**Reading and Lighting and 'Rithmetic**

Look what some figure happy statistician just found out. From kindergarten through high school, school kids have to plow through a pile of books 18 feet high. A photograph taken of this pile of books would make your eyes ache.

Close visual work is hard on the eyes. A New York State survey of 83,000 students showed only one in 20 kids had vision defects at kindergarten age. By senior high, eye troubles affected six students in 20.

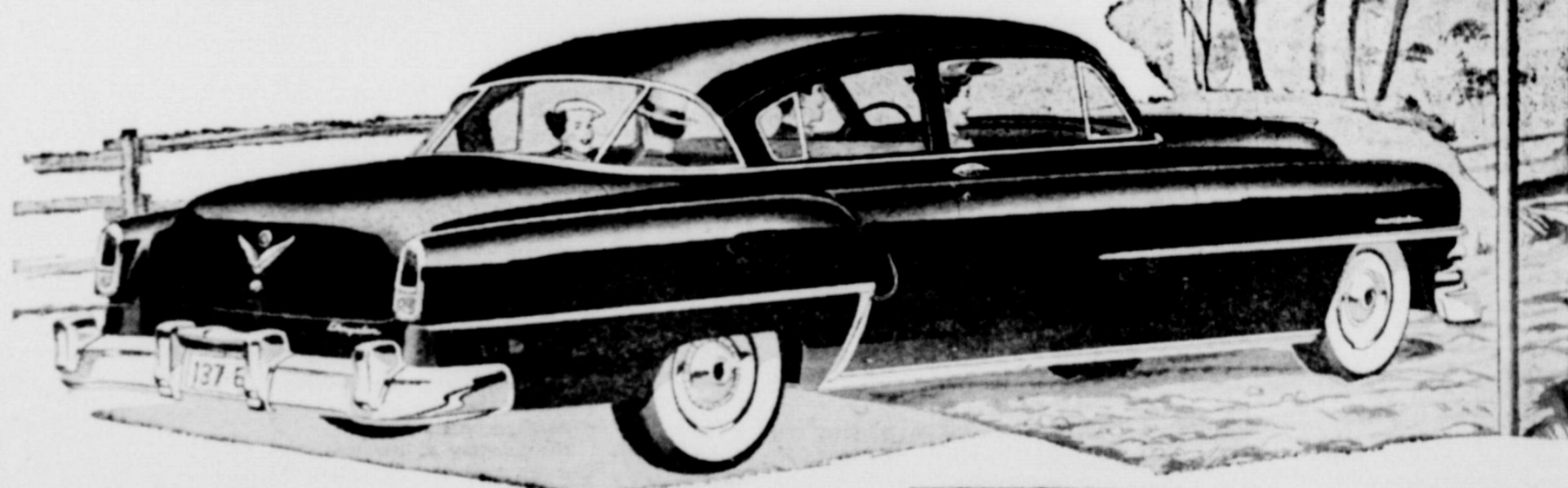

Humility is the most important way to approach painting, both for the painter himself and the layman, stated Mrs. Tupper. Have an open mind, not too critical. Forget the way so many people look at paintings, maybe to find a color that matches new drapes. Other important things to

remember when looking at a picture, the speaker asserted, are design, color, texture, light-dark. American painters are returning to humility today by studying the simple every-day things around them which go into a good painting.

Mrs. Tupper showed and discussed four pictures painted by Gonzales, the Spanish painter, that are classed as realism, impressionism, semi-abstract, and abstract. She also showed one of her commissioned portraits.

### Control of Household Insects

By Miss Ollie Chenoweth  
County Home Demonstration Agent

Now is a good time to control household insects before they go into hibernation for the winter. Such insects as ants, cockroaches, bedbugs, clothes moths and carpet beetles can be controlled by spraying thoroughly twice a year.

A spray containing 2 per cent chlorodane is effective in controlling roaches and ants. For clothes moths, carpet beetles and bedbugs use a 5 per cent DDT spray. Apply these sprays around the baseboards, any cracks and crevices where the insect might hide, and all areas where the insects are found. Be your own judge about the method of applying these insecticides, but remember that an effective campaign against

pests in the house this fall will reduce the danger from these pests next spring.

A number of insecticides are sold in the aerosol bomb form. These are very effective. When the mist is released from one of the bombs into a room, leave the room immediately and close the doors without breathing any more of the mist than is absolutely necessary.

Cockroaches are nocturnal in habit, and hide during the day in sheltered, darkened places, where they congregate in large numbers. During the night they come out of hiding and feed on various foodstuffs as well as starchy materials, such as book bindings. The offensive sickening odor left by roaches is due to an oil secreted by scent glands and body discharges. This odor is easily removed by washing the articles with hot, soapy water.

All five of the common house roaches have about the same life cycle. The eggs are laid in beanlike cakes which contain 25 to 30 eggs. These eggs may be glued to some object, but are generally dropped by the female during her ramblings. The baby roaches look very much like the adult except that they do not have wings. It takes from four to twelve months for roaches to reach maturity.

Ideal ant control is based on the destruction of the queens and the young in the nest itself.

If the nest can be found by following back along the line or trail of worker ants as they come to and go from food, it is not difficult to kill the colony, particularly if it is located, as it often is, out of doors or in the soil beneath a cracked cement basement floor. Sometimes ant colonies are killed out by a single treatment with 10 per cent DDT powder. Blow the powder into the entrance of the nest and around the immediate vicinity of the ant hill or the places where workers are active. Repeat applications when necessary.

Clothes moths require from about fifty days to three years to complete their life cycle. They feed upon animal substances such as wool, hair, fur, feathers and commodities manufactured from these materials. Spray the interior of closet walls, especially around the baseboards and edge of the floor with 5 per cent DDT. Materials may be dusted lightly with DDT.

Carpet beetles are difficult to control but are very destructive. Use liquid spray containing 5 per cent DDT for control of the carpet beetle. Spray rugs lightly and spray both top and bottom side of rug. Can use a 5 per cent dust if desired.

In control of bed bugs, the

bed, together with the springs and mattress should be thoroughly sprayed with solution containing 5 percent DDT. The cracks and crevices of the woodwork of the room should be treated also.
