on "Dental Infections and the Industrial Worker" in the Journal of the American Dental Association, says, "Rheumatism covers a wide variety of ailments, the most common of which are arthritis, myositis, (inflammation of a voluntary muscle) lumbago and neuritis . . . Dental infection has long been recognized as a predisposing cause of many of these ailments, and the removal of mouth infection has been advised or insisted upon by most medical men. There are, however, other predisposing causes of rheumatism, many and varied, such as improper diet and climatic, chemical, mechanical and endrocrine conditions." B. I. Comroe, M.
