





For over sixty years the economic and social structure of this state has been dependent upon cotton, Dean Kyle declared. In all the history of this country there has never been any one industry as important to the entire economic and social structures of the state as cotton has been to Texas. Give Texas a big cotton crop with good prices, and everyone is prosperous and contented-from the bootblack on the street to the merchant and banker in their places of business.

Here are some of the reasons why cotton is important to Texas: 1. There are 1,775,000 people living on cotton farms in Texas. These constitute 70% of all our agricultural people, including those

living on stock farms and ranches. 2. Our cotton farmers have been receiving over 61% of the cash income from all agricultural products, including livestock. 3. In 1923 the cash income to

our farmers from cotton was \$748,605,000. 4. For a ten year consecutive

period, 1922 to 1931, the annual cash income to our farmers from cotton averaged \$438,000,000.

Practically all of this money was spent in Texas. It went into and vitalized practically every avenue and channel of business. It touched and favorably influenced practically every citizen.







Dr. Joseph Tiso, left, premier of the new "independent" nation of Slovakia, whose demand for Slovakian autonomy in defiance of Dr. Emil Hacha, right, president of the Czechoslovakian republic, precipitated the 20-year-old democracy's destruction. Supported by Reichsfuehrer Adolf Hitler of Germany, Dr. Tiso established an independent Slovakia. Meanwhile the easternmost Czech province, Ruthenia (Carpatho-Ukraine) was overrun by Hungarian, Rumanian and Polish soldiers, each seeking their share of spoils. 




