Mrs. McCenny presented the program leader, Mrs. Malcolm Morgan, who introduced the Texas Day program and the speaker, F. A. Jernigan, superintendent of the Carver school.

"Negro Education in Texas" was the topic that Mr. Jernigan discussed. He stated that at the end of the Civil War only 10 per cent of the negro population could read and write, and now 90 per cent of them could read and write.

In speaking of the schools in Texas, Mr. Jernigan said that the first schools were called colleges and included grades one to twelve. The first state college was established at Prairie View in 1878, and this college became a class A college in 1921. In 1947 it was changed from a normal to Prairie View A. & M. Most early Texas negro educators came from Prairie View College or the Texas College at Houston. Last summer Prairie View College had 2,000 teachers attending summer school, and the Texas College at Houston had 1,200 students in attendance.

Mr. Jernigan discussed the problems in negro schools. First, he said, the negro teacher should take advantage of the extension college service, and should attend better colleges, which would make them better teachers. Second, parents should be more concerned about their children's education. Third, parents should see the need of balanced meals and let children eat in the lunch room.

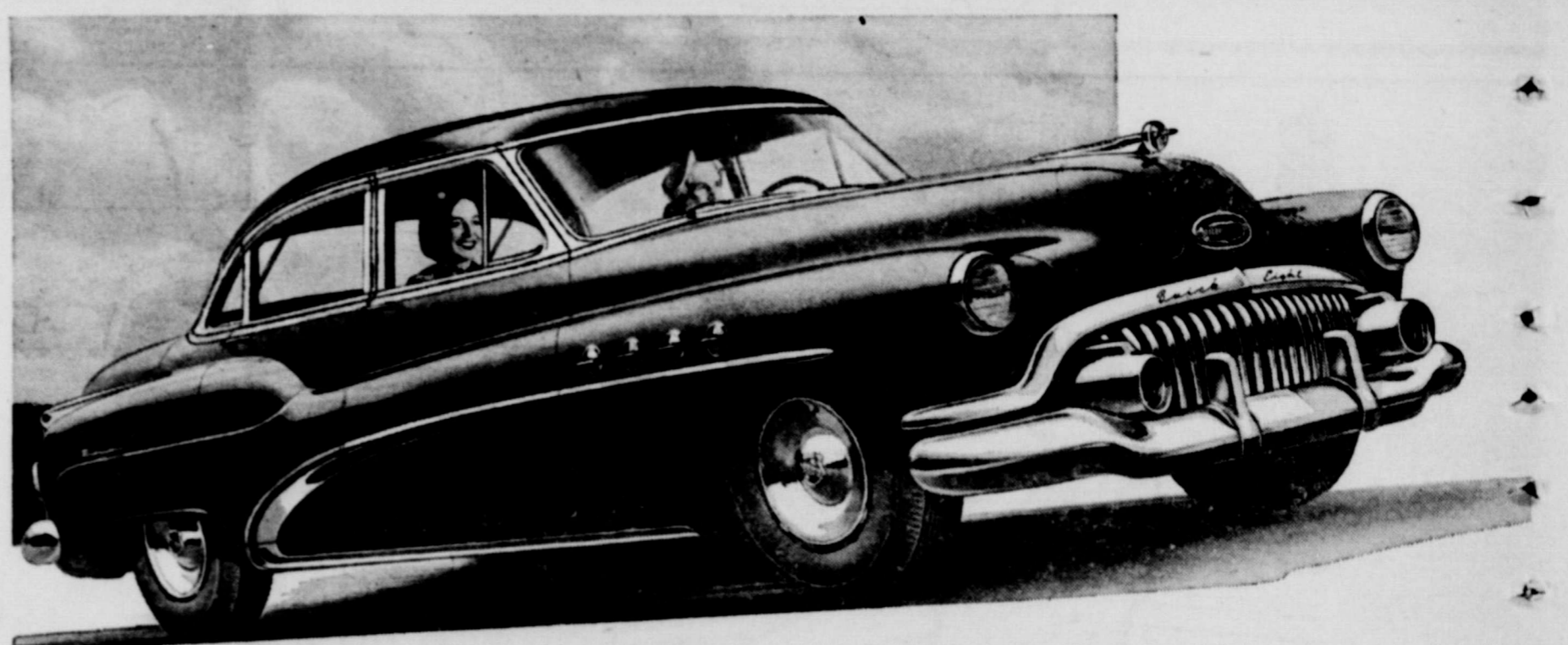

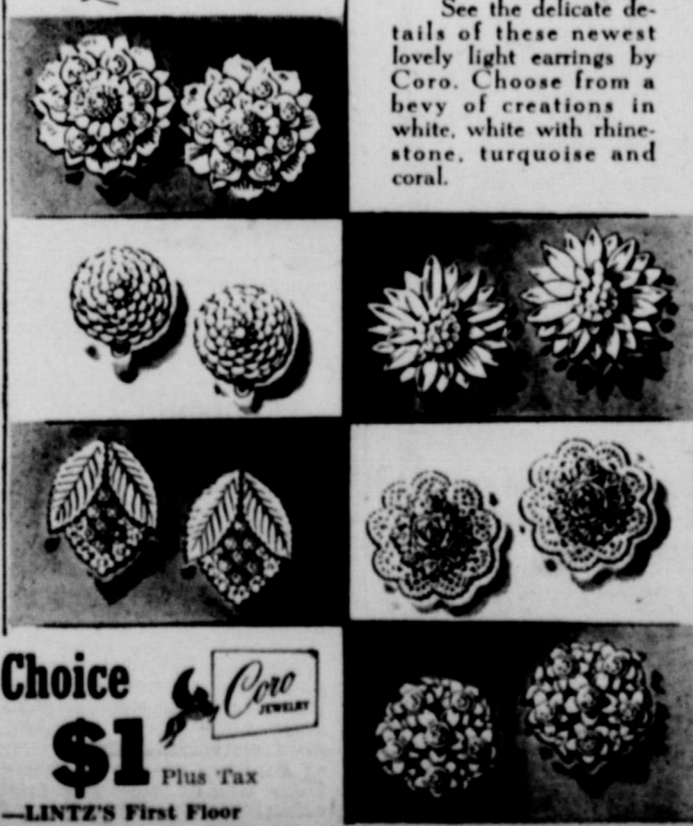

She has learned the correct way of setting the sleeves in her garment and to press the seams as she sews.

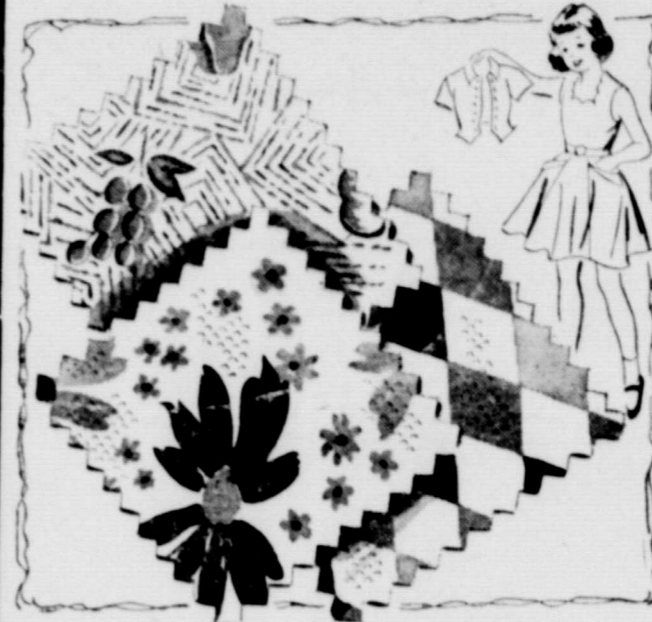
