Here is What Your RED CROSS Did In the United States During Fiscal Year 1947-'48

In 303 Domestic disaster operations, the Red Cross gave relief and rehabilitation aid to 312,400 persons, costing \$12,171,022. Veterans and dependents brought 1,782,000 cases to the Red Cross Chapters Home Service Workers through which they received financial help of \$5,624,000. Red Cross workers with the Armed Forces handled 708,300 cases for servicemen and families; provided financial aid of \$2,351,000; Red Cross Chapter workers handled 768,000 cases involving Servicemen and families; gave financial aid totaling \$3,029,000. Red Cross helped in Promoting

Health; twelve regional blood programs and one state-wide mobile unit program served an estimated population of 16,000,000 persons; distributed gamma globulin for measles prevention and treatment worth \$3,800,000. Distributed surplus blood plasma returned by the armed forces worth \$11,508,000, Junior Red Cross National Children's Fund sent to children overseas educational and health supplies worth \$300,000; also sent overseas 544,000 gift boxes valued at \$1,089,000; over 264,700 volunteers served in Red Cross work.

1948 Red Cross Work in Runnels County

Through Home Service, the Runnels County Red Cross carries out its responsibility to Servicemen and Veterans and their dependents, and to the dependents of deceased servicemen and veterans. This program includes counseling in personal and family problems, reporting and communication service, assistance in applying for government benefits, referral service, and financial assistance. In 1948 Runnels County Chapter had 201 families. Of this number 153 were veterans and their dependents, 11 were servicemen and their dependents, and 37 were civilians. Many of the 201 cases are active

for a period of one year or more. Others are closed in a few days. Most cases are active from 20 to 60 days. The Runnels County Red Cross has expended \$3,623.66 in helping the above families. This assistance has been in the form of loans and grants to Veterans and their dependents, Servicemen and dependents, dependents of Deceased Servicemen, and Civilians. This has entailed many home visits office interviews long distance calls, telegrams and letters, Gifts were also sent to the Waco Veterans Hospital at Xmas time. Chapter assisted with Xmas cheer program in adopting families.

1948 Red Cross Activities in Texas

Last year the call for blood by the sick and injured in the vicinities of El Paso, Wichita Falls and Lubbock were aswered over 1,500 times. Measles serum, having a commercial value of \$50,000 and plasma to the value of over \$750,000 were in the hands of Texas doctors and hospitals, given by the Red Cross, distributed by the state health department. Last year, 23 Texas Red Cross chapters helped in 17 major disasters-it meant rebuilt homes, furniture, medical care, food, clothing, support for orphaned and maimed. The year's disasters in Texas cost \$355,000.

Red Cross helped 85,000 Texas servicemen and veterans last year and gave \$600,000 financial aid and gifts.

THE active support of every citizen in Texas I is needed to abolish ignorance from the sickroom-to guarantee that every practitioner - doctor of medicine, osteopath, chiropractor or naturopath - meets at least minimum standards of knowledge of the healing sciences.

In eighteen other states of the United States, minimum standards laws have been established to protect the public.

No such legal protection is afforded the people of Texas today.

There is now pending before the State Legislature a workable, fair and impartial Minimum Standards Bill, which would require proof of fundamental knowledge of anyone who intends to practice any branch of the healing art. He would be required to pass an examination in the six sciences common to all forms of healing.

The Minimum Standards Bill provides that anyone who would treat the sick must meet the same requirements. All branches of the healing art are treated alike. All would be examined by a qualified, impartial board of science teachers, chosen from the staffs of our leading accredited universities. No practitioner from any branch of healing may serve on the board.

The six sciences generally considered as "basic" to all forms of healing are: Anatomy, Physiology, Pathology, Bacteriology, Chemistry, and Hygiene and Public Health. In other words, every practitioner should be expected to know something of the human anatomy, disease, the effect of drugs and basic health rules.

No one who is now legally practicing a healing art in Texas would be affected by the Minimum Standards Law. But the law would demand that future practitioners must first meet these Minimum Standards.

We demand by law that plumbers, teachers, veterinarians and attorneys prove themselves qualified in their field before practicing in it. Yet we have no minimum standards for those who minister to our ill.

For your health's sake, urge your State Legislators to vote for the Minimum Standards Bill.


