

It is said that they are considered unlucky because they are often confused with dollar bills. A banker believes the supersticounterfeiters often split the dollar bills in order to make two twenty-dollar bills out of one twenty and a two. It is also said that two dollars was usually the price formerly paid for a vote by corrupt politicians and that it was paid with a two-dollar bill. The possession of such a bill after election was facetiously said to be prima facie evidence that one had sold his vote. Gamblers especially regard the two-dollar bill as unlucky.

Sturgeon Lives Longest

The more leisurely a fish is, the longer he lives. Most sluggish of Michigan fishes is the sturgeon, known to live as long as 63 years, and believed often to live 100 years. The female sturgeon does not spawn until she is 20 to 25 years old, relates a writer in the Detroit Free Press. Brook trout often do not live more than four years, although records show them to live a decade. Rainbow and brown trout are believed to live somewhat longer than lived fish, with records showing only six years. Lake trout may live to be 20 years or more. Large-mouth bass have about a 17-year life span. Small-mouth bass generally do not live as long as the large-mouth species. Pike are believed to average slightly less than small-mouth bass. Rock bass are recorded at 13 years, bluegills at 11 and perch at 8 years. The age of fish is recorded by marks



Super Speed Pictures Show Bullet in Flight



Extremely rapid photographs, taken at one-millionth of a second, were demonstrated recently by Dr. F. W. Godwin of the Armour Institute of Technology. The process of photographing a bullet in flight (inset) as it breaks through a pane of glass was accomplished by shooting the bullet so that it passes just below two poles of a spark gap; the gases from the firing of the bullet trail the missile, thus setting off the spark gap, which in turn causes a discharge of 38,000 volts in a partial vacuum, for the necessary illumination. An ordinary miniature camera was used in the experiment.

METHODS OF TREATING TREE WOUNDS IS GIVEN

COLLEGE STATION, Fe.b 8. The importance of using sanitary precautions and adequate wound protection in tree surgery is beoming increasingly evident according to W. H. Friend, of the Texas A. & M. agricultural experiment station, Weslaco. The neglect of pruning wounds or the usc f wound protectants of questonable value may result in rot-ting of the wood, parasitic fungi sues of the trees. The most gen erally used wood protectants previously used were lead-zinc paint and pine tar. Of these two, pine tar was the most satisfactory and this material, with certain reservations, can still be considered a reliable protectant.

Dark colored wound protectants are not entirely satisfactory where the wound is fully exposed to the sun's rays. While in quest of a cheap and effective light reflecting wound dressing, a cheap white enamel was compounded that appears to behighly satisfactory or use during the domant season when sap pressure is at a low ebb. During the summer season there appears to be no way avoid the two coat method of wound protection, if blistering and umming are to be entirely pre-

Why Ocean is Salty is

One of Oldest Problems Theories attempting to account for the presence of sait in sea water are rather speculative and governed largely by the particular hypothesis advanced for the origin of the globe itself, notes a writer in the Indian-apolis News. A few geologists are of the opinion that most of the salt went into the primeval ocean practically at its formation. It is more commonly assumed by geologists, however, that such salt is derived from the decomposition of rocks by flowing and percolating waters which finally deposit their burden in the sea. This is certainly the source of a large part of the salt in the ocean.

The sea is constantly receiving salt-laden water and at the same time losing water by evaporation. Since little, of any, of this salt rises in the vapor, the salinity of the ocean is gradually, though imperceptibly, increasing. It is not probable that the increase would be appreciable within any historic pe-riod. Many inland lakes are salty for the same reason. The streams flowing into them pass through soil and rocks which contain salt.

There is no salt in fresh water lakes because the streams flowing into them pass through regions containing little or no salt.

Romans Had Names for Dogs

The Romans had names for dogs, too, and their names were not so very different from our names. Their groups were canes villatici (house dogs), canes pastorales pecuraii (shepherds), canes venatici (sporting dogs), pugnaces or belli-cosi (fighting or war dogs), nares sagaces (dogs which hunt by scent) and pedipus celeres (swift dogs which run by sight). Our groups are sporting dogs, which includes all the bird dogs; hounds, which includes hounds which run by scent and those which run by sight; working dogs, which includes the shepherds and some of the ancient war dogs; ter-riers, a new division since Roman days; toys, which includes the miniatures that were doubtlessly classiand the non-sporting group, which includes everything else, some of which probably were house dogs, some probably not yet bred and some, while extant in some form or other, unknown to the Romans.

Navigators and steamships may have dispelled the idea of a ship graveyard in the Sargasso sea, but the Namib desert in southwest Africa, known to seamen as the "Coast of Dead Ships," remains a very real thing to send shudders down the spines of modern mariners. Columbus Was Searching

When Columbus discovered America he was making a voyage in search of spices. In fact, much if the early exploration of the world was based on the hunger for the fragrant spices of the Tropics. according to a writer in the Prairie Farmer.

In 1937 the United States spent more than 12 million dollars for imported spices. Chief among the various spice imports amounting to nearly 40 per cent of the total were various kinds of pepper. Second in importance was mustard. Cinnamon and its near relative, cassia, from Ceylon, China and the Indies; ginger, mostly dried roots from Jamaica and West Africa; nutmeg and its wrapper, mace, from the East and West Indies; cloves from Madagascame in in surprising quantities.

volved in the preparation and harvesting of these spices. The inner bark of the cinnamon or cassia must be cut from two-year-old trees if the spice is to be of the best qualcut from each nutmeg by hand. 


