

BOROUGH SAYS SHELLED POCANS WILL KEEP WELL IF EIGHT METHODS FOLLOWED

COLLEGE STATION, Oct. 20 .-Pecans to keep at their best for a long period should be stored soon after harvesting. According to J. . Rosborough, horticulturist for the A. & M. College extension service, the initial step in faulty storage is taken when pecan meats are allowed to become partly rancid before being put into storage.

To avoid this, shell and seal the kernels in air-tight containers and store at about 32 degrees Fahrenhert The moisture content of kernels in storage should be below 3.75 per cent. They will keep in good marketable condition for at least one year and apparently do not become rancid upon removal from storage any quicker than fresh pecans.

Supporting this, Rosborough cites a test by Prof. F. R. Brison, of the A. & M. College department of horticulture, in storing shelled pecans. After seven months those stored in tin cans and cellophane at room temperature were unmistakably rancid. But at 32 degrees nuts in the cans were of excellent quality and "superior to many of the fresh pecans on the market." Furthermore, pecans left in temperature ranging from 65 to 90 for two months after the cans were removed from cold storage were found in excellent condition when opened. On the other hand those stored in cellophane at 32 degrees came out in poor condition due, conceivably, to high humidity.

A temperature at which no rancidity will develop hasn't been recorded, the horticulturist says. But it is known that at 32 degrees the rate at which shelled pecans become rancid is very slow. Upon removal from storage fatty acid formation proceeds, and when this supplements those formed previously the kernels quickly become rancid. Possibly this accounts for a prevailing idea that pecans . . became rancid soon after being .



### EXTENSION SPECIALIST TELLS HOW TO PREPARE DEHYDRATED FOODS

COLLEGE STATION, Oct. 20 .-Many Texas rural families dried and have had little experience in the preparation of dehydrated fruits and vegetables.

While they will not equal in flavor, texture, or appearance the quality of cooked fresh vegetables, they are quite satisfactory if properly prepared and seasoned The yield of prepared dried products varies, but usually one cup of dried vegetables will serve from four to six people, according to Hazel Phipps, specialist in food preparation for the A. & M. College extension service.


