few years ago, said that the poison grain really killed the pests for him and at a total cost of only 50 cents. Mr. Hambright stated that the first part of the year harvest and when poison was put ut on his farm they were eating strip of cotton every night. After outting out the poison he did not find any more damage.

The local fram agent's office ecured the poison for Mr. Hambright and gave the usual method of preparing the grain as recomnended by the U.S. rodent control service. The method suggested is erect several mounds of dirt imilar to a prairie dog hill, four o six feet apart. Scatter on each f the mounds about a tablespoonul of poisoned grain. For some inknown reason, the rabbits will risit each mound and eat a few grains from each, enough to kill. Mr. Barton stated his office was getting 100 pounds of rabbit poison and those who would like to try it are asked to call.
