AUSTIN, June 7.-State-guarded mental patients, delinquents and criminals exceed the number of high school graduates who enroll as freshmen in Texas colleges each year, Dr. H. T. Manuel, University of Texas educator, said recently. ,

Dr. Manuel has completed the ninth of a series of investigations covering the whole pupil field, for the Texas commission coordination in education. This study surveys "Youth of College Age in Texas.

Dr. Manuel cites 74 white boys, 44 white girls, 22 colored boys, and 18 colored girls 16 to 20 years of age in Texas state hospitals on February 20, 1939.

Texas' two training schools for delinquent boys and girls had among their "enrollees" February, 15, 1939, a total of 258 white boys and 134 negroes 16 to 19 years of age.

The girls' training school, with 242 "pupils" on August 31, 1938, had a waiting list of girls being held in jail awaiting their turn for admission

Among the inmates of the Texas prison system as of December 31, 1938, 826 were youths 17 to 19, and 1,900 were 20 to 24 years of age.

"There are, then, in our state correctional institutions 8,000 individuals, half of whom are not more than 25 years of age," he declared.

"The problem of crime is primarily a problem of youth. In fact in its beginning much of the difficulty goes back to maladjustments of children at home and in school.
