City Considers Hiring Official Dog Catcher

plans for building a dog pound and the appointment of a dog catcher to enforce provisions of the ordinance recently passed.

Several men are being considered for dog catcher with the qualification that a built and maintained.

The new ordinance makes it compulsory that all dogs within the city limits be vaccinated for rabies, that each be registered at the city hall, for which a tag will be issued to be worn on a collar. No tag will be issued unless the owner can show a certificate of vaccination.

A number of dog owners have already complied with the requirements. As soon as the dog catcher is hired a close check-up will be made and all dogs found without tags will be impounded for three days to give owners opportunity to claim them, pay pounds fees and for food.

A considerable number of dogs were poisoned here last week, city officials stating that about twenty had been reported dead. City wagon crews were asked to haul off the dead animals, a number of which were wearing collars and tags.
