Contract BILL The number of dairy cows in the United States has increased only 1% since 1940. In the same eight years, a 10% increase in popu-lation has added about 12,000,000 more mouths to feed. 





If they are crossed with New Hampshires, dark-colored chickens will often result. Therefore, the premium for whites is lost. And the slightly faster growth rate of crossbreds may not make up this profit difference. In color of eggs, the crossbred producer is also at a market disadvantage. Most egg-producing crossbreds lay colored eggs. Many markets pay more for white eggs. 
