

Posters and notices sent out this week by the state health department contain the following instructions:

"For the health and safety of our citizens please clean up your premises. Eliminate fly, rat, mosquito and fire hazards by:

"1. Removing all containers, tin cans, bottles, tires and other trash from your premises. Remove all decayed vegetable matter and trees.

"2. Depositing all garbage and cans in a regulation covered galvanized garbage container and keeping it covered. Use 5 per cent to 10 per cent DDT solution to spray garbage cans and immediate area. Place trash so it can be picked up by city trucks.

"3. Keep all chicken and rabbit pens cleaned daily. Use DDT spray for insect control around

"4. Keep all outside toilets clean and make them fly tight. Cover all waste with dirt after each use of toilet. Get sewer connection if line is available.

"5. Clean up all vacant lots. Cut weeds and brush. If burning constitutes a hazard call fire department for supervision."

The state posters say that tenants as well as property owners shall be responsible for their premises.


