Fewer than 2,000 of the 10,000 seats were taken, and Mr. Truman could take consolation only from the fact that his voice had better resonance than usual in the vast reaches of the thinly populated hall. One interpretation of this phenomenon is that the "non-political" label on the President's tour backfired badly. He made a frankly political speech in Omaha, but the city's Democratic organization previously had been instructed to soft-pedal his appearance as a campaigner. Difficulty arose when neither Democrats nor anyone else showed up.
