Spotted rains fell in Runnels county Monday, ranging from about three-tenths of an inch in Ballinger to more than an inch in places. South and southwest of Ballinger many communities got half an inch or more and water was standing in many fields Tuesday morning

Hall fell in some sections and slight damage is reported. Most of the rain was hard but was sufficient to benefit farm land and pastures.

The official gauge in Ballinger, located at the J. E. Witt place on the Bronte highway, registered .21 of an inch. Gauges in the downtown district caught half an inch and more.

Ballinger men returning from the Hill Country stated they ran into heavy precipitation between Eden and Paint Rock and noticed that it was less near Bethel, just south of Ballinger. The rest of the area was covered by good showers. Winters received a good shower earlier in the afternoon.

Henry Wiesepape, who lives south of Ballinger, stated he received half an inch. Around Norton about .50 of an inch fell and no hail was reported.


