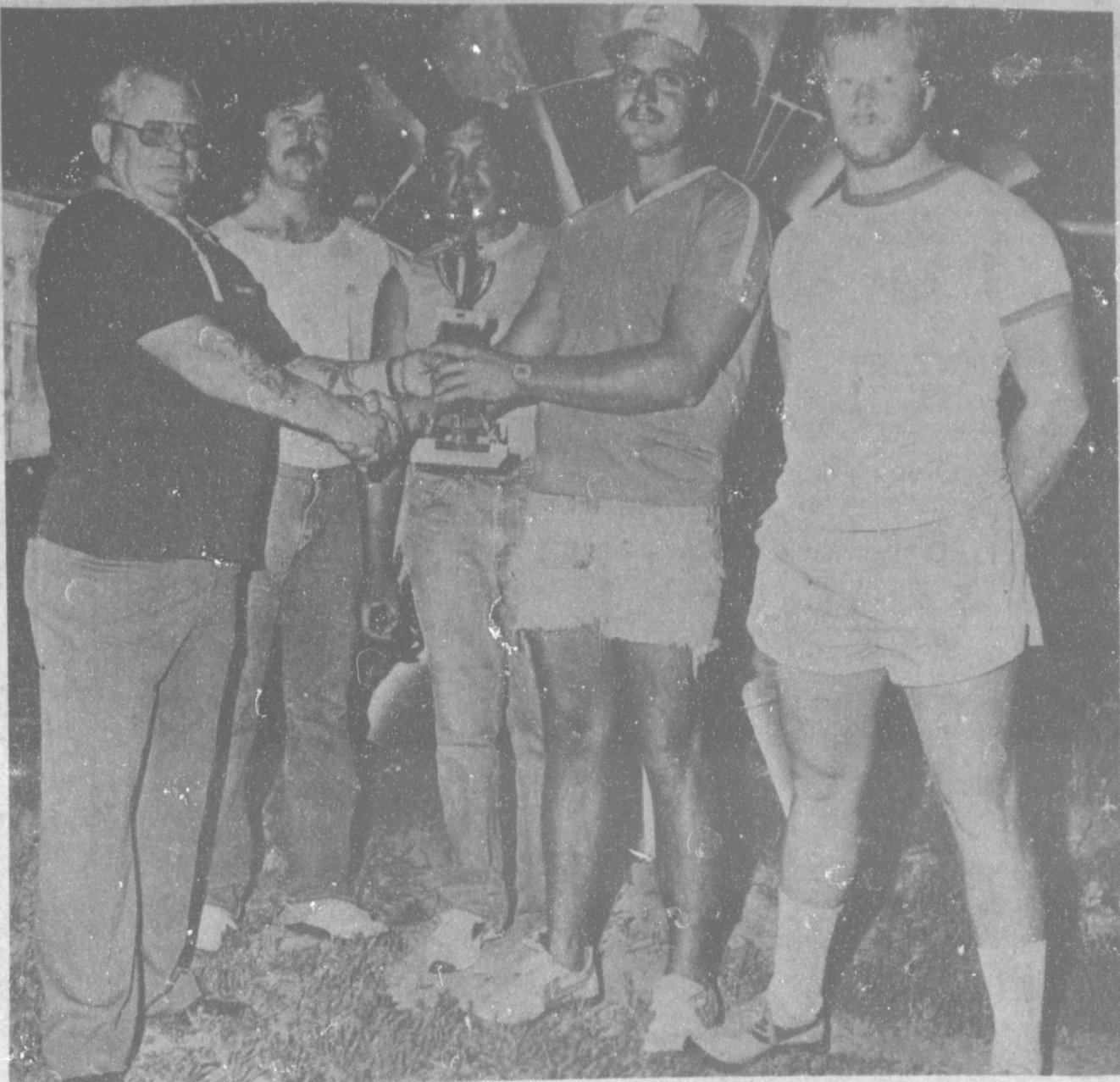

our new SIX-COLUMN FORMAT STARTING WITH THIS ISSUE

Why the switch to six?

For years, manufacturers and their advertising agencies, suppliers and retailers have been in a quandary when trying to design advertisements to appear in newspapers across the country.

Why? Because there was no standard size. If Ford or RCA, say, wanted to advertise a product to American newspaper readers, they had to design the ad and artwork so it would fit a multitude of different column and page widths - more than 400 different measurements among daily newspapers alone.

"Something's got to be done," the advertising agencies

told the newspaper industry.

"You're right - let's do it," the newspapers answered.

So, two years ago, representatives of the major newspaper and advertising agency associations started working on a new format that could become standard throughout the country. They wanted a format that would (1) make it possible to design ads in standard widths that would fit all newspapers; (2) provide for more individuality for every advertisement and story on a newspaper page; (3) present an easy-to-read column width for news, with less hyphenation and a less "crowd-

ed" look; and (4) provide more attractive product to the reader.

Their solution: a six-column newspaper page, with each column slightly over two inches in width.

They also designed a timetable for adopting the new standard format, so there wouldn't be panic when the time came. As a result, nearly all the artwork and advertisements provided to retailers by their suppliers during the past year have been sized to fit the new six-column format.

The national changeover date for newspapers is July 1. (Many dailies, such as the

Amarillo Daily News and the Lubbock Avalanche-Journal, are already using the new format on their main news pages.)

Changing from eight to six columns per page means the Journal will have to convert its advertising rates. Display advertising is sold by the "column inch" (columns of width times inches of depth.)

The price of a quarter-page, half-page or full-page ad will be about the same as before.

We think it will make the newspaper easier to read, and give the advertiser better display.

We hope you will like it, too.
