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Gottschalk Producer; Second Well Started

Murray Petroleum Co. No. 1-Dorothy Gottschalk, four miles northwest of Ballinger, was completed the past week, flowing at the rate of 250 barrels a day. The new producer is approximately 3/4 of a mile west of the Nettie Currie Palo Pinto field opener.

Operators have set up two large storage tanks at the well and removed drilling equipment to one location north and started No. 2-Gottschalk. Swap Oil Co. and T. W. Murray No. 1-Ed Lindemann has been completed for a McMillan sand discovery. Daily flowing potential is 176 barrels of 43.4 gravity oil with perforations from 2,490 to 2,494 feet.

Union Sulphur No. 3T-R. Miller, in the Cree-Sykes lower Gardner field, has been finished for a 24-hour flow of 246.61 barrels of 42.3 gravity oil. Top of pay is 4,111 feet.

Jim Murray and others No. 6-M. R. Rogers, in the Nora Gardner field, was brought in the past week-end for 130.12 barrels of 45.1 gravity oil. Production is from perforations 4,080 to 4,084 feet.

Humble No. 13D-Sallie Odum,

Fort Chadbourne field, flowed 388.47 barrels of 46.1 gravity oil when completed at 5,400 feet. J. K. Dobbs No. 7-Freeman was completed for 72 barrels a day of 41 gravity crude. Casing was cemented at 4,135 feet.

Mid-Continent No. 11-Earl Burns, Cree-Sykes upper Gardner field, flowed 240.06 barrels of 41 gravity oil when finished at a depth of 4,075 feet.

American Trading & Production Corp. No. 1-Dietz Brothers, seven miles southwest of Crews, is slated to be drilled to 4,200 feet.

American Trading & Production Corp. No. 2-E. W. Bridwell is located seven miles southwest of Crews. It is projected for 4,200 feet.

The Hull-Dobbs field gained a location this week when the T. & P. Coal & Oil Co. No. 2-Mrs. G. L. Paxton, Sr., was staked and will go to 4,200 feet.

G. B. Cree No. 1-W. W. Dietz is a wildcat, 13 1/2 miles southeast of production in the Cree-Sykes field. Drilling will be with rotary equipment to 4,500 feet.

An amended location has been filed for the Sunray No. 1-Angela Arendal, wildcat, south-east of Rowena.

South Ballinger to Get Gas from Lone Star Line

A Lone Star Gas Co. construction crew started this week on an extension which will provide natural gas for a large number of people living in South Ballinger.

A six-inch line will be suspended across the Colorado River from the highway bridge and three-inch and two-inch lines will be run west along the Ballinger-San Angelo highway with service lines connected on North and South streets.

Mack Young, district manager, stated that the job would require coring under the highway at a number of places and

when completed would serve about 50 new customers. About 35 more will be able to get gas service later if they desire it.

For some time citizens of this section have been seeking gas service for homes and business houses. The new lines will make it possible to serve the entire area.

The company has a line that crosses the Colorado River four miles above town and extends to the airport. This line is too far west to make it feasible to supply South Ballinger and it will be left intact to serve only the airport facilities.

Charter Ceremony For Local Jaycees Scheduled Monday

Ballinger Jaycees will hold a special meeting Monday night, January 7, when the charter for national affiliation will be presented. President L. R. Rieger was in touch with the state president Monday of this week and was informed that either the state vice-president or the national director would be here to make the presentation.

Arrangements for the meeting will be made later in the week, but President Rieger stated it would be a dinner program for all members.

While the Ballinger Jaycees have been operating for some time, they have not been affiliated with the national organization. It was recently voted to ask for a charter and all requirements have been met. Retroactive January 1 the local chapter will operate as an affiliate of the national organization.

At the present the Ballinger organization has 48 members and a membership drive probably will be conducted soon.

Mr. Rieger urges that every local member make arrangements to attend the meeting Monday night. All will be notified of the time and place when details are perfected.

Selective Service Increases Number For January Call

The number of Texas draft registrants to be examined at armed forces stations in January has been raised from 1,880 to 4,271. Gen. Paul L. Wakefield, state selective service director, has announced.

The first part of December it was stated that 1,880 were to be examined but 2,391 were added by the Texas office just before Christmas.

The 2,391 men will be selected from those who have been examined before and failed to pass the mental tests. Under provisions of the 1951 amendments to the draft law, these men must be reexamined because of lowered mental standards now authorized as acceptable.

Included will be some whose liability for service under the draft law has been extended to the age of 35. Boards have been called upon not to order any registrant for reexamination who appears to be eligible for any other classification.

Lists of names will be published soon, when draft boards have had time to make them up.

Local Committee To Study New Plan On Swimming Pool

The Ballinger swimming pool committee will become active again this week and take steps to try to get construction of a pool started here in the near future. The project was dropped last year when a state committee on inflation and use of critical material cancelled the sale of bonds.

Information was received the first part of this week that new regulations will permit the construction of a pool provided not more than two tons of steel is required.

Members of the local committee have been studying other forms of construction and believe the Ballinger project can be built with a very small amount of steel by using brick, rock or tile.

Committee members will meet with the city commission and the bonding company which is obligated for the purchase of bonds. Ballinger citizens authorized the bond issue last year which will provide sufficient funds for building the pool.

While no definite statement can be made at this time, the committee will investigate every possible angle in an effort to get a contract let.

About Half Tax Accounts Paid Up to January 1

All local tax collecting offices had fair runs the first three months of the paying period and with one month remaining to pay current taxes it is estimated about half of the accounts remain unpaid.

The county and state office has had better payments than the city and school district due to discounts offered in October, November and December.

To Monday the city had collected \$35,079.20 of a total of \$76,193.20, leaving a balance of \$41,114.00 to be paid this month.

The Ballinger independent school district had collected about 60 per cent of the current taxes to Monday. This is about 10 per cent more than paid on the same date in 1950.

Local tax agencies are prepared for a rush during the latter part of January when many property owners are expected to pay. The county assessor-collector's office also expects to issue many poll tax receipts before the final date on January 31.

In order to reduce the last minute rush, employees will welcome tax payments early in January.

FIRE DAMAGES HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT LABORATORY

The Ballinger fire department was called to the state highway department warehouse on the Abilene highway Saturday morning to extinguish a blaze which threatened serious loss.

An oil stove exploded in the laboratory at the rear of the warehouse, starting a quick fire. Two trucks were rushed to the scene and water from booster tanks was used. A water tank from town arrived in time to provide about 600 additional gallons which was enough to put the blaze under control.

The damage is estimated at about \$2,000.

4 Local People Hurt In Highway Accidents

Mr. and Mrs. L. Daniels, of Norton, are in the Ballinger Clinic-Hospital as the result of injuries sustained in a traffic accident Wednesday about 7:45 p. m.

Mr. Daniels is still in a critical condition, as he was all through the night. The couple was returning home after a visit at Fort Worth. At the Valley Creek bridge, 7 miles west of Ballinger, the car hit ice and spun, leaving the bridge and going down the embankment. The couple remained at the roadside for several hours before anyone stopped. A num-

ber of trucks passed by but thought the car was entering a side road.

E. B. Clappitt and Leon Thomas were injured when their car skidded on an icy bridge and into a Continental bus, about nine miles east of San Angelo on highway 67 Wednesday night. Both Ballinger men are employees of the Spoons Drilling Co. and were en route to their jobs near Christoval.

Mr. Thomas, 55, suffered two broken ribs, and Mr. Clappitt, 50, was brought here, where his injury was revealed as a broken kneecap.

Housing Applications To be Taken Monday

John Rayburn, secretary of the Ballinger housing authority, will begin taking applications from tenants Monday and the 48 units under construction will be turned over to the authority some time this month.

All papers for tenants' applications have been printed and are ready to be signed. Mr. Rayburn will be at his office in the city hall to meet those who desire to lease apartments.

There are 40 units in the project located on the country club road, all for occupancy by white people, and there are eight units in the "flat" to be rented to negroes.

Only a small amount of work remains to be done by the contractor. The units contain apartments with from one to four bedrooms. Each unit has a complete bath, wall type heaters, built-in cabinets and closets, a range, Frigidaire and water heater. Other furnishings are to be provided by the tenant. All houses are connected with electricity, water and sewerage.

Mr. Rayburn stated that the authority would pay for use of all utilities and this would be included in the rentals. Electric, gas, water and trash removal bills are paid by the authority. Rent on the apartments will be 20 per cent of the family's earnings.

Eligible to make application and occupy the apartments are: Man and wife whose earnings are not more than \$1,800 a year. Man and wife and two children whose total earnings are not more than \$2,000 a year. Man and wife and three or more children whose total earnings are not more than \$2,300 a year.

Those receiving pensions or other government checks will not have this included in their income and will be eligible for occupancy of the apartments.

All who occupy the units must sign contracts with the authority.

Mr. Rayburn has received many requests for information on the apartments but will take no official applications until Monday, and then only from those who meet the requirements.

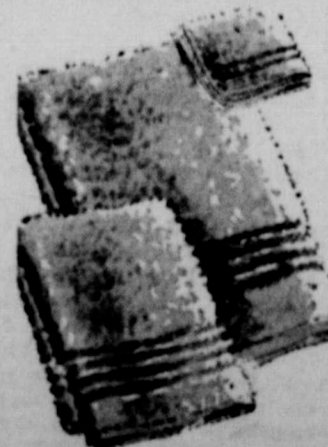

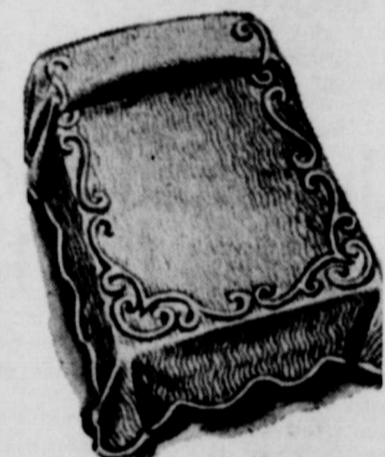

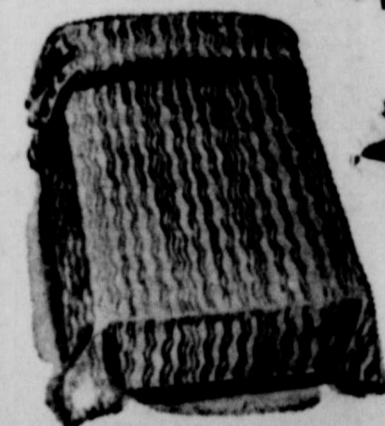

Remember you have just this month in which to visit the tax collector and get a poll tax receipt to make you an eligible voter in one of the most important election years in history. Poll tax payments have been declining for a number of years and in order to increase the number of qualified state-wide organizations are waging campaigns to make 1952 payments the highest in recent election years. There will be many important issues in which every good American citizen should want to have a part. A poll tax receipt, if you are under 60 years old, is necessary to cast a ballot. Don't wait until the last minute. Attend to this the next time you are in Ballinger.

Car owners are faced with two new pieces of legislation on which they should act at once. One of the new laws requires a complete inspection of the safety points of every motor vehicle before it can be registered. This inspection is a real one and many cars, thought to be in good condition, will not pass. More than half the cars, mechanics believe, will have to

be repaired and new parts added before an approval slip can be issued. No car can be registered until an approval slip is issued. Using a car not registered makes the owner liable to a \$500 fine or a jail sentence. The other new legislation is the driver responsibility law, which requires car owners to prove ability to pay claims for damages, injury or death, which might be caused in an accident in which the driver is at fault. Practically all motorists will purchase insurance which will protect them in such instances. The two new laws are designed to help reduce accidents on highways. Every car owner, or operator of any kind of motor vehicle who is not acquainted with these laws should investigate at once and meet the requirements. Unless inspections are begun at once, the job cannot be completed before registration time, and many will be deprived of the use of their cars.

Rannels countians are starting 1952 all wishing for the same thing, a rain. 1951 was considered a dry year and as a result very poor yields were made on cultivated acreage. With no rain during the fall, farmers and ranchmen face heavy feedings of livestock, barren pastures and no planting "season." 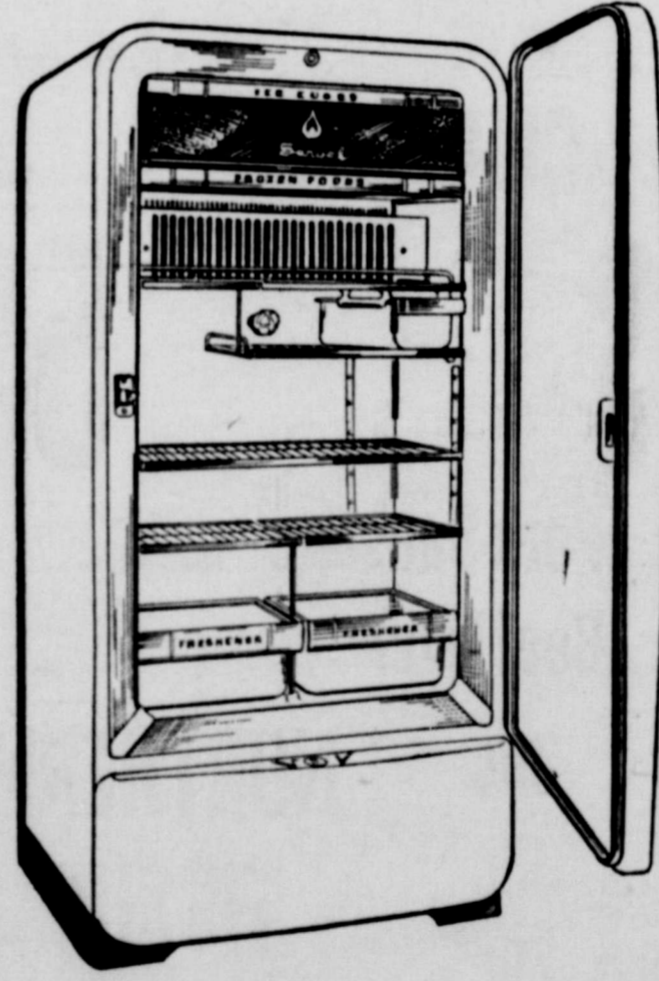

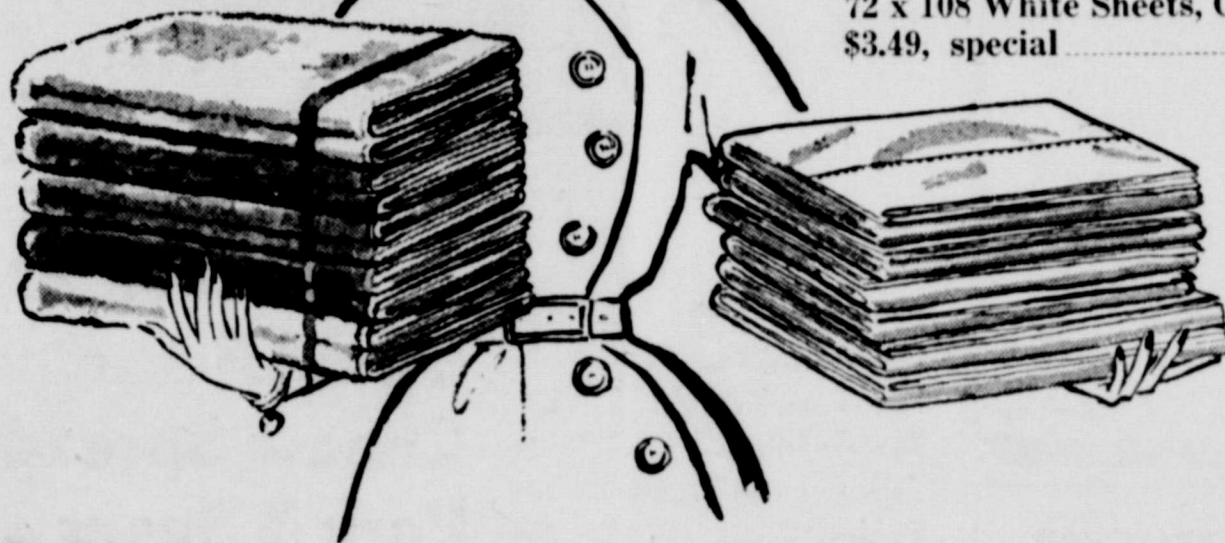

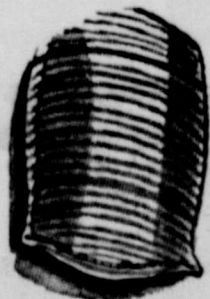
