

Chester Cherry is Featured in Story In 'Electric News'

The Electric Times, published at Abilene, presents a feature article in a recent issue with pictures of Chester Cherry, telling of his early life and his connection with the electric business in this region since 1909.

Mr. Cherry came to Texas in 1900 and for a time was located in Hunt county and at Temple where he operated a thresher, was guard at a smallpox detention camp, and served as a railroad employee. He came to Ballinger on -April 1, 1909, after receiving a tellyram from Oscar Pearson asking him to come here to take over the distribution system of the Ballinger Power & Light Company.



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
