CARACAS, Dec. 29.-Venezuela will modernize and "Americanize" the ancient Central University in Caracas and rebuild it in a university city, which will have baseball and football fields, tennis courts, swimming pool, dormitories and students' clubs. Aiding the officials in their plans is Dr. Frank McVey, president of the University of Kentucky twentythree years and before that head of the University of North Dakota eight years. The 2,800 students of the various schools are hampered by overcrowding. In the university city they will have ample space. Special buildings will hold the present schools and other buildings will be provided for new courses. The government has already appropriated \$3,300,000 for a 1,000-bed hospital, and medical, nursing and other buildings. The schools and hospital will continue

CHINESE FAMINE-STRICKEN

ARE BEING REHABILITATED PAOCHI, China, Dec. 29. Refugees by the hundreds of thousands are being "walked out" of famine areas in Honan and eastern shensi provinces under supervision of the Chinese industrial cooperatives in west China. The cooperative system of "productive relief" is designed to help those who arrive in the west without food or money and in a semi-starving condition. They are "walked out" in groups of about fifty. Many belong to families of soldiers-a grandmother, mother and their children being a typical group. Each family unit has a wheelbarrow for possessions. In some cases only the men go, planning to send for their families. The groups travel ten miles a day. 

Triumvirate Plans to Smash Japanese



Generalissimo Chiang Kai-shek, President Roosevelt and Prime Min ister Churchill, representing the triumvirate of China, the United States and Britain, as they conferred in Cairo, Egypt. Decisions were reached to beat Japan into unconditional surrender and to force her to give up all the islands she has seized in the Pacific since the Sino-Japanese war in 1894, and "all other territories which she has taken by violence and greed." Later, at a conference in Iran, Roosevelt, Churchill and Premier Josef Stalin of Russia were reported to have decided on a similar policy to ward Germany. Germany, it was reported, would be quarantined as the world's No. 1 aggressor and thrown back inside her original borders. Unless Germany surrenders unconditionally it is believed she will be subjected to more of the intense bombing which has destroyed much of Berlin
