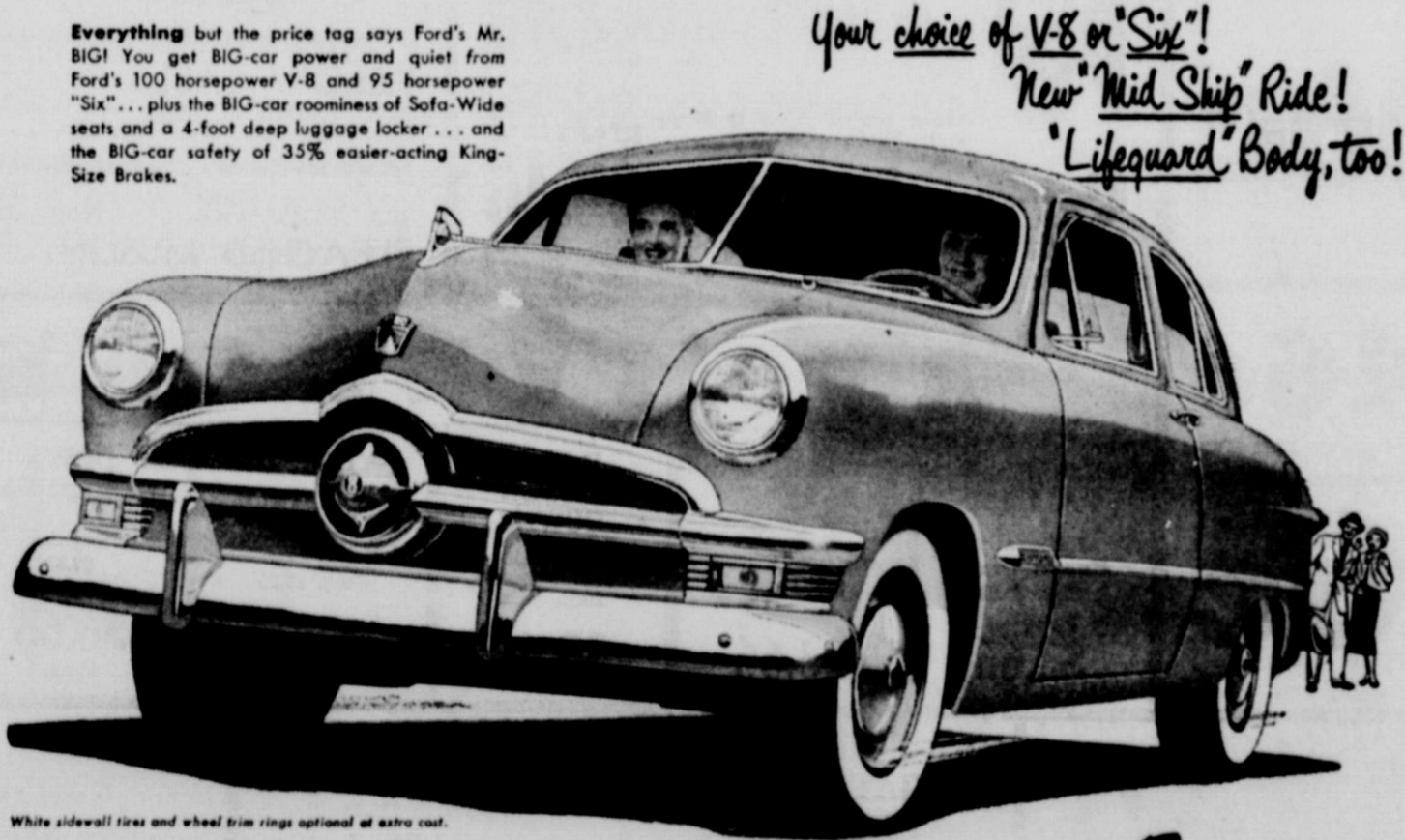

### PERMITS SAID NECESSARY IN EMPLOYING CHILDREN

County Judge E. C. Grindstaff has been advised by M. B. Morgan, commissioner of the bureau of labor statistics, that businessmen of Texas who expect to employ a child under the age of 15 years during the approaching school term, must take certain steps to comply with the child labor law of Texas.

Merchants who employ a child under the age of 15 must keep posted on the premises a child labor permit. These permits are procured from the county judge after certain proofs are presented to him. These proofs usually determine the child's age, that he has completed the fifth grade, a physician's certificate that the child's health is good or adequate, and that the parents are in economic stress.

Those who willfully fail to observe the requirements of the law are subject to fine or imprisonment in the county jail.
