

"I urge all citizens of this municipality and of Texas to observe 'Texas Week' in an appropriate manner. No one of us will fail to cherish the rich heritage which our founders and forefathers prepared for us of this generation.

"During this week let us make much of the spiritual values of our history and of our traditions. Let us dedicate our lives afresh Sunday: to ideals of statesmanship, character, leadership, and service. Let us make it possible, as did our forebears, for our own and for future generations to enjoy liberty of conscience, of speech, of the press, of worship, of public assembly, and all the other liberties which we cherish.
