



he traded Remember this, however, regulations are complicated and not generally understood and an apparent violation may not be wrong, either legally or morally. For example, there is a ceiling price on cottonseed meal at mill points. But if a mill ships in meal from another point-for example, if a mill in North Texas ships meal from a South Texas pointthe mill can and should add the actual shipping cost as all business firms have always done Therefore, the selling price of this meal will be above the price of locally-produced meal. There is no violation of the ceiling price Other examples could be cited and they make it highly important that everyone establish the facts in the case instead of merely repeating rumors. Cotton oil mills will gladly assist you in obtaining facts and understanding the regu-

We have recently taken the following steps to help clarify this situation:

1. Two weeks ago, President T. A. Hugston, of the National Cottonseed Products Association, and I discussed with OPA officials the importance of making certain that everyone understands and observes the price ceilings and regulations governing cottonseed and cottonseed products. We urged strict compliance with, and enforcement of, these regulations.


