

> Dean E. J. Kyle, of the A. & M. school of agriculture, who presided, appointed a nine-man committee selected from groups attending to plan cooperative action in getting the job done President Gibb Gilchrist pledged the full cooperation of A. & M. College in soil building and soil and water conservation. Director Prewit said that soil building in Texas had increased about 50 per cent in the past two years. The practice of terracing was well established, but planting of legumes for winter cover crops which are basic to soil building. was not so far along.

T. J. Harrell, of Fort Worth representing the cottonseed industry, said the agricultural committee of his organization would cooperate by distributing educational information on soil build ing through cotton gins, cottonol mills and other media. Paul Walser, of the state soil conservation service outlined a seven-point program which he characterized as a "new conception" of conservation. The items in the program

(1) Proper land use; (2) soil improvement by vegetation and fertilizing; (3) erosion control by vegetation and mechanization; (4) public information-informing every citizen that he is affected by soil erosion and that each has a part in controlling it; research to obtain more information about grasses and legumes; (6) technical assistance; (7) farmer leadership.

Walser disclosed that 11,000,000 acres of Texas soil have been ruined through erosion and that many more millions of acres are subject to similar damage and
