## 1953 Livestock Show To be Held Tomorrow

The first animals to be received for the 1953 livestock show here arrived this afternoon and before night all sheep must be sifted and in pens. Other animals will be brought in tonight and early in the morning. The show will begin at 8:30 a. m. tomorrow.

Leaders in charge of the show stated Monday that everything was ready with the exception of a small amount of prize money to be secured. Department superintendents were on the job all day today, getting paper work arranged, setting up pens for judging, keeping the records and other details. As animals are received, pen markers showing whether exhibitors are 4-H or F. F. A. members, what kind of animals and other data will be issued.

## Humble Will Double Lead Line to Station

An Humble Co. pipeline crew is in Ballinger and within a short time will lay an additional eight-inch line from the Humble station southeast of Ballinger to the junction of lines from the Cree-Sykes and Fort Chadbourne oil fields.

The new eight-inch line will parallel another eight-inch line which has been conveying oil to the local pumping station. It has been operated at capacity recently, and with the Fort Chadbourne field soon to be reopened for production, two lines were needed. The capacity of the present line is about 32,000 barrels a day and much more will be called for when the Fort Chadbourne field is again in production.

## Cree-Sykes Recycling Plant Crew Starts Job

Henson Construction Co. has moved a crew into Ballinger and for some time will be preparing for and erecting the gasoline and recycling plant in the Cree-Sykes field. Workers began arriving the first of the week and others are due to come in later as the job progresses.

## DANCE AT RICHARDS BARN FOR MARCH OF DIMES FUND

A March of Dimes dance will be held again this year in the Tad Richards barn northeast of Bronck. Flares and markers will light the route from the Bronck highway.

The crew arriving here this week was looking after additional right-of-way and starting work at the station. A contract is expected to be let about January 28. Ditch digging equipment will be used to put the eight-inch pipe 18 inches under ground. Two to three weeks will be required to complete the work.

The local Humble station moved about 11,000,000 barrels of oil in 1952 and it is estimated that when all wells in the county are back in production the daily flow will be 50,000 to 60,000 barrels.

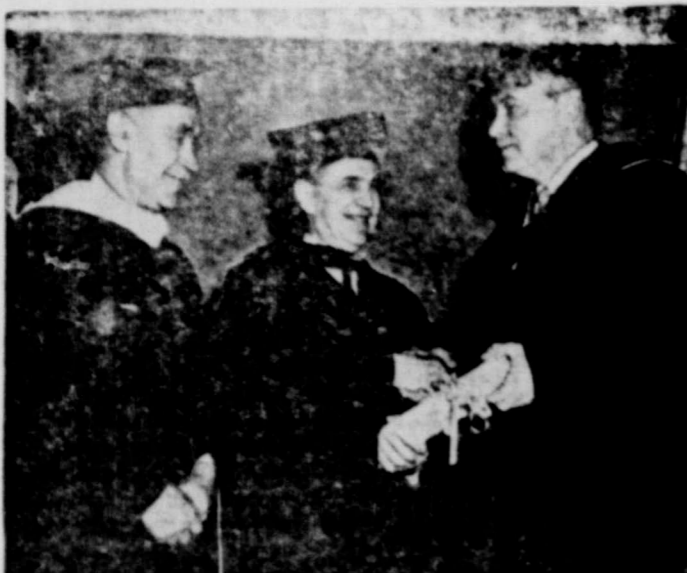

### Lions' Governor Visits Club Here

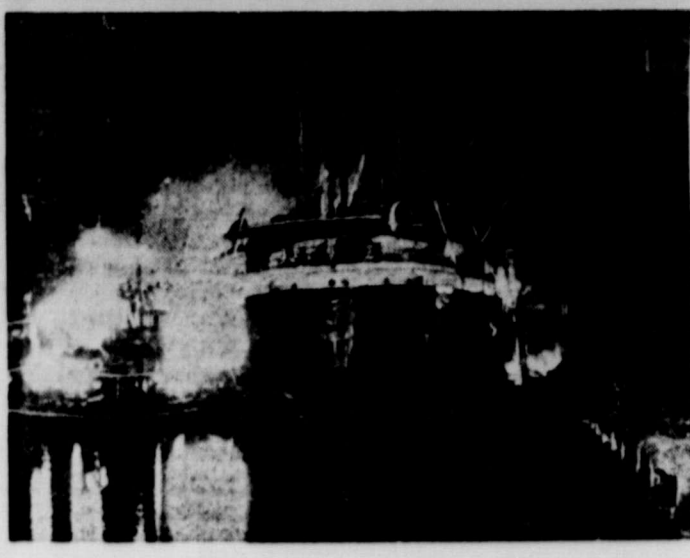
