Election Saturday For County Voters To Submit 2 Issues

Runnels county voters will go to the polls Saturday to cast ballots on two issues. All twentynine voting boxes will be open for the usual voting hours, 8 a. m. to 7 p. m. and all materials have been distributed to election man-

The first question will be that of making compulsory registration of all dogs in this county. Several weeks ago the commissioners court was presented a petition bearing the names of enough qualified voters to secure this election. The petition was circulated after dogs had caused heavy damage on a number of ranches by killing sheep.

If the issue is favored, all dog owners will be forced to register the animals with the county treasurer and to pay a fee to the county. A tag and number will be issued and this must be attached to a collar which the dog shall wear. Dogs without registration tags will be killed by county officers after a set date, unless they have been registered and are wearing the collar and tag.

The second issue to be voted upon by the people Saturday will deal with the reallocation of tax money into various accounts. Due to changes in operating costs, county officials have found that some funds are short of money and a larger per centage of the tax money must be allocated to these funds. The county jury fund has been hit hard in recent years and at times has been "broke." Under the present plan, eral funds would be increased and less placed in other funds wich now has a surplus. 




