

MISTRIAL DECLARED IN MILLIRON CASE; JURY IS DISMISSED





When chicken is served, usually on Sunday, about 1,400 pounds is required. For Thanksgiving dinner the cadets ate around 2,000 pounds of turkey. Milk consumed amounts to about 6,000 half pint bottles a day, Milk, ice cream and butter used by the mess hall comes from the A. & M. College

creamery. The A. & M. College mess hall is the largest single unit dining hall in the world. Although only about 2,900 eat in the mess hall and butter, three and one-half at the present time, 5,000 could be accommodated if the occasion demanded it. 


