

## Clean-Up Crews Expect To Haul Much Rubbish

Workers of the Ballinger fire department, chamber of commerce, city and a group of local women met Friday morning at the chamber of commerce office to lay plans for an immediate clean-up campaign. They asked that workers start at once and to urge every citizen of Ballinger in person to have his premises clean by tonight.

The city was divided into thirteen sections and a chairman put in charge of each area to make personal calls and direct the work. A committee called on every business firm and asked all who had pickups or trucks to contribute their use this afternoon for free hauling and also requested every firm to provide one worker to assist in loading and unloading the trucks.

Starting tomorrow, all yards,

alleys, streets and vacant property will be inspected and any found in an unclean condition will be reported to the health officer and city police.

The emergency campaign was decided on after several cases of polio developed. A similar campaign was conducted over a year ago and was very successful. Every effort is being put forth by the many workers to make this cover every piece of property inside the corporate limits.

Charles Webb, of the fire department, is the general chairman and has the campaign well organized. He stated the job would not be over when the trash was hauled off, but that this special event would also serve as a city-wide inspection for business men to determine how much more work was necessary.

## Home Demonstration Clubs Making United Nations Flags

October 24 has been designated as United Nations Day and the home demonstration clubs of Runnels county have set a goal for this county to have a United Nations flag flying in every community. Miss Ollie Chenoweth, county home demonstration agent, stated Monday that thirteen flags would be made by the clubs and that several public programs would be held with the raising of the flag for the climax.

One program will be at the court house in Ballinger where the flag will be formally presented and raised over the building.

The United Nations flag is blue like a Texas sky and Texas bluebonnets. There is a white globe in the center and this is circled with a wreath of peace.

Many stitches are going into the making of these flags and each stitch will be a prayer for the success of the United Nations for one world and for peace.

The purpose of the United Nations flag is to bring the organization closer home to all Americans. It is hoped that the United Nations flag making program will encourage a better and more uni-

fied understanding by each group and individual, as an instrument through which free people may jointly express their determination to remain free. Club women making these flags have expressed the hope that the flag making program will provide a means for women and girls to express in a tangible way, their desire to contribute to the United Nations and the United States in their efforts for peace.

The program is sponsored by a national citizens' committee, headed by M. L. Wilson, director of extension work for the United States department of agriculture. Home demonstration agents in each county have been made responsible for the program and the ceremonies which will be held in presenting the flags.

Kits for use in making flags have been ordered and will be in Miss Chenoweth's office within a short time. One flag has been completed which will be used as a model. The program has been explained to all clubs and each one will be responsible for making one flag and seeing that it is flown in the community on October 24.

## County Home Demonstration Council Hears Club Reports

Mrs. Claude Simmons, chairman of the finance committee, stated that \$831.35 has been collected for the calendar which is being printed at this time.

Mrs. Neuman Smith gave the 3-E report. Reporting for the marketing committee, Mrs. Joe Thomas stated that sateen for down comforts could be had locally for 89 cents a yard.

Mrs. Marion Hays, of the recreation committee, expressed appreciation to the clubs for preparing and presenting skits at the rally day.

Mrs. Hedrick Shelbourne asked that the council and home demonstration clubs continue to back the 4-H clubs of the county.

All twelve clubs were represented at roll call. Nine clubs favored a county tour instead of the usual exhibit this fall. All clubs reported that new officers had been elected.

The Drasco club held a shower recently for its club house and it was also reported that a new cabinet had been built and new screens added.

The East Side club will sell Christmas cards. Members made the first United Nations flag as a model and had it on display at the council meeting.

The Norton club sponsored a

shower for the homemaking cottage and the lunch room of the Norton school.

The Friendly Neighbors club had a demonstration on care of the feet and the proper use of cosmetics.

The Oifen club held a social and 42 party.

The Rowena club made \$42.85 by presenting a three-act play.

The South Ballinger club had two all-day meetings and made trays. Miss Chenoweth demonstrated the use of cereals.

The Victory club invited all members on the county tour to bring their lunches and eat with them at the home of Mrs. Glen Eager.

Mrs. Chester Busher read a letter from a woman in Japan thanking the club for the box of clothing and books which the Victory club sent early this year.

The Winters club had a demonstration on cereals and the making of Boston bread.

The Crews club made \$25.30 selling ice cream and sandwiches at a community skating party. This club had an ironing demonstration by Mrs. Thos. Egan, of Rowena, and made 25 trays and 2 shag rugs.

The club tour this year is planned for the purpose of showing members, non-club members and county officials how agents and helping rural women improve homes, landscapes and yards and make possible better gardens. Each club will turn in a list of what it has to exhibit and the 3-E committee will decide where stops will be made.

Each club in the county will make a United Nations flag to be flown from public buildings on October 24. On that date a flag raising ceremony will be staged in several places in the county. The purpose is to make people more aware of world conditions and arouse new interest in civic affairs. The flag will have a blue field, a white map of the world in the center, surrounded by a white olive branch. The blue of the field stands for bravery, the white for purity and the olive wreath for peace.

## 14,000 Bales Cotton Ginned in County; Crop About Half In

Cotton ginnings in Runnels to Wednesday noon were slightly above 14,000. This report was tabulated on reports gathered from the gins of the county.

Ginners estimated the crop was half gathered at this time and at least several more weeks of fast movement is assured. The report indicated that pickers were plentiful and that cotton was opening fast.

The southern portion of the county had actual ginnings of 6,503 bales Wednesday noon.

Boys exhibiting animals will also leave Sunday for Dallas and will remain there until after the judging and sale.

A large number of boys from the county, in the two organizations, will attend 4-H club and F. F. A. day at the fair this week-end.

The purpose of the ecumenical register is to make sure that every protestant woman has an opportunity to become a part of this great united movement and also to be able to present the names of the first million women to the fifth national assembly of the United Council of Church Women at Cincinnati, November 13 to 16.

Each woman registering is asked to contribute one dollar as a symbol of the gift of self to the ecumenical movement. This will make possible some goals of the United Church Women within the new national council of the Churches of Christ in America.

Ballinger women working on this special registration have met with excellent response and as a result many names will be turned in from here. The active council here is recognized as one of the strongest in this part of the state.

## PMA Committee Urges Farmers Buy U. S. Bonds

The Runnels county PMA committee, composed of M. W. McShan, Earl L. Black and John G. Onken, has sent a letter to every farmer in this county urging him to purchase United States savings bonds as an investment.

The letter compliments farmers and ranchmen for their efforts during World War II when they produced great quantities of food and fiber and for their efforts today in helping to secure the peace.

They remind farmers that today is a period of inflation and high income and suggest that now is the time for farmers to get in good financial condition by spending wisely, buying only what they need and avoiding speculation.

They ask that purchases of bonds be made which will pay 3 1/2 per cent in ten years and remind their readers that when prices go down, the money from these savings bonds will buy more land and more equipment than the same number of dollars today.

## Wool-Mohair Contest Open to Girls of Area

Entry blanks for the fourth annual "Make It Yourself—With Wool" contest may be obtained from Mrs. Theo Griffin, area chairman, of Coleman; or from Mrs. Henry Newman, of Coleman.

The contest is sponsored by the women's auxiliary of the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers' Association, and is planned to interest girls in sewing with wool and mohair fabrics.

The deadline for entries is October 15 and the area contest will include entries from Runnels, Coleman, Brown, Mills, McCulloch, Concho and Callahan counties. Entries must be sent in before the closing date.

Cash awards and merchandise prizes are offered. A contestant may enter as many as four different classifications in the area competition, including a coat, a dress, a suit and an original design. Only one of these garments may be entered in the state and national contests. The garment must be made of 100 per cent wool or 50 per cent mohair and may not be worn until after the state contest is held.

### Contractor Here To Make Estimate On Swimming Pool

### LIVESTOCK SALE BRINGS TOP PRICES TO OWNERS

A large crowd was on hand Tuesday afternoon for the sale of livestock at the Ballinger Auction Barn. Total sales grossed \$21,000 when 225 head of cattle, 100 sheep and a few hogs were put through the ring.

A number of out-of-town buyers were present and the bidding was fast and strong during the afternoon. Top prices for cows and calves were \$345, fat calves brought 29 1/2 cents, bologna bulls 23 cents, and hogs sold from 18 to 21 cents.

The Texas railroad commission has set up drilling restrictions for the West Ballinger field on the watershed of the city water reservoir on Valley Creek. A request was filed with the railroad commission by the city ten days ago and was submitted at the commission meeting October 2. A letter from Harry M. Batis, chief supervisor is as follows:

"This is to advise you that the matter of protecting the Ballinger city lake and its watershed was presented to the commission at a formal conference held on October 2.

"We have today instructed our district supervisor, E. C. Simpson, of San Angelo, Texas, that he must see that all operators in the future drilling of wells in the watershed must place sufficient surface casing in the wells to protect all fresh water and that the operators must cease using pits in which to dispose of salt water as soon as they can drill injection wells to return this water to the salt water producing reservoirs."

City officials are advertising for bids for oil and gas leases on city property at the lake site or for drilling contracts. Advertisements must be carried for three weeks to comply with the law and bids will be opened on October 26 for consideration by the city commission. The city would lease about 480 acres of land which is included in the lake site.

The Davis-King No. 1-Turner was gauged the past week-end at more than 800 barrels daily and this has caused the West Ballinger field to become a hot spot.

Good progress is being made on the Davis-King No. 1-D. R. Russell, east offset to the Turner producer, and pay depth is due to be reached this week. Much interest is centered in this well.

E. K. and E. M. Burt No. 1-I. M. Turner has been located, and drilling is to start at once. It is south and west of the discovery.

Davis-King No. 2-Turner has been staked for a 4,500-foot rotary test. Several other slush pits have been prepared for drilling operations in the field.

Robinson-Puckett No. 1-T. B. Poe was finished this week for a daily production of 412 barrels in the field southwest of Winters.

Anderson & Reynolds No. 1-Campbell has been started for a 4,400-foot test on the Hugh Campbell place north of Ballinger. Drilling equipment was moved in the past week-end and tours were begun Tuesday.

Operators on the John A. Messinger No. 1-Mrs. Nora Jones, north of the Winters Strawn field, were preparing to gauge production after an oil strike in the Gardner sand at 4,089 feet.

The Strake No. 1-Mary L. Stubblefield, in the Fort Chaboudine field, is also ready for a gauge of production.

It is believed the clean-up campaign will eliminate many fire hazards but there are other ever-present dangers which must constantly be brought to the attention of the public.

A. chapters will exhibit their best sheep, hogs and calves, and their leaders are well pleased with the progress made by the boys in their feeder projects. In addition to the animals ready for the Dallas show, the boys have a large number of others which are being groomed for the spring shows. In previous years these boys made some excellent records and even better showings are expected this year.

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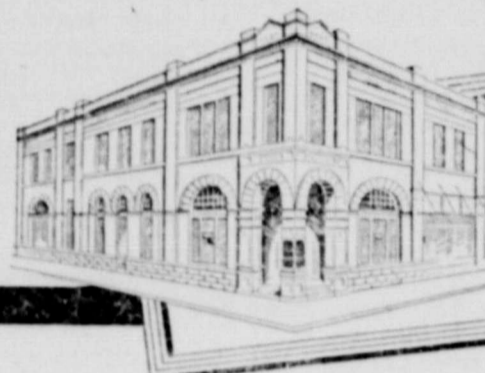

After the business period secret pals for the past three months were revealed and gifts exchanged. Mrs. Earl Wade was received as a new member.

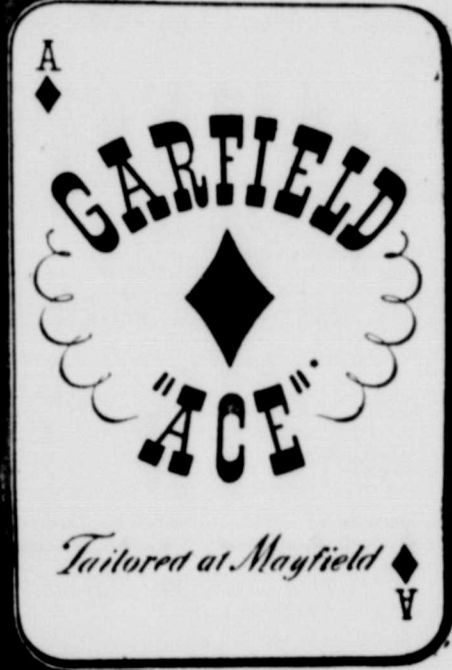

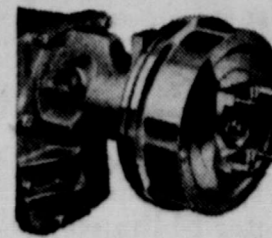

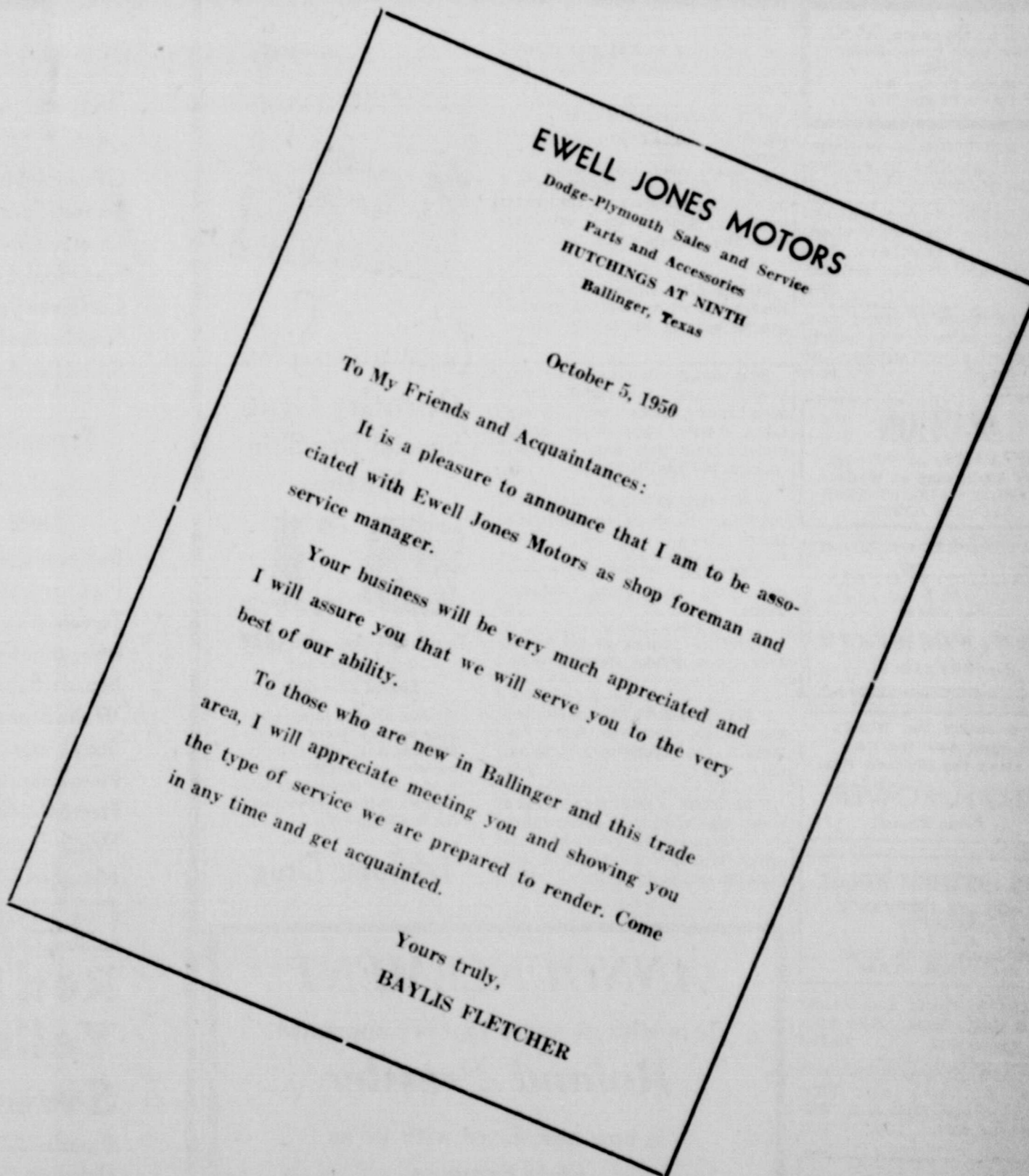
