



XTENSION CHIEF SAYS DAIRYMEN SHOULD KEEP PRODUCTION RECORDS

COLLEGE STATION, Sept. 1 The critical protein feed situation s a compelling reason why dairynen should keep production ompson, dairyman for the A. & M. College extension service.

Records point accurately to inprofitable cows and are a safe guide in culling inefficient producers from the herd. Records, too. are necessary in feeding cows according to their production, Thompson says. In order to make he most efficient use of the feed available individual cows must be ed according to the milk they give. To do this accurately the milk produced and the feed consumed by each cow in the herd must be weighed and systematic records kept.

Production records also are essential if the dairyman expects to follow a constructive breeding and herd improvement program, Thompson explains. This applies whether he has grade or purebred animals. Furthermore, records are imperative to a breeder of registered dairy cattle because he sells breeding stock on the basis of established production or, in most cases, upon the production records of their ancestors.

Manpower shortage is making it difficult for some herd improvement associations to retain the services of testers having the qualifications required before the war. However, a group of dairymen in the Nacogdoches territory solved this difficulty by employing a vocational agriculture teacher for enough days monthly to test their herds.

In some cases older members of boys' 4-H clubs, or F. F. A. boys, may be qualified as testers and can be employed on part time, the dairyman suggests. In some northern states women have been employed as full time cow testers and are doing a satisfactory job. Thompson recommends that dairymen who cannot become members of dairy herd improvement associations should weigh the milk and feed of each cow in their herds at least once weekly in order to be able to feed according to production and to cull



Bamboo Has Varied Uses in Pacific Isles, U. S. Soldiers Learn

WASHINGTON, September 1. Boiled bamboo, army style, is likely to become a familiar dish to American soldiers on their own in the Pacific lands, if the war department's manual on emergency food plants guides their transplanted tastes. Boiling down the official language, the edible young shoots can be spotted near the base of older stalks, and must be rid of their hairy sheaths and cooked-cut up for boiling, left whole for roasting. Result, an asparagus-like delicacy.

Youngsters now pushing through the jungles of Polynesia and Malaysia know bamboo as one of the savory ingredients of chop suey. At home it also means fishing poles, canes and phonograph needles. But bamboo is many things to many men, says the National Geographic Society-it is one of the world's most serviceable grasses, a fiber of all work in its native tropical climes.

Deep into the soil the plant thrusts its roots, which make a strong underground network. From them emerge stalks which may soar 120 feet and measure more than a foot in diameter. Growth is rapid. Bomboos grow in clumps like many smaller grasses. The tallest stalks may be bare of leaves for seventy-five feet. At maturity some species are so tough that knives and "whetstones" are fashioned from the hard outer coats.

Old as the bamboo is in the service of man, a complete compilation of its uses is still unfinished business. There is a story that a missionary listed 440 uses and then withheld his work because he felt sure he would come across others.

Oriental builders and artisans ook upon bamboo as one of their basic natural resources. Split stalks are worked into floors, walls and roofs of houses. Bamboo scaffolding is a familiar sight in the Far East. Stalks are ready-made water

A house can be completely furnished and outfitted, as well as built, in the bomboo mannerwith chairs, tables, beds, baskets, ladders, curtain rods, bird cages flower stands, mats, tools and tea-

pots of this all-purpose fiber. Much Oriental transportation relies on bamboo for its vehicles Junks and sampans are upper works. Sailboats with bamboo masts are commonplace. Split stems do for rope. Jinrikishas and edan chairs of bamboo are seen throughout the East. Cart and wheelbarrow bodies are also made of this treelike grass.
