the tendency of alternate bear-Heaton says that all cut should be made so there will be a good leaf-bearing tissue beyond the cut. They should be made as closely as possible to the limb or branch to which the part removed is attached. Long stubs never should be left as the wound cannot heal In tipping back twigs or limbs cut just barely above a side branch or bud so the wound will heal quickly. Dead stubs collect moisture and set up rot which likely will penetrate live tissues and do damage. Heaton recommends using sharp instruments and making smooth cuts which will not retain moisture. Trees which have been properly

pruned each season seldom require removal of large limbs. Wounds from removal of limbs of one to one and one-half inches in diameter rarely develop decay. As larger ones may do so they should e painted over with proper materials to prevent infection. In areas of high rainfall infection likely will be more severe and should be guarded against. The help of the county agricultural agent should be sought in problems of pruning fruit trees or

# **Milk Production Step-up Necessary During Next Year**

The government is again stress ing the need for milk production and John A. Barton, county agent, is giving information to the producers of Runnels county in regard to keeping their winter production high.

He pointed out that milk is 85 to 87 per cent water and that the high-producing cow must get it either through green grazing or by drinking. It requires from 15 to 18 gallons of water per day for each cow and the ordinary cow will not consume that much ice water. He urges the use of some kind of commercial or home-made heater for water during the winter. A home-made heater can be made from half of an oil drum. building a fire in it and weighting it down in the water. Mr. Barton stated that warm water in winter would pay bigger dividends than cool water in summer.


The county agent also suggests the feeding of all the roughage cows will eat. He said Runnels county farmers are blessed with plenty of feed and that milk production could be increased by use of plenty of this feed.


Since cows are off green grazing the county agent said the protein content of feed must be boosted to substitute for the protein formerly obtained from green grass. He also suggested that good shelter be provided for all dairy stock because it would increase milk production and cut down on the necessary feed.


