





600 TEXAS 4-H CLUB BOYS JOIN DAIRY MOVEMENT

COLLEGE STATION, Feb. 21. The ranks of Texas dairymen were increased by 600 4-H club boys during 1939 as these took up dairy demonstrations. This brings the total of club boys engaged in dairy calf work up to 1,817.

Of the 1,698 heifers, club boys bought during the year 1,142 will be used to furnish milk for home use. The remaining 221 will be used as the foundation for commercial herds.






