Swimming Pool Bonds Restraints Rescinded

A swimming pool for Ballinger loomed again this week as finally becoming a reality. Mayor J. W. Moore received a telegram from the state credit restraint committee releasing the bonds for sale which would make possible the construction of the pool.

The telegram is as follows: "In view of lifting today of voluntary credit restraint restrictions on municipal financing, you are now free to sell your \$60,000 park improvement bonds which were disapproved last September." The telegram was signed by John H. Rauscher, Southwestern Investment Banking Voluntary Credit Restraint Committee.

Ballinger citizens last year voted \$60,000 to be spent in the construction of a swimming pool and other park improvements. The sale of the bonds was disapproved at that time

and an effort early this year also met with disfavor.

The Central Investment Co., of Dallas, has a contract to buy the bonds. They prepared all election papers and supplies and now have the right to purchase the bonds.

City officials will confer with a citizens' committee in regard to location, letting of contract and other details. It is planned to move as fast as possible but action must await the visit of a representative of the bond purchasing house before it can be determined how much time will be required to prepare the bonds, secure state approval and actually receive money.

A number of contractors have contacted the city and are ready to submit estimates on any size or shape pool. A number of these have ample materials on hand to complete the project.

The complete program will be arranged this week and will be published in The Ledger next Thursday. The exact hour will be given as well as the speaker and others to take part.

All citizens of this section are given a special invitation to attend. The service will be concluded in plenty of time for those attending to get their breakfast and go to their churches for the first service of the day.

South Half of County Nears Red Cross Goal

Red Cross workers in the southern part of Runnels county are striving to reach the quota by the end of this week and close the campaign. Chairmen met the first of the week to tabulate all returns and make plans for raising the remainder.

To date Ballingerites have donated a total of \$2,627.98 and efforts are being made to top \$3,000 this week. Ballinger Rotary Club members responded to an appeal at their meeting Tuesday, giving an additional \$47. Members of the Lions Club will be asked to help at their meeting tomorrow.

During the week the Open committee turned in \$90 and the drive there has not been completed.

Rosena workers have passed their quota of \$300, turning in a total of \$306.50.

Spring Hill, with a quota of

\$40, had contributed \$54.50 the first of the week.

A considerable amount has been raised at Miles but none has been turned in yet, and several other communities in the southern half of Runnels county will have small sums to report by the end of the week.

Local committeemen believe the southern section of the county must donate about \$250 more to meet the quota and they are appealing to everyone to help. Part of the money being raised will be sent at once to the six-state tornado-stricken region where many people have been left homeless.

A report from Winters yesterday afternoon showed a total of \$1,550 had been raised in the northern half of the county. This section needs to meet a goal of \$2,150 to put the county over the top.

The annual daughter, son and mother banquet of the homemaking classes will be held tomorrow night. This year a number of boys are taking this course and will be included in the festivities.

A basketball game is to be played between faculty members and high school players next Monday night. This contest will have extra comedy features and is expected to attract a large crowd.

On Tuesday, April 8, the science club will have its annual picnic.

On Thursday, April 10, the army and air force will present a special program for senior boys in the high school auditorium at 10:30 a. m.

Friday, April 11, will be a holiday for all local students. An extra day is taken each year for the Easter week-end. School facilities have been reserved for the meeting of the Runnels County Teachers' Association on April 14.

The annual spring concert by the Ballinger Bearcat band will be presented to the public on the night of April 15. On April 18 the band will hold its annual banquet and on April 19 will go to Abilene to participate in the regional contests.

The high school choral club will be in Brownwood April 19 for the regional meet.

Parking Meters Take in March Hits \$853 Total

Parking meters continued to do a good business in March, the take being counted at \$853.50. During the month 1,595 parking tickets were issued and on March 31 only 65 had not been returned. On tickets overdue where \$1 fines were levied, \$35 was collected.

Police reported four accidents within the city limits during March. A total of \$618.67 in damages to vehicles resulted. Eight arrests were made by Ballinger officers, one case being transferred to the county court. Five paid fines in full and \$68.50 was collected from the defendants. Two fines are still unpaid. Causes of arrests were: speeding, 2; no operator's license, 1; drunkenness, 1; reckless driving, 1.

Radio calls received at the city office during the month totaled 526.

Two fires were reported in March. Insurance loss on the Loyd Herring fire was \$9,060, and the loss on the Henry Moody fire Monday night has not been determined.

Salvation Army Sent \$50 Check To Serve Troops

The Ballinger chapter of the Salvation Army has been called on to aid organization workers in their efforts in connection with the troops in "Operation Longhorn." A check for \$50 was mailed yesterday to Salvation Army headquarters at Dallas as the Ballinger contribution.

The Salvation Army did not include anything in its 1952 budget for the big army maneuvers and after entering the field found the task bigger than it could handle without more resources. Not wishing to make a second drive for money from the general public, city chapters were asked to assist.

The Texas division of the Salvation Army has been serving the soldiers for more than a month with coffee, doughnuts, sandwiches, writing material, postage, and other items.

Engaged in the maneuvers are about 150,000 men, many of whom are returned Korean veterans and others youths who have been inducted for only a short time.

MARINE RECRUITER TO BE IN BALLINGER SATURDAY

T-Sgt. Jack Harmon, of the marine corps recruiting office, San Angelo, will be in Ballinger Saturday to accept applications for the spring "buddy squad" of volunteers who will leave San Angelo on April 15.

An innovation in the usual leatherneck enlistment offers is the new regular enlistment for six years. Other regular enlistments are for three and four years.

Sgt. Harmon stresses the need for women in the corps. Women must be between the ages of 18 and 31, high school graduates and single. They will be trained at Parris Island, South Carolina. The recruiter will headquarter at the local post office.

2 New Locations For Palo Pinto Ballinger Field

Oil activities in Runnels county the past week were below normal, there being only a few completions and a limited number of new locations.

Slick-Moorman Oil Co. has staked two locations in the Ballinger Palo Pinto field.

This company's No. 4-Nettie Currie will be 2,104 feet from the north and 330 feet from the east lines of H. R. Bradford survey 164, one location north and one location south-west of production. Approval is for a 5,000-foot well with rotary equipment.

Slick-Moorman No. 5-Nettie Currie will be 1,171 feet from the north and 330 feet from the east lines of H. R. Bradford survey 164, one location north and one location south-west of production.

Sheets & Walton Drilling Co. has approval for a 4,000-foot well, to be known as the No. 1-Lena Clayton. It is 9 miles east of Ballinger and 3 1/2 miles west of production in the Leonard field.

Miami Operating Co. No. 1-Lynn Stokes will be drilled to a depth of 4,200 feet. The location is 4 miles northeast of Ballinger.

Clark & Cowden Producing Co. No. 1-H. P. Morrison is projected for 4,000 feet. It is located just south of Crews.

Humble No. 1-G. W. Poe has been designated as an opener of the Poe (Goens) field and has been assigned a daily allowable of 100 barrels of oil, exempt. This well was finished on March 21 and given a flowing potential of 408 barrels of 44.8 gravity oil.

1,394 Men Asked Of Draft Boards For Next Month

H. R. Wiesepape, member of the selection service board for Runnels and Coleman counties, has been notified that the May call for Texas will be 1,394 men. County quotas are being made up and expected to come from those 21 years of age.

The May 1951, call was for 1,332 men. Men to be inducted this month total 1,184.

During next month approximately 2,500 men will be sent in for physical examinations and mental tests. In addition 640 4Fs will be examined in April and given new ratings, and during the month 150 conscientious objectors will be called for examination. Those who pass physicals will be assigned to civilian jobs which they will be required to perform.

While calls through May are expected to be met with the 21-year-old class, the 20-year-old pool may have to be dipped into in some counties to meet quotas.

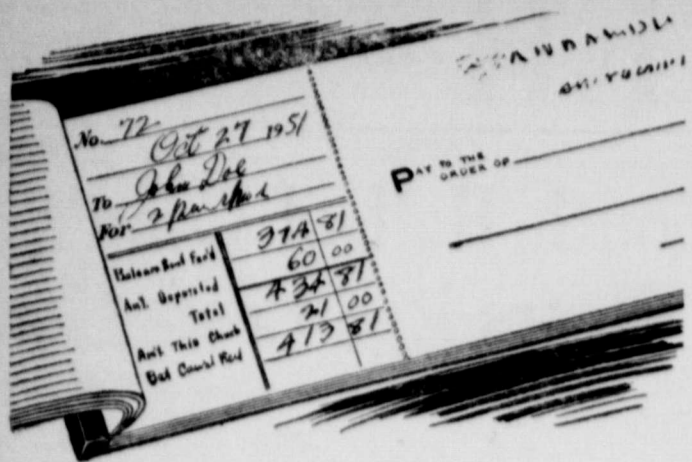
The officials also presented the proposed budget for the ensuing year and invited citizens to the budget hearing to be held at 9:30 a. m. April 7 at the city hall.

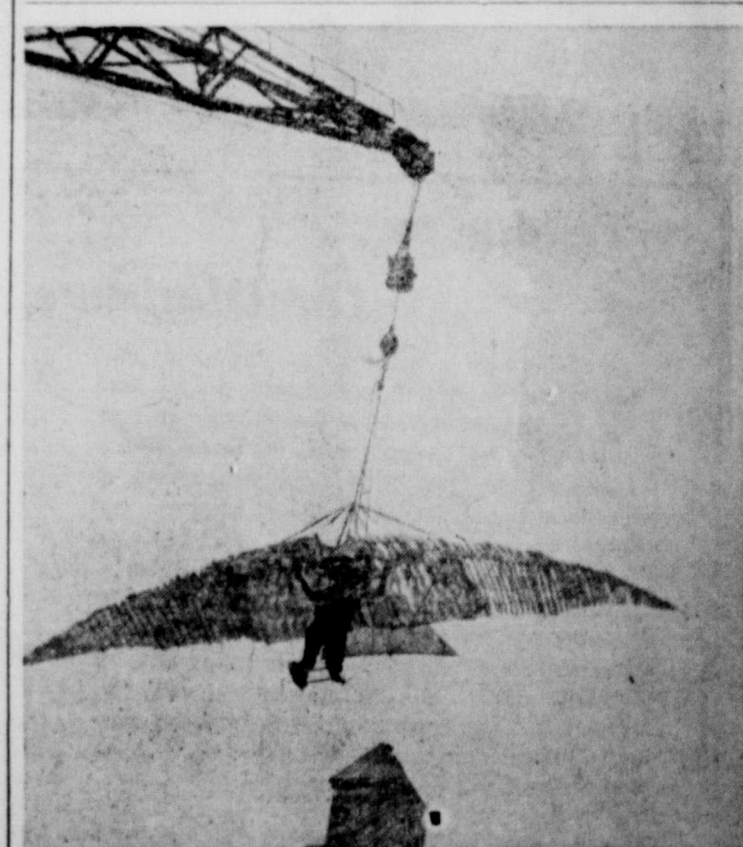
