forage and silage.

Karper says it has the high quality and palatable forage of Hegari and the same maturity and adaptation, but yields approximately 20 per cent more forage.

The first grain sorghums were tall and late maturing. Hegari, one of the more popular, was imported from Africa in 1909 and was first grown at the Chillicothe station. In 1938 Texas sorghum breeders came up with early Hegari, a dwarf, drought resistant, early maturing type which is still the principal variety of Hegari.

The labor shortage during World War II, the demand for grain and

the development of the double dwarf grain sorghums brought the combines into the sorghum fields. In 1949, more than 85 per cent of Texas grain sorghums were combine harvested.

The popularity of the combine varieties in turn led to a shortage of bundle feed; the supply is expected to be still shorter in the future because of acreage reductions.

Plant breeders of the Texas agricultural experiment station foresaw the need for forage and silage and for the past several

years have been working on the problem; Hi-Hegari is the result.

The entire supply of seed has been distributed for increase, and a fair amount of Hi-Hegari will be available for 1951 planting through regular trade channels.

The results of a recent feeding test by the Texas agricultural experiment station indicate that at current prices it is an economical practice to substitute four pounds of citrus or corn molasses for an equal amount of ground milo in a beef calf fattening ration.

Land Conservation Funds Exhausted

The Runnels county PMA office reports that funds for conservation practices have been exhausted but if more money is made available all farmers will be notified. It was also stated that no waiting list would be maintained and when more funds are available approvals will be given on the first come, first served, basis.

Every effort will be made to secure additional funds so that terracing and other practices to save the soil can be continued in the county. Much has already been accomplished but there is still much to be done.

The opinion of the department of agriculture is that soil conservation is the concern of the farmer and urban dweller alike and that we do not as yet have in this country a conservation program which will safeguard the productivity of the land.

Announcement was made by the PMA last week that the 1950 wheat crop was the smallest in nearly a decade. The estimate of production has been cut to 690,000 bushels as compared with 901,000,000 bushels a year ago.

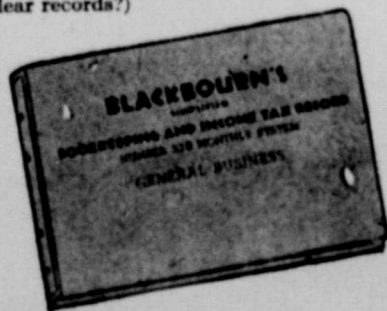

SAFETY ON THE FARM

This is National Farm Safety Week and all farm agencies are cooperating to bring safety rules to the attention of rural people in order to reduce the number of accidents that occur regularly. Leaders in the movement point out that most of the accidents could be eliminated. The safety rules are:

1. Keep walkways and steps in good repair, unobstructed and well lighted.
2. Keep ladders in good repair and easily accessible in case of emergency.
3. Always stop a machine before unclogging, oiling or adjusting it. Keep all machine guards and safety devices in place.
4. Don't wear loose and floppy clothes around machinery.
5. Start tractors smoothly and turn corners slowly, avoid ditch banks and soft ground, always hitch to drawbar.
6. Speak to animals when approaching them. Keep them calm by acting with calm self-assurance yourself.
7. Always keep bulls in safe bull pens. Never handle bulls unless they are properly restrained.
8. Know and obey all traffic rules. Stop driving if you get sleepy. Never ride with a driver who has had a drink.

9. Keep your back straight and lift heavy loads with your leg muscles. Don't try to lift anything that is too heavy.
10. Use the right tools for the job. Make sure they are in good condition.
11. Give prompt attention to every minor injury.
12. Keep guns unloaded except when actually using them. Treat every gun as though it were loaded. Never aim at anything you don't want to kill.
13. Don't use kerosene to start fires. Pour kerosene and gasoline outdoors to prevent accumulation of treacherous vapors. Dry clean outdoors.
14. Don't smoke around the barn.
15. Never swim alone. Never dive into water without first determining the depth. Be careful around boats of any kind and never stand up in small boats.

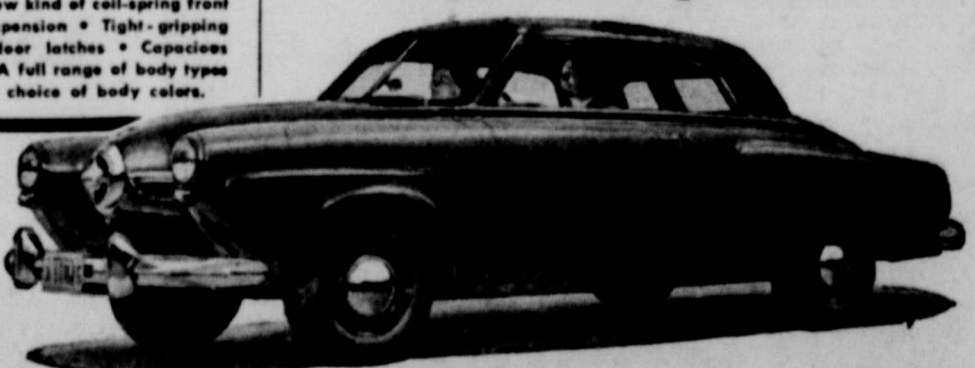

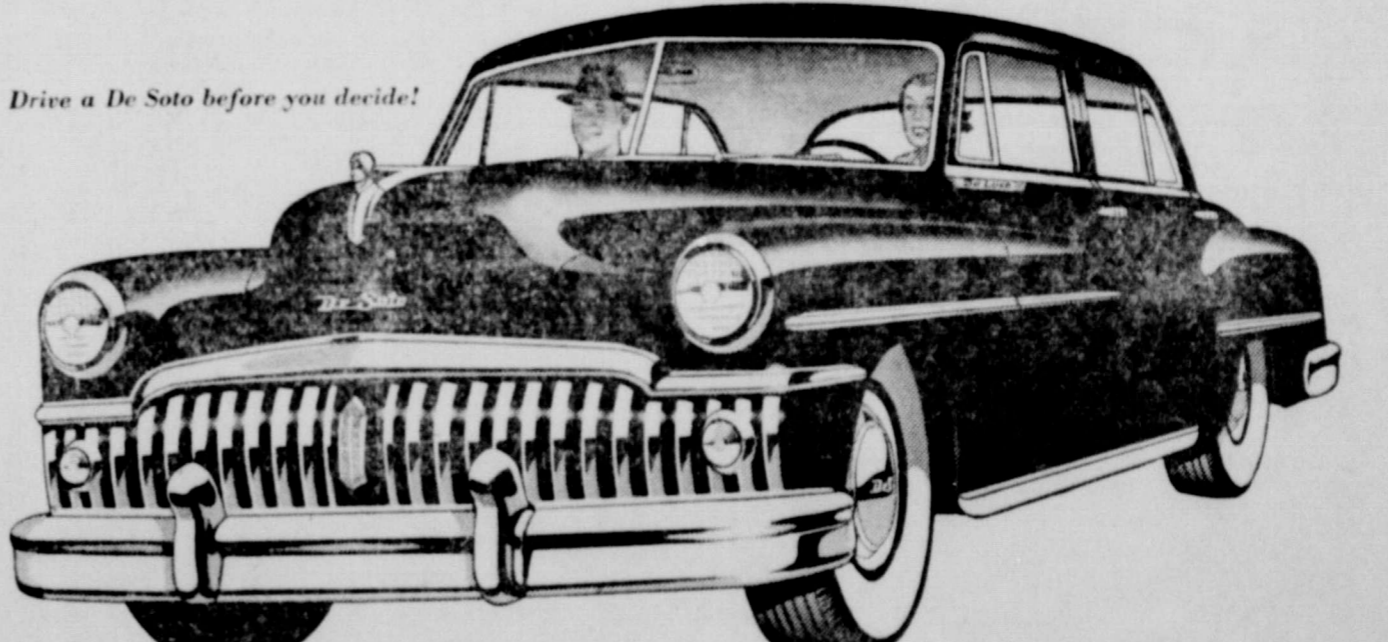

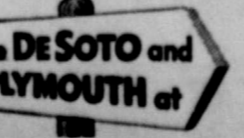

Army Chaplain Tells Lions About Conditions in Korea

Major A. V. Bradley, an army chaplain who served for two years in Korea with American forces from 1946 to 1948, was guest speaker at the Ballinger Lions Club meeting Friday noon. The major is here conducting a revival at the Valley View Baptist Church near Ballinger.

He told Lions of the land which is attracting so much attention today and where Americans are fighting communistic forces of North Korea.

The speaker complimented the Lions of the world in his opening remarks, telling of the instance during World War II when Lions clubs sold enough bonds to equip a full infantry division. He served with this division, the 106th infantry, which was called the "Roaring Lions." The group, made up mainly of 18-year-old draftees, made a wonderful record in combat.

As a background Major Bradley told how the Japanese took over and ruled for 40 years. When Americans went into the country near the end of World War II they found the country without a single policeman, no officials and the public without any political desires. Just before the end of the war, Russians infiltrated the country from the north and the two forces met at the 38th parallel. This line immediately became an iron curtain for the Americans and any who ventured across that dividing line became prisoners.

After the occupation of South Korea, the Americans trained and organized a police force of natives, organized a national guard and equipped them with American arms. Elections were held in which a legislature was formed, a presi-

dent elected and the south Korean republic was formed. The speaker told of the first election in which 85 per cent of the people cast ballots before 9 a. m. on election day, a record which he said should put Americans to shame.

He stated that there were some Communists in South Korea, but added that there were also some in America, a situation which we should do something about.

After the occupation of North Korea by the Russians he said thousands of refugees fled to the south every day. Pastors and most members of their churches fled into South Korea and after liberation in the southern portion the churches flourished and grew in numbers by leaps and bounds. Many refugees left behind all their possessions, showing their preference for liberty.

The visiting speaker said "we are fighting today for the same thing which has caused Americans to shed blood ever since our country became a nation." He pointed out that we are not fighting Koreans but we are fighting Russia and killing Koreans. He declared that every bullet, every piece of equipment and the training of men were Russian made.

In a question period which followed the talk the speaker declared: "Russia can wear us and the United Nations down fighting its satellites and still have 10,000,000 trained soldiers rested."

In response to a question the speaker said that this terrain was not suitable for use of the atomic bomb and that it would only kill Koreans.

Major Bradley is at home on an education leave until next January. He told Lions this might be

Johnson, Bermuda Killed by New TCA

COLLEGE STATION, July 26.—When trichloroacetate spray is used to eradicate Bermuda grass or Johnson grass, it should be mixed at the rate of one-third to three-fourths of a pound per gallon of water, says M. K. Thornton, extension agricultural chemist of Texas A. & M. College.

About one gallon of the spray will be needed per 100 square feet of area, depending upon the size and density of the plants. If applied during the months of June and July, this amount of trichloroacetate will kill practically all of the Bermuda and Johnson grass on the land.

Thornton says that trichloroacetate, commonly called TCA, has been recommended for the con-

trol of Johnson grass, Bermuda grass, and other grasses for some time, but farmers are still unable to buy the compound locally. Many of the large chemical companies manufacture the product, but do not sell it to the public in small packages.

TCA is particularly useful for the eradication of Bermuda and Johnson grass from fence rows, roadways, small spots in fields, and areas that are inaccessible for machinery. However, the cost of the compound prevents it being used for eradicating grass from large areas.

Normally some drying of plants can be seen in about 24 hours after the spray is applied, says Thornton, and most of the plants that are going to die will be dead within a week after being sprayed.

Hot, dry conditions with a moderate amount of moisture in the ground are favorable for spraying with TCA. The compound is water soluble, and it penetrates the ground in addition to acting on the tops of the plants. If a rain occurs immediately after the spray is applied, some of the TCA will be carried away in runoff water, some will leach out through the soil, and the per cent kill will not be as high.

TCA may affect the growth of plant life for 90 to 120 days after

the date of application. The chemical action varies with different species of plants, and rainfall shortens the effective period of influence.

TCA proved to be very efficient for the eradication of Johnson grass in a test run at the Blackland experiment station, Temple, Texas, and in tests run at experiment stations in other states. At the Blackland station, sodium TCA gave a 90 per cent kill in 21 days and a 100 per cent kill in four and one-half months, at a cost of 41 cents per 100 square feet.

Before the pressure cooker is used, it should be cleaned and checked. Be sure the pressure gauge is registering correctly and the safety valve is working properly.
