Jaycees to Sponsor Aid for Needy Here

Ballinger Jaycees will sponsor the Christmas aid for needy families in Ballinger this year. A committee, composed of Carl Murman, Max McCrary, C. E. Dillion and Gay Edwards, was named to look after the work and is busy at this time securing names and addresses of families who will need assistance. The "Adopt a Family" plan, which has been taken here for a number of years will be used again this Christmas.

Individuals, Sunday school classes, civic clubs and other organizations will be asked to select a family or more if desired, and look after all their needs.

Jaycees hope to secure a complete and accurate list of all families in need. They are asking pastors, welfare workers and all others to report these families to one of the committee members.

As soon as the canvass is well underway, copies will be filed in the office of the Ballinger

Chamber of Commerce. Those who desire to look after families may go there and see these lists.

These lists will contain much information. They will give the address, the number of children in the families and the age of each and the main needs. Those who take a family will be asked to call and observe the need and then look after them for the holidays.

Due to the short harvest in the county, many have been without work and will require food, clothing, bedding, and toys for the children. The need here is much greater than for several years and teachers of Sunday school classes in all churches are urged to discuss the subject of helping look after the unfortunate this Christmas.

Any person who knows of a needy family, is asked to report it as soon as possible so that an investigation can be made and the correct listing given.

C. of C. Directors Hold Final Meeting of 1952

Directors of the Ballinger Chamber of Commerce held their last meeting for 1952 Monday evening. It also was the final meeting for eleven of the men who have served the past two years.

Jack Moore, president, named a committee composed of John Bradley, A. E. Holbrook, Wayman Mason, Al Dallinger and Mack Bowers to make recommendations to the new board at its first meeting in January on holidays to be observed next year.

K. V. Northington, chairman of the road and highway committee, reported on all work done by the committee during the past 12 months. He used a county map to indicate what has been accomplished and to point out other projects which will be pushed during the next year. Some of the main projects have already been designated by the state highway commission and approved by the county commissioners' court.

Ewell Jones reported on contacts made in recent months in efforts to locate new industries here. He expressed the belief that some of the recent contacts would result in locations here in the near future.

It was voted that the 1952 program and entertainment committee continue its work until after the annual banquet and membership meeting and it was suggested that an effort

be made to have the banquet in January.

A vote of appreciation was given the committee which directed the Christmas parade. The board also expressed thanks to the Ballinger schools for their cooperation and instructed the secretary-manager to write letters to the Winters school to compliment the Winters band for its part in the parade and the excellent conduct of the bandmen while in Ballinger.

The president will name four judges to inspect home and yard decorations. Judging will be done on December 19, 20 and 22 from dark until 10 p. m. and those who have decorations are asked to have lights on during the specified hours.

A recommendation was adopted from a special committee in regard to paying special prizes for the first bale of cotton each year. Included in the resolution were these provisions:

1. The bale must be produced in the Ballinger trade territory.
2. It must be ginned in Runnels county.
3. It must be placed at a designated location.

Any farmer who has won a prize for the first bale in any other community will not be eligible to repeat here.

It was suggested that pictures be made of the owner with the first bale so that full publicity can be given.

Campbell Has Champion Bull at '52 Abilene Show

A Hereford bull from the herd of Hugh Campbell and shown by Campbell and Heston McBride in the West Texas Hereford Association Show at Abilene was awarded the grand champion prize Monday.

Mr. Campbell and Mr. McBride, of Blanket, entered into an agreement in March for McBride to feed the animal and they would show him jointly. After winning the championship of the show, the bull was sold to the Arledge Bros. ranch for \$4,600.

Another young bull shown by Hugh and Rollin Campbell was sold for \$1,125 in the sale Monday afternoon.

The grand champion is H-R Royal Mixer Gwen the First. The 1952 show was large and many fine Herefords were on exhibit and some excellent pieces were posted in the auction.

O. C. Sykes, of Ballinger, purchased the grand champion and reserve champion females of the show, paying \$2,150 each. He also bought another female in the auction.

John Bass, of Pantex, was here for a visit with relatives and friends during the Thanksgiving holidays. He said he had about nine inches of snow at his place last week, the wind causing heavy drifts. The temperature dropped to 9 degrees above zero, the lowest recorded this year.

'52 Christmas Seal Sale Moving Slowly

The annual Christmas seal sale sponsored by the Runnels County Tuberculosis Association is moving slowly, a check-up Wednesday disclosing only about \$900 received from all sources.

Bond sales in the county have brought in about \$300 and association officials stated this work had not been completed.

Of the more than 3,000 letters mailed out, only 475 returns have been made. Money from this source totalled about \$600.

Some of those who received seals in letters have mailed them back without enclosing remittances. Leaders for the 1952 seal sale are anxious to complete the campaign as soon as possible and urge those who intend to contribute to mail in checks as soon as they can.

The seal sale is scheduled to be completed by Christmas day, but in some instances it may be necessary to continue beyond that date.

Local Officers Kept on Jump Past Week-End

Runnels county peace officers had a very busy week-end, making a number of important arrests and many investigations.

Alvin D. Choate was arrested at Coleman and charged with felony theft. The case involves the theft of 3,900 feet of two-inch tubing from the Placid Drilling Co., operating south of Crews. Officers had been working on this case since August.

William Ernest Fletcher was put under \$5,000 bond at Dallas in connection with the same theft and local officers stated he would face other charges.

Johnny Boyce was apprehended in California Monday and the Bill Manning car, stolen here last week, was recovered. Boyce came to Ballinger several weeks ago driving a 1950 Plymouth which had been stolen in California. He was involved in a wreck and later that day the Manning car was stolen in the business district here.

L. P. Emmerson was fined Tuesday in county court on a charge of driving while intoxicated. His fine totalled \$72.80.

69 Wells Returned To Full Production In Cree-Sykes Field

The state railroad commission Wednesday ordered the re-instatement of 69 wells in the Cree-Sykes (upper and lower Gardner) fields and the East Cree-Sykes (upper Gardner) field.

This order includes wells of the Saxon-Armstrong Oil Co. and Southern California Petroleum Co. The 69 wells back in production have a daily allowable of 4,416 barrels of oil.

Pipeline severances were ordered October 2 for leases owned by the two companies after dead wells were found which had been reported in production.

Well Completions Decrease in Week; Some Nearing Pay

Oil well completions in Runnels county were down slightly the past week but the normal number of rigs are being operated and a number are nearing pay depths.

The Cree-Sykes (upper Gardner) field has been extended one location east with the completion of Union Sulphur & Oil No. 23B-O. C. Sykes. The daily flowing potential is 216 barrels of 41.2 gravity oil. Perforations were between 3,942 and 3,949 feet in 5 1/2-inch casing.

The Canyon reef lime pay in the Poe field has been extended a quarter of a mile south with completion of Humble Oil & Refining Co. No. 1-W. J. Poe. The well was gauged at 132.89 barrels of 44.7 gravity oil. Top of pay is at 2,966 feet.

The Patsy field was extended one location south in the completion of Jack B. Roberts No. 1-William Ashton. The daily pumping potential was rated at 5.81 barrels of 43.7 gravity oil with 96.5 per cent water.

The Cree-Sykes (upper Gardner) field has an east-north extension in Union Sulphur & Oil No. 22B-O. C. Sykes. The daily flow was gauged at 84 barrels of 42 gravity oil. Pay was topped at 3,949 feet.

Moutray-Moore Drilling Co. No. 1-Mollie E. Curry has been staked east of production in the Hull-Dobbs field and will go to 4,500 feet.

Mailing Information Given by Postmaster

Postmaster K. V. Northington has issued information on the mailing of packages, Christmas cards, etc., that will be of interest to many at this time of the year. With the Ballinger office becoming first class on July 1, 1952, and some new regulations in force, the following is made public:

From Ballinger to any other first class post office, parcels addressed to points in the United States the size is the girth plus length and not to exceed 72 inches. Weight for first and second zones is limited to 40 pounds and from the third to eighth zones the limit is 20 pounds.

From Ballinger to second, third and fourth class post offices and packages addressed to points in the United States the size is the girth plus length and not to exceed 100 inches. Weight limit is 70 pounds.

Christmas cards unsealed with no written message may be mailed for 2 cents with signature permissible. It was stated that more people are using 3-cent postage and sealing their cards each year. This will permit return of cards if not delivered or the forwarding to a new address.

Some special delivery letters are being mailed with the old rate of 15 cents. The new rate is 20 cents plus postage.

Old Jail Building Started in 1888, Being Remodeled

An old landmark in Ballinger is coming down with the remodeling of the old jail into a modern suite of offices.

The first section of the jail was constructed in 1888, less than two years after Ballinger was founded. Since then two additions have been built, to increase the size and to modernize it. This jail served Runnels county for many years as well as taking care of a large number of Concho county prisoners.

Ozell Darby, contractor for razing the old and constructing the new building, said the old jail was one of the best constructed pieces of work he had observed in Ballinger. Large native stone blocks used in the walls are being removed from the upper floor with a large crane. The material will be retained to make improvements.

Modernizing the old jail will provide a building on the east corner of the court house lawn to correspond with other county buildings owned by the county. It will furnish office space that is urgently needed and when completed the interior as well as the exterior will be strictly modern. It will house the welfare offices, the Runnels county service officer, vocational agriculture school offices and provide space for storing county records. It will release at least two rooms in the court house which will be taken over by officials who now lack space.

For A. P. O. parcels the size is the girth plus length up to 100 inches. Weight limit is 70 pounds. A P. O. airmail parcels have a 2-pound limit.

Those mailing packages should have an itemized list of contents as some articles are not mailable, such as coffee and tobacco. Those needing information on this point should inquire at the post office.

Social Security Credits Cleared For Servicemen
George Clark, manager of the San Angelo field office of the federal security agency, states that thousands of men and women who served in the armed forces since the end of World War II are now insured under old age and survivors insurance.
All military and naval service since September, 1940, is now covered by the social security act. Before the passage of the amendment, no credit could be given for service after July 24, 1947.
Mr. Clark explained that the new rule means that each serviceman is credited, on his social security account, with \$160 for each month or part of a month that he was on active duty. The credits will not be posted on his account now or at any time in the future but credit will be established by presentation of the serviceman's discharge, which must be other than dishonorable. Women who served in the armed forces are also eligible for this benefit.

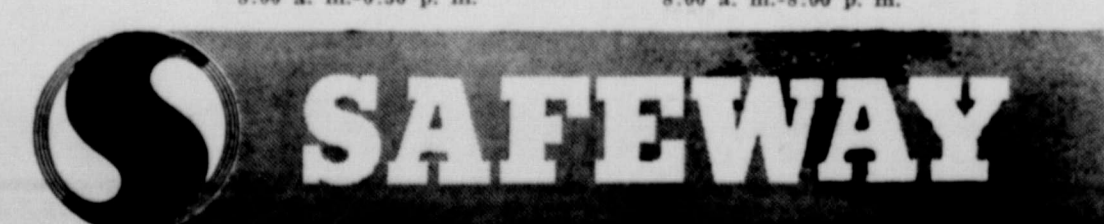
