

Frank Kelly, of Colorado City, . president of the West Texas Christian Pastor guest speaker at the meeting of the Ballinger Lions Club Friday noon. The speaker has been on the West Texas chamber's board for many years and has dévoted much time to the work of the organization's program in the interests of all West

The speaker began his remarks by stating that when Hitler took over Europe, he had little trouble taking big business but found his toughest opposition the civic clubs and preachers. These groups were complimented for the fine programs they are undertaking.

In pointing out the resources of West Texas Mr. Kelly mentioned land, water and oil. He told his audience that we can use the land, improve it from year to year and turn it over to the next generation better than it was before.

On the subject of water he said a 90-county survey found adequate water but not apportioned wisely. He urged conservation measures and longrange planning.
