

## Most of County Gets Heavy Rains Monday

Rains, ranging from half an inch to five inches and more, fell in Runnels county Monday afternoon and night, bringing a measure of relief from one of the longest droughts in the history of the county.

Notton, Miles and some communities in the southern portion of the county are still in need of moisture, getting only half an inch and less.

At Ballinger the government gauge measured a total of 1.76 inches Tuesday morning, while just a short distance north 3 to 4 inches fell.

The precipitation was light on the upper watershed of Valley Creek and little water was received in the new Ballinger lake. The creek was barely running Tuesday morning, but from 1 1/2 to 2 inches fell in the lake vicinity.

Runnels and Hatchel got 4 inches each and about the same was reported at Talpa. Elm Creek was on a big rise, water

pouring over the spillway at the old city lake before night Monday.

All the Winters section got heavy rains. The big city lake there was filled Monday night and water ran around the spillway Tuesday.

Many stockmen, who had been without water for some time, received a supply. Some ranch tanks were filled and others reported catching from 4 to 6 feet of water.

The moisture will be sufficient for planting in some areas but other sections still need moisture before putting seed in the ground.

The Ballinger Country Club lake, very low before the rain, was reported full Tuesday, but water did not run over the spillway.

A shower totalling .06 of an inch fell in Ballinger Wednesday night and was sufficient to again wet the top of the ground. No reports were received this morning from other points in the county.

## Four Cases Filed In Local Courts

A charge of poisoning medicine with intent to injure or kill his wife was filed Saturday against E. H. Hensley. The case developed the first of the week when Mrs. Hensley brought a bottle of Hadacol to Sheriff Don Atkins to be analyzed.

She told of taking a dose of the medicine Sunday night and the unpleasant taste caused her not to swallow it. She also became suspicious of the lighter colors of the medicine, which she had been taking for some time.

An analysis of the medicine revealed a large content of cyanide. When this information was received, Hensley was arrested and was taken to Austin Friday to submit to a lie-detector test. While at Austin he "loosened up," telling officers that he purchased the poison to kill red ants and had a small amount left. This he put in the medicine.

Defendant, who has been living in Ballinger about a month, was employed by a drilling concern. His bond has been set at \$5,000.

The annual parent-and-son banquet for the Ballinger Future Farmers of America was held last Thursday night, about 100 boys and 200 parents and other guests attending.

The boys were assisted by members of the homemaking department in serving a full barbecue dinner at the school cafeteria. Following the dinner, a program was presented which reflected the fine record made by the chapter during the past school year.

David Fowler, retiring president, presided for the program. After the opening ceremony, guests were welcomed by Bob Ransbarger, and Weldon Lange told of the accomplishments of the chapter during the past year. Lange stated that the chapter has a membership of 110 and that during the past twelve years training has been given to more than 800 boys and that the chapter now lists 24 Lone Star farmers.

Dr. E. R. Alexander, head of the vocational education department of A. & M. College, was presented by R. A. Hanson as the guest speaker. Dr. Alexander stated that his long association with young men in agriculture had taught him something about them. He stated that learning agriculture from books was only part of the training, that taking that knowledge and trying it on the farm and ranch and in the feed lot was where the real education began.

**INSTRUCTIONS GIVEN FOR NOTARIES PUBLIC**

County Clerk Frankie Berryman has received notification from the office of Secretary of State John Ben Shepperd on the procedure to be followed in the reappointment of qualified notaries public whose terms expire June 1, and the appointment of new notaries. The reappointment of all presently qualified notaries of Runnels County will be made by

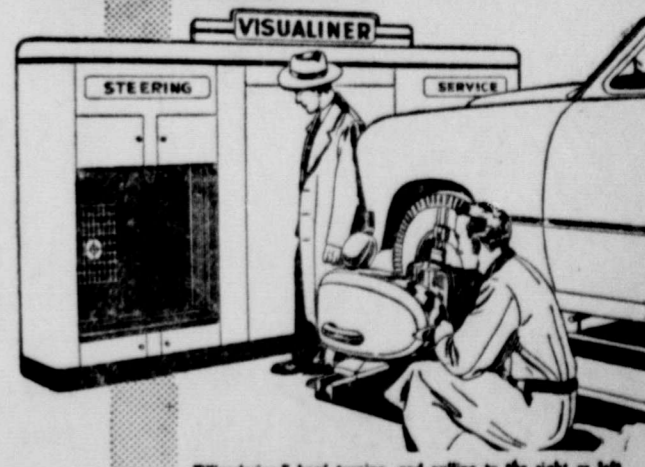
Secretary of State Shepperd on May 20, and each reappointed notary must qualify with the County Clerk on June 1, file oath and bond and pay the statutory filing fee to the Clerk in order to serve as a qualified notary for the new term, June 1, 1951 to June 1, 1953. After all reappointed notaries have qualified, the clerk will forward Certificates of Qualification and filing fees to the Secretary of State. Individual notaries are not to send money to the State Office.

Terms of all presently qualified notaries expire on June 1, and a notary cannot qualify for the 1951-53 term before that date, irrespective of reappointment or new appointment.

Persons applying through the County Clerks for notary appointments for the first time will receive appointments, effective on the date of qualification. A Certificate of Appointment on each person applying for the first time will be sent to the Secretary of State for approval and then returned to the County Clerk, after which the person will be notified to appear within 10 days to qualify before the Clerk.

In the instructions received from Shepperd, he stated, "An applicant must be 21 years of age or older and a resident of the county in which he intends to act as a notary. It is important that the exact name of the applicant be given and that this name be used on all documents signed by the person. He must also give his correct mailing address."

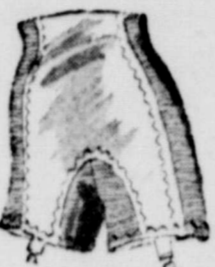

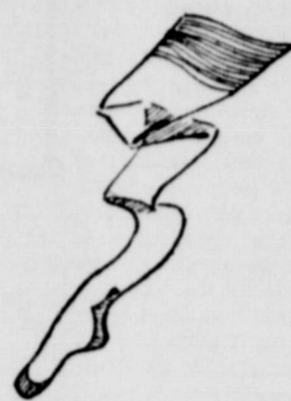

Ballinger now has two new school buildings almost completed. The negro school and the new elementary building are finished except for installing lockers and a few light fixtures. Both are strictly modern in every respect and will be occupied when the term opens next September. The necessary furniture is in storage here and will be installed during the summer. The big expansion of the Ballinger district plus the moving here of many new citizens creates a problem for some time to come. The new buildings will relieve the crowded condition in classrooms for the present but in the near future an overload is anticipated in the high school. This year 96 freshmen have been registered and will move into high school next fall. All upper classes after another year will be large and present facilities will be taxed to the limit. A lunch room is necessary for the new elementary and junior high school and advance plans must be made to cover the growth of the system.

Ballinger people are realizing more than ever just how much the oil fields of the county mean. With one of the most severe droughts in history, business has held fairly steady. The announcement of the wild-cat stockpile to be located here is also good news. It will be

the only source of pipe in this section and will bring operators and supply people here from distances of fifty and sixty miles to get pipe for wildcat wells. Operators and drillers who reside in Ballinger are playing a big part in the growth and development of the town. They are making good citizens and mean much to the general progress shown in this area.

Contractors on the Ballinger sewer extensions have started a general clean-up to put alleys and streets back in good condition. Graders were put in the alleys last week and many tons of dirt and rock have been moved. Citizens who have torn up places that need attention are asked to notify the city hall. A crew is here this week topping and patching pavement. Some streets are to be surfaced the full width, while others will have only the two-foot space which was broken for a line replaced. Ballinger firemen and the chamber of commerce clean-up committee remind citizens that this is a good time to cooperate and see that their premises are put in the best of condition.

A contract was awarded last week by the Brownwood housing authority for the construction of 14 units for negroes on the low bid of \$93,900. Separate contractors are now working on

50 units for whites on West Commerce Street at a cost of approximately \$400,000. All units are of brick veneer and have from two to four bedrooms. These will be in addition to units completed during the past three years.

Improvements, costing \$200,000, are being made in the Comanche county REA. The money will be spent in all sections of the seven-county area served by the co-op. The Comanche system was organized in 1938 and now supplies electric service for 5,900 farms and ranches. It has 2,597 miles of lines and ranks as one of the largest co-ops in the state. A total of \$90,000 has been earmarked for construction of an office and warehouse at Comanche.

Broadcast: May 26, 1951

- 1 cup sifted all-purpose flour
- 1/2 teaspoon baking powder
- 1/2 cup cocoa
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 cup soft shortening
- 1 teaspoon vanilla
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 1 beaten egg
- 1/2 cup Pet Milk
- 3 cups corn flakes

Sift together flour, baking powder, cocoa and salt. Put shortening and vanilla into bowl. Add sugar gradually, mixing until light and fluffy. Beat in egg. Add 1/2 of flour mixture, beating until smooth. Stir in 1/2 of milk. Add 1/2 of rest of flour; mix well. Stir in rest of milk. Add flour that is left and mix well. Fold in corn flakes, a cup at a time. Drop by heaping teaspoons on greased baking sheet 2 inches apart. Bake in moderately slow oven (350) 15 min., or until brown. Remove from pan at once. Makes 4 doz.
