EDITORIAL Are We Going to Surrender? Runnels county is engaged in a battle just as important

as any in which our soldiers are in. They are watching us, just as we are watching them, to see if we go over the top in the 4th War Loan Drive and thereby support them by assuring them of implements of war with which to defeat the enemy on the field of battle.

Last Saturday night Runnels county was the tail end county in this entire West Texas region with less than half its quota raised and the time almost gone. By next Tuesday half a million dollars worth of bonds must be bought, or we will be letting our boys at the front down.

There are battles coming-tough, bloody, hard-to-win battles-before this war is over. And while our boys are invading and clawing their way onto strange shores-for us-shall we here in this typical American county surrender by failing to do our part in reaching our 4th War Loan quota? That would be equal to losing a battle-equal to shaking hands and making friends with Hitler and Hirohito.

Every detail is ready for the final rally of the 4th War Loan campaign here Saturday afternoon from 3 to 4:30 o'clock. All stores will close promptly at 3 p. m. and remain closed an hour and a half. The 634th Army Band of Concho Field, San Angelo, will provide music. Major David J. Evans, of Abilene, is to act as master of ceremonies and direct the sale of bonds, and Captain Edward A. Feille, a hero of foreign war theatres, will be the principal speaker. Lockett Shelton, of Abilene, district chairman of the campaign, will be here to assist in the rally.

Nathan Adams, state chairman of the 4th War Loan Drive, has issued the following statement: "I have been requested by the United States Treasury to release to them on February 15, at the close of the drive, a special report on what Texas and Texans have done-this report specifically prepared to be transmitted by the Treasury to the Commanding General of the 36th Division, informing him and his Texas troops the result of the drive. It is expected that this message will be 'Mission Performed.' It must be no other report."

The only report we can afford to have sent to the men of the 36th in the foxholes of Italy or in the white beds of McCloskey Hospital, is that we have met our goal and will back them until the last shot is fired.

Next Saturday in the final rally of the campaign, two soldier heroes will be here to appeal to our people to buy their share. These men should be given a big hearing and their plea should meet with a quick response. It is a blot on our county that they should have to leave their duties and come here to beg Americans to invest in victory, to plead for our boys who are taking the hardships of war, giving their blood in thousands of cases, to make the safest investment in the world-United States War Bonds. If citizens of Runnels county were buying bonds on the same percentage as men in the service there would be no drives and every quota would be over-subscribed. Our service men are doing the fighting and also helping the home front finance the war. They are doing without food -while the home front continues to live as usual. The food consumed by dogs in Ballinger would go a long ways in feeding soldiers or those in starving countries. We have made no sacrifices, other than the loss of loved ones. Let's enlist on the home front and start fighting with our men to bring this thing to a close.
