Bailey County Agricultural Agent K. Adams reports that the uster, called by old timers "the rongest puff of wind that has hit Bailey county in many moons,' rould have caused ten times as much soil damags if it had come long before the days when farmers knew how to protect their land rom wind erosion Most Bailey county farmers were

ready for it, Adams says. They eft stubble in the fields after the grain sorghum harvest, and let late weeds stay on the ground to help anchor down the top soil. The farmers are realizing the value of vegetable cover as a protection against wind erosion, says Adams, and to prevent speeding up moisture loss, they are not in too big a hurry to get their land opened up.

The county extension agent is working with the soil conservation service in promoting Bailey ounty's soil conservation program.
