Reasons for Growing More

McCORSTIN IS STANDOUT IN S.M.U. GRID PROSPECTS

DALLAS, May 1 .-- George L. Mc Corstin, of Ballinger, was one of the standouts in the S.M.U. spring football training camp which has ended after 30 days of intensive drills.

McCorstin, who participated in track and basketball, plays wingback. He weighs 160 pounds and is 5 feet 11 inches tall.

The climax of the training season was a benefit game between the varsity and exes, a team consisting largely of former Ponies who are now in professional football. Proceeds of the game will be used to help erect a \$175,000 dormitory for varsity athletes. The dormitory, which will be erected as a memorial to the S.M.U. let termen who were killed in World Wars I and II, will house about 80 boys. The S.M.U. Lettermen's Association has adopted the raising of funds for the dormitory as its major project for 1946. Already more than \$75,000 has been pledged to the fund, and actual construction of the building is expected to start within the next ew weeks.
