

To obtain the most value from ats in livestock rations, it is important to supplement them with protein-rich cottonseed meal and other feeds containing nutrients which are lacking in ats. They are the safest grain for work stock and young animals, and most useful in starting cattle

Oats are used efficiently in the ollowing well-balanced rations for Dairy Cattle

Were of Warlike Nature Although Finland was conquered and Norway defeated in the Middle ages to make Sweden a mighty kingdom of the North, it was not until the reigns of the Vasa kings Through the efforts of Gustavus Adolphus and his immediate predecessor and successors, territories Baltic states, Germany, and Poland Witter. were added to Sweden. Swedish armies pushed far into Russia, occupied all of Poland, and marched and countermarched over Germany.



Facsimile Newspapers Transmitted by Radio



The world's first regular broadcast of specially prepared facsimile newspapers was inaugur ted in S Louis recently by the St. Louis Post-Dispatch. Latest news events were recorded on 15 receiving sets placed in the homes of members of the station's staff. The original copy of the facsimile newspaper was placed one page at a time on the cylinder of the sending apparatus, and was transmitted by radio waves to receiving sets similar to the one on the right, where the owners read the transmitted newspaper in their own homes.






