Measuring of Allotment Farms Nears Completion

Measurement of allotment farms in Runnels county will be completed within a few days, according to employees of the PMA office here.

It was disclosed that 40 per cent of the cotton farms of the county have been overplanted from 1 to 5 acres.

Farmers will be required to satisfy a penalty on overplanted cotton of 15.5 cents per pound. All cotton will not be eligible for a loan or support price and no soil conservation work can be paid for under the ACP program.

In the near future cotton and peanut farmers will be notified that their marketing cards are available if they are not overplanted.

Indications show that 95 per cent or more of Runnels county cotton allotments are planted. The 1950 crop will be harvested from approximately 90,000 acres.

### Decided Shift Noted In Livestock Income

COLLEGE STATION, August 2.—Twenty-five years ago only about one-fifth or 20 per cent of the agricultural income in Texas came from the sale of livestock. Today more than 45 per cent of the state's agricultural income comes from that source, says C. H. Bates, extension farm management specialist of Texas A. & M. College.

This situation, coupled with the fact that more than one-third of all the farms in Texas are operated by tenants, is creating a great need for a practical long-term lease or rental agreement. Both landlords and tenants, says Bates, are interested in working out long-term rental agreements that will prove mutually beneficial to both. Involved are such items as the division of the initial cost of the breeding animals, the division of the income from the livestock, how to divide the costs of improving pastures or sharing the supplementary pastures, soil building crops and the like. Then there is the question of providing the additional equipment in the form of fences, water facilities, barns and other equipment that is needed on most tenant-operated farms before the livestock enterprise can really be set up to the best advantage.

First, Bates says both parties must realize that through necessity the livestock rental contract must be for several years. The pastures and equipment can be improved slowly and this in turn will spread the expenditures over a long period and will not necessitate the borrowing of excessive amounts of money to get the business going. It is usually wise to grow into a new enterprise, if other things are equal, for the experience and information gained during this growing period often

means the difference between success and failure, says Bates.

Secondly, Bates points out that the kind of agreement will depend to a great extent upon the individuals making the contract but the important item is to keep the agreements and arrangements on a sound and practical basis. Both parties should profit from the rental contract not only financially but from more security and the greater satisfaction between the contracting parties that comes from the actual partner relationship that now exist if the arrangement is now being tried in the field and that county agricultural agents are working with landlords

and tenants trying to work out on the ground the best and most mutually beneficial contracts possible.

Bates believes that the forward-looking tenant as well as the landlord realizes that soil fertility must be improved, more soil and water conservation practices be used and better use must be made of the products raised on the farm. Greater production per man and per acre along with fair prices are the answer to a stable and prosperous Texas agriculture, he says.

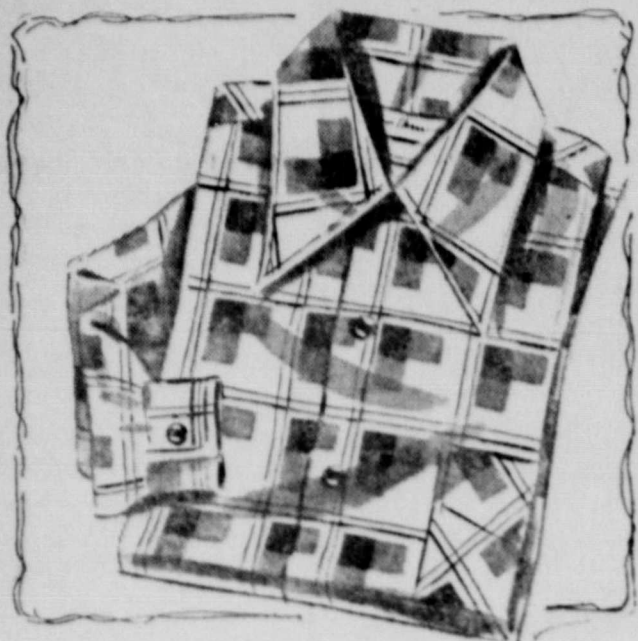

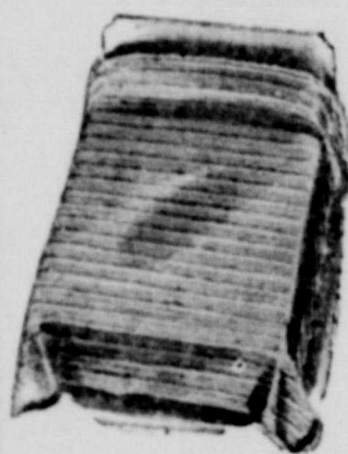

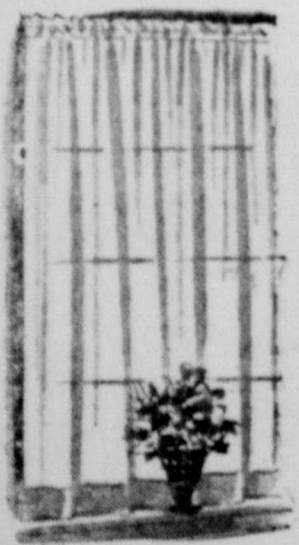

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People all over the nation and in Ballinger have done a lot of fear buying since the beginning of hostilities in Korea. Articles which were scarce during World War II have almost disappeared from shelves of local stores and in large cities the buying has been even more frantic. Already, under the impact of "scarce" buying prices have been increased and some shortages are resulting. The United States' productive capacity today is at such a high level, nearly double what it was in 1939, that it can cope with almost anything except a stampede of hoarding. Ballinger merchants tell of local people laying in supplies of sheets that would last them for many years. Automobile tires, cars, trucks and accessories have sold fast. Large quantities of food have been bought, especially coffee, sugar and other items which probably would be the first to be put under rationing. Panic buying will harm everyone. People are spending money with no immediate benefit to themselves and it will help to increase prices.

Recruiting stations for all branches of the armed forces are open for enlistments and many are volunteering in order to get in the branch of service desired.

## More Wheat Acreage Allowed This County

Runnels county wheat farmers will get a 4.47 per cent increase over their 1950 allotments, it was announced yesterday by the Runnels county PMA office.

Allotment notices are being completed in the county office and within a few days all wheat growers will receive their 1950 allotments.

Any producer who has reason to believe that his allotment was not properly determined, and who can offer facts to substantiate his claim, may file a written appeal for reconsideration with his county PMA committee. Such an appeal must be filed within 15 days after the notice of allotment was mailed to producer.

It is important that growers

understand that only those who plant within their allotment will be eligible for the 1951 wheat price support. There will be wheat acreage allotments but no marketing quotas for 1951.

In 1951 wheat farmers will not be permitted to "pin-up" ownership tracts or change allotments from one farm to another. Every farmer must plant his allotment of wheat on the farm for which it is issued.

Texas poultrymen last year lost 24 per cent of all the laying hens in their flocks during the hens' first year of production. Poultrymen who suffer such flock losses are burning or burying their poultry profits with these dead hens. Practicing good management, sanitation, feeding, and disease and parasite control on the farm can cut these losses.

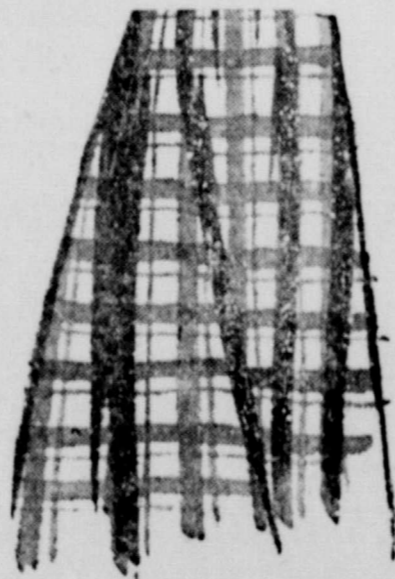

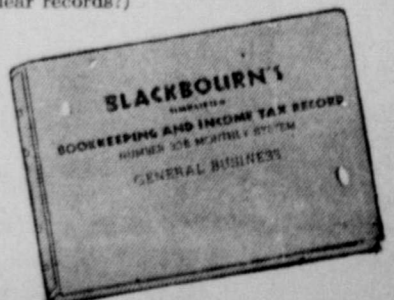

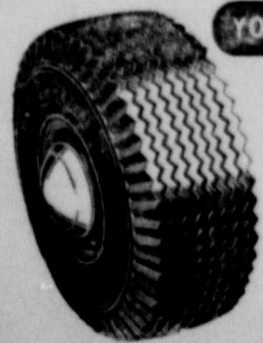

On Thursday of this week Rev. Postert will accompany the new altar boys to Abilene State Park for an all-day picnic.

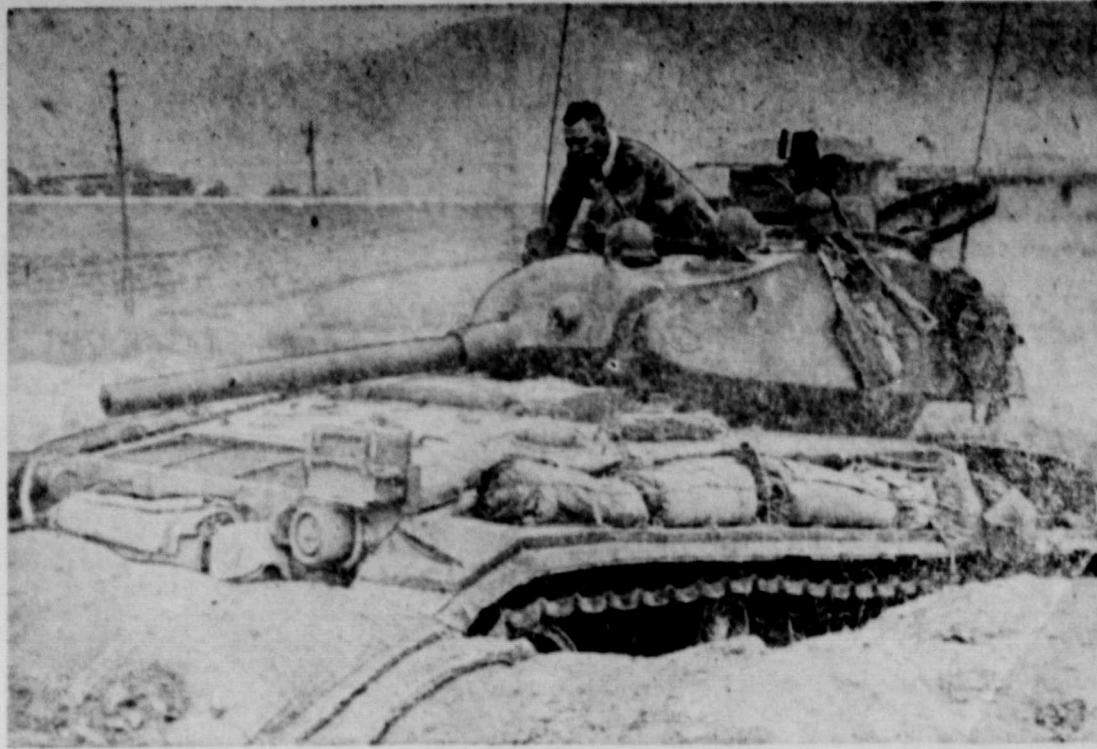

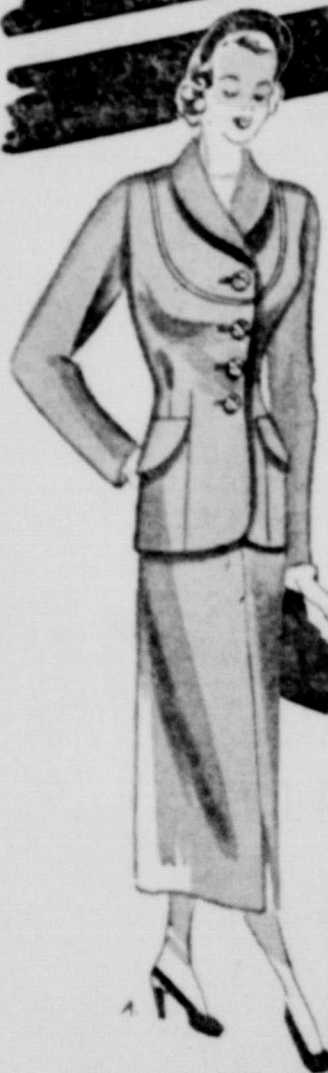
