Six blocks of paving are under construction in Ballinger this week, one other is ready to be started and money has been paid in on six blocks on Tenth Street.







METEORITES SAID WORTH

ONLY ONE DOLLAR POUND

Keller, professor of applied mathematics and astronomy at the University of Texas, recently said that he frequently receives letters from Texans asking how much they can get for meteorites they have found. He said the price is one dollar a pound for metal meteorites and but little more for rock meteorites. Typical of the ideas about the values of these astronomical bodies was a recent letter from a man who believed they sold for \$720 an ounce. He explained that the chief use of meteorites is in scientific exhibits in museums.

"One of the chief deposits of meteorite fragments in the world is located about 160 miles from the McDonald Observatory near Odessa, Texas," Dr. Keller said. "There are but few meteor craters in the world, and the one in Texas is comparatively large, being about six hundred feet in diameter.'

The South Plains region in Hale and adjacent counties is also a fertile field for surface meteorite fragments and many fine speciments have been found




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

COLLEGE STATION, Nov. 30.-Details of the 1939 AAA program have been worked out and are ready for presentation to farmers. The 1939 program was formally approved on November 15 by Secretary Wallace, workers of increased. the state AAA office at Texas A. & M. College have announced.

"The program follows closely that of 1938, with some simplification," George Slaughter, of Wharton, chairman of the Texas Mr. and Mrs. M. B. Community meetings to explain the program are to be held within the next month or two so farmers may know the details well ahead of planting time. In past years farmers often knew little about the program until after their crops were up, the chairman pointed out. For instance, 1938 cotton acreage allotments could not be calculated until after April 7 because of amendments to the new farm act.

The state office has calculated and released individual cotton acreage allotments for more than one-fourth of the Texas cotton counties, and expect to have all farm cotton allotments in the hands of farmers prior to December 10 cotton marketing quotas referendum, Slaughter said.

Goals for cotton, corn, rice and general crops are about the same as in 1938, but the national acreage goal is 5 million acres below this year's, due to the reduction in the wheat allotment.

First Generator

The first generator developed for aboratory work was built by Michael Faraday in 1831. The first motor was built in 1870 by Zenobe Theophile Gramme and was obviously for laboratory work. For the Vienna fair in 1873 a generator was built to be driven by a steam engine. Due to an error in the field construction, the generator ran faster than the engine and the first "commercial" motor resulted. The first central station generator was built by Edison in 1882, consisting of a 2,000horsepower dynamo for the Pearl street station in New York city.


