





The war department has asked recruiting stations to enlist 90,000 in the women's army auxiliary corps by July 1, but reports indicate that enlistments are coming in slowly and the goal may not be attained.

Colonel Claude K. Rhinehart, of the North Texas recruiting area, is asking all sub-stations to devote all the time possible to enlisting women and girls in this branch of the army to meet a great need. Speaking of the importance of

this drive, Col. Rhinehart stated that jobs for the 90,000 already exist and that the program must not fall short. The attention of eligible women

is being called to the training given WAACs and the fact that when the war is over it will qualify them for better jobs in civilian life. Only a small part of Runnels


