School to Operate Lunch **Room for Undernourished**

The Ballinger schools will begin a lunch room service this week- Many Crippled end for undernourished students. Supt. Nat Williams recently made investigations of lunch rooms in operation in a number of cities and completed arrangements this week to begin feeding about fifty children

The lunch room will be in the primary building No. 2. Mrs. E. B. Clampitt has been emplayed as begin with two WPA assistants in the preparation of the meals. A large part of the food will come sponsor to make up balanced meals.

Supt. Williams also announced Clampitt will also be supervisor of this project.

Funds with which to sponsor the lunch room will be from donations made for this purpose. It is estimated that about \$12 weekly will be required for feeding 50 children and in case the number of pupils served increases the need of money will increase. A number of local business men have indicated their willingness to cooperate in the project and no trouble is anticipated from lack of funds. A canvass will be made soon to obtain the necessary amount for the remainder of the term

Teachers in all the schools have reported that a number of pupils need hot lunches. Some have very little in their noon lunch baskets and it is impossible for them to do good school work on what they eat. These projects are now in operation in many schools of this section and are The cost to proving successful. the sponsors is so little that no trouble has been encountered in obtaining the finances.

COLLEGE STATION, Jan. 17 .-While Texas' pecan crop is estimated to be considerably below par this year due to drouth and insect damage, United States department of agriculture officials are setting the probable yield at around 17.000,000 pounds.

Despite the fact that the Texas nut crop will be under par, it still is a good idea to know how to store nuts properly, according to Grace I. Neely, specialist in food preservation for the A. & M. College extension service. Chief difficulty in keeping pecans fresh and crisp is the fat content which may become rancid and ruin the nuts for subsequent use.

Storing nuts in airtight conainers and keeping them in a cool dry place away from the light
