

The civilian population has more money now than in 1939 and fewer goods on which to spend it. Also, more people are working longer hours and need more food particularly meat. The demand for meat has, therefore, increased tremendously. The Government in a recent statement said that the average American, at present income levels, would consume 170 pounds of meat this year, if it were available. In contrast, the Government estimates that there will be available during 1945 only about 127

NON-FEDERALLY INSPECTED SUPPLIES

The Government takes only federally-inspected meats Therefore, the shortage of meat available for civilians is not so acute in the case of local packers who do not operate under federal inspection. There will be less sugar available, according to reports from the war food administration, Dr. Winters said, and the home-maker will have to "juggle" recipes to use half sugar and half syrup sweetening, she suggested.

Sugar savers, she said, are: serve cooked foods hot to enjoy their fullest flavor and sweetness; save syrup from canned fruit to sweeten other fruit, pudding sauces, or beverages; a pinch of salt develops flavor and makes food seem sweeter; be sure all sugar is completely dissolved to get its full sweetness.







#### **OPA Freezes Prices** On Many Retailers For Clothing, Etc. has announced the follows week and Easter services:

The office of price administra-tion has frozen the price mark-ups of some 300,000 retailers selling clothing, dry goods, furniture and house furnishings. The aim, the OPA explained, is to insure that consumers get the benefit of lowered factory prices which are forthcoming.

The action was taken by Price

retail price increases which have already taken place on garments, shoes, dry goods, lamps and other antee that when their cost to the retailer is reduced the price to the customer also will go down

The new order replaced five previous price regulations, therefore it can be more easily understood and followed by dealers. Bowles predicted that enforcement also would become easier

Small stores were exempted by a clause permitting them to use the existing price orders if they preferred, but this applies only to concerns having net sales of less than \$2,500 a year for all the items listed.

Each dealer has been directed to prepare immediately pricing charts showing his own margins over net invoice costs for all goods offered for sale today. Full instructions to retailers on preparation of the charts are in the hands of local price and ration boards at this time.

Copies of the charts must be filed with OPA district offices by April 20. Unless the storekeeper has received an acknowledgement by mail from OPA by May 4, it is unlawful for him to sell or deliver goods covered by the

OPA price clerks have pamphlets containing complete instructions and these will be delivered by price panel assistants who will obtain the owners' signatures.


