

Livestock Show Winners Offered Flight Instruction

R. E. Bruce, manager of the Harman Training Center and municipal airport, is making an announcement for winners in first places of each division in the livestock show to be held at the field on Tuesday, February 25.

The offer of Mr. Bruce is one of the biggest ever made by an individual here to winners in the show. He will give a solo flight course to the first place winners in the calf, sheep, hog capon divisions of the show this year. These courses are for complete instruction up until the winner is soloed by his instructor. In addition he is offering a free airplane ride to all second and third place winners in which they will be carried over their farm home and an aerial photograph will be made of their home and presented to them.

The special awards will be in addition to the regular prize money.

Many Ballinger businessmen plan to attend the show and a large number promise to purchase one or more animals in the auction sale which will follow the judging.

The 1947 show for 4-H club boys and F.F.A. boys in this area will be held in one of the large hangars at Bruce Field. Those in charge of arrangements are getting the place ready for the exhibition. Pens are being set up and in addition a judging arena and sale arena will be set up in the center of the building and seats arranged for spectators.

The boys have a large number of fat calves, lambs and swine for the 1947 show and some of the animals will be very outstanding. Not all the stock will be offered for sale at the conclusion of the show, as a selected group of animals will be kept for showing in some of the larger livestock exhibitions in the state.

All Ballinger people are reminded of the date and place of the show and given a special invitation to visit the show hanger during the day.

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Brush Clearing Gets Results in Improved Pastures in Kendall

COLLEGE STATION, Feb. 19.—Kendall county farmers and ranchmen are showing up with first rate pastures as a result of a brush clearing program.

On acreage where cedar and other brush has been eradicated, and the cut material left on the ground as cover, the natural reseeding of native grasses "is showing up well," reports Kendall County Agricultural Agent C. E. Nelson.

Among the grasses which have been quickly restored to good stands by brush eradication are Little Bluestem, Hairy and Side-oats Grama and Bermuda. In some instances, plantings of Side-oats Grama, Slender Grama and Yellow Bluestem or Beard grass are doing well, the county agent says.

Careful stocking is an important part of an improved pasture program, the agent believes. He says that in all cases in Kendall county where good showings have been made in the project, the number of livestock has been adjusted down to actual carrying capacity to prevent over-grazing.

GEOLOGICAL RESEARCH BEING CONDUCTED IN TRANS-PECOS

AUSTIN, Feb. 19.—A three-fold geological research is now underway by the University of Texas bureau of economic geology in the Trans-Pecos region of Texas. Dr. J. T. Lonsdale, director, has announced.

Objectives of the extensive program are (1) complete geological mapping of a large part of the region, (2) search for mineral deposits of value, and (3) explanation of the geologic history of the region including especially the igneous rocks which are present in great numbers and which have not been studied in detail.

Brush Clearing Gets Results in Improved Pastures in Kendall

A grant of \$800 was recently given by the Council of the Geological Society of America to make possible certain chemical and mineralogical studies of the igneous rocks.

Dr. S. S. Goldich, of the bureau, is in charge of the field program, and is assisted by Clay L. Seward, of the bureau, and R. D. Bloomer, of the department of geology at the university.

Special attention is now being given to the Jordan Gap, Tascotal Mesa, and Christmas Mountain areas in Brewster and Presidio counties. Some work has been done in the Hood Spring and Agua Fria areas of Brewster county also.

RECOMMENDATIONS MADE AT ORCHARD MEETING

The home orchard owner should strive to have a good assortment of fruit that will ripen as nearly as possible throughout the growing season. By having several kinds as well as an assortment of varieties, the chances for having an adequate supply of fresh fruit each year is assured. Unfavorable weather conditions, such as late frost, rarely destroy fruits of all kinds. With this point in mind, the following fruits and varieties are suggested for this part of the state.

Pears: Bartlett, Le Conte, Garber, Keiffer, Peaches: Golden Jubilee, Early Wheeler, Fair Beauty, Halehaven, Elberta, and Frank. Plums: Bruce, Botan, Pool's Pride, and Gold. Grapes: Beacon, Extra, Bailey and Edna. Blackberries: Early Wonder and Haupt. Pecans: Western Schley, Burkett, and Texas Prolific. Apples: Delicious, King David, Holland, and Golden Delicious. Cherries and Cherry Plums: Opata, Sapa, Wanita and Hanska.

The first unit will be permanently installed in the high school gymnasium and will be available for all programs staged in that building. A large system will be hooked up at Bearcat Field for use at football games and other programs held there.

It is hoped to have the first unit in the gym in time for the annual membership meeting and program of the Ballinger Board of Community Development February 27.

2. Put trash cans on sidewalks
3. Assisted in tuberculosis fund drive and sale of bonds
4. Helped place polio victim in a hospital
5. Held annual banquet February 3 with more than 100 present

and their treatments are as follows:

Peach Tree Borer: Treat with Ethylene Dichloride Emulsion between October 20 and November 15. Mix with water and use one half pint for each tree.

Shot hole borers: Attacks only trees that are in weakened condition and gives the appearance of having been shot with shotgun. There is no chemical treatment and once it appears on the tree the infected limbs should be removed and burned.

Peach Leaf Curl: Must be treated while the tree is dormant before the buds swell, with a lime solution.

Treatments for flat headed apple tree bore, scales, brown rot, pecan scab, pecan weevil, and rosette may be found in extension bulletin B173 that may be obtained at the county agent's office.

6. Purchased public address systems for schools.

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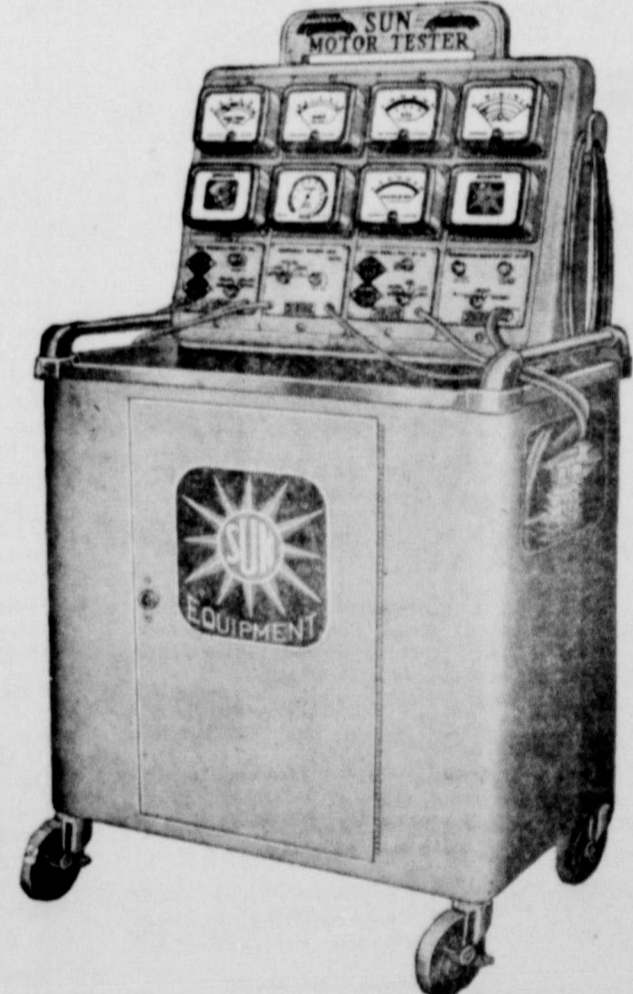

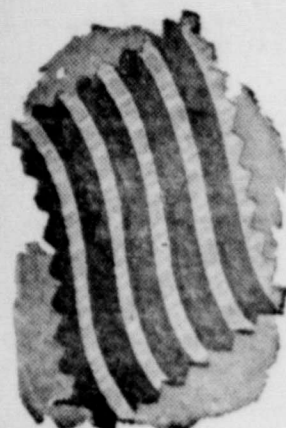

Citizens of County Purchase \$340,571 in Savings Bonds

Government bonds are still being purchased by Runnels countians and while the campaigns are not conducted like they were during the war, the county still operates on a quota each month and sales have been fair.

During December the county purchased a total of \$26,718.75 with \$16,818.75 of that amount in E bonds and the remainder, \$3,900 in series F and G bonds.

During 1946 the county bought a total of \$340,571.50 in United States savings bonds. This twelve-month total was not as much as one war bond campaign during the war, but was less than one-third of the usual quotas.

The treasury department announces that savings bonds are owned by more people than any other security in the world.

During 1947 the government will still push the buying of bonds and all counties will be given monthly quotas and bankers, post offices and other issuing agents will be pushed to sell as many as possible.

GARDEN POINTERS

By Miss Ollie Chenoweth
County Home Demonstration Agent

For health, for recreation, and a supply of fresh vegetables that will knock dollars off the grocery bill, everyone who can should plant a spring garden this year.

Before you plant, remember this: no vegetable grows better than the soil it's planted in. It is better to delay planting until the soil can be prepared properly, than to get in a big hurry and plant in poor soil.

The soil should be plowed or spaded at least five or six inches, and ten inches would be better. Deep tillage brings warm air into the soil and helps your seed get off to a better start. If the soil can be stirred several times before planting so much the better. And get all those bad grasses out of the garden site—Johnson and Bermuda grass, and Coco or Nut grass—don't make your vegetables compete with these pests.

Of course we all know that rich soil gives the best yields. If you've got rotted manure apply about 50

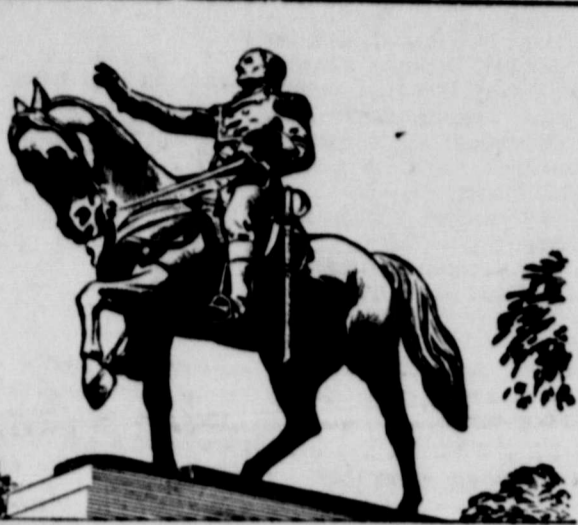

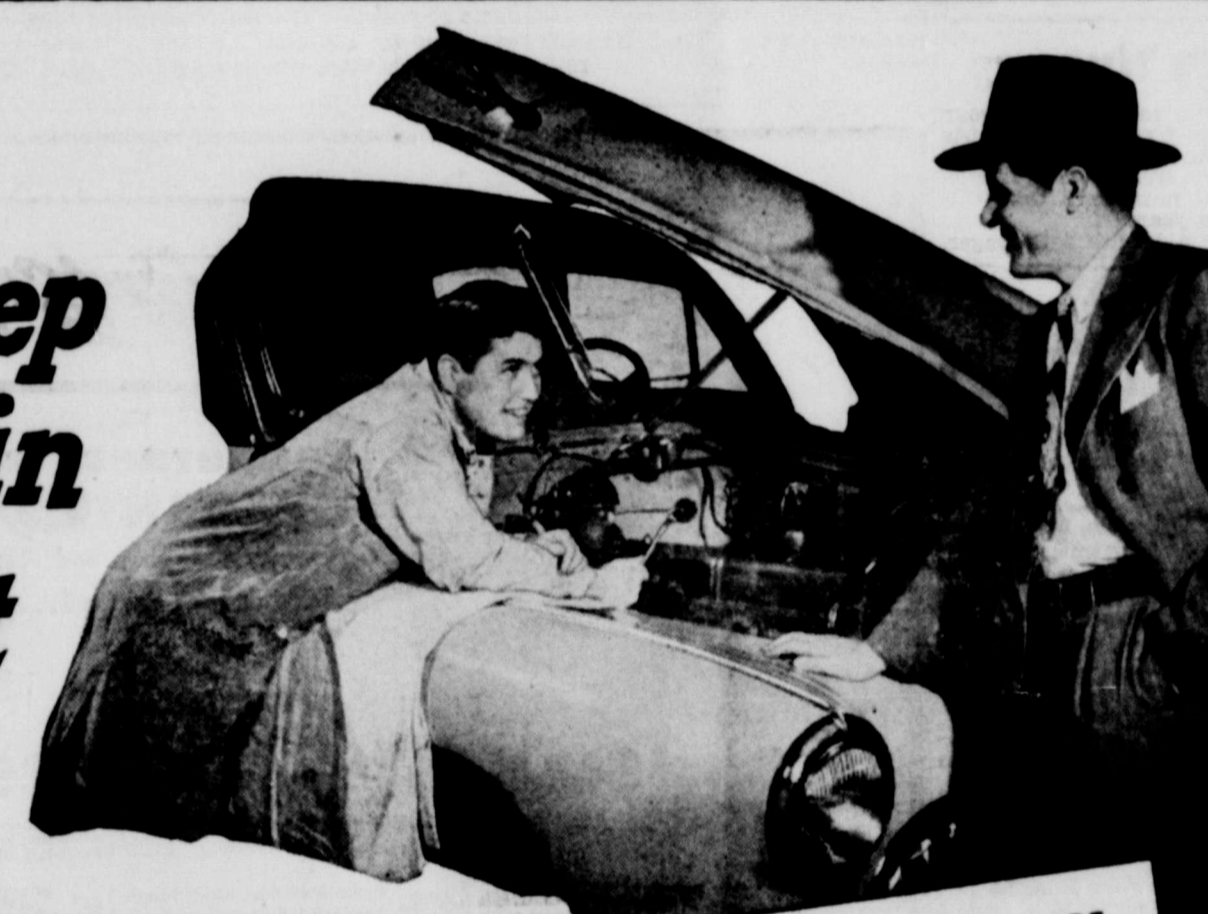


