The committee sent the official call to Rev. Gilbert and expect to have a reply from him by the end of this week. It is not known here whether he will accept the invitation to come to Ballinger.


Rev. Gilbert was here two weeks ago and preached for the Ballinger church and later it was decided to extend the call to him.
