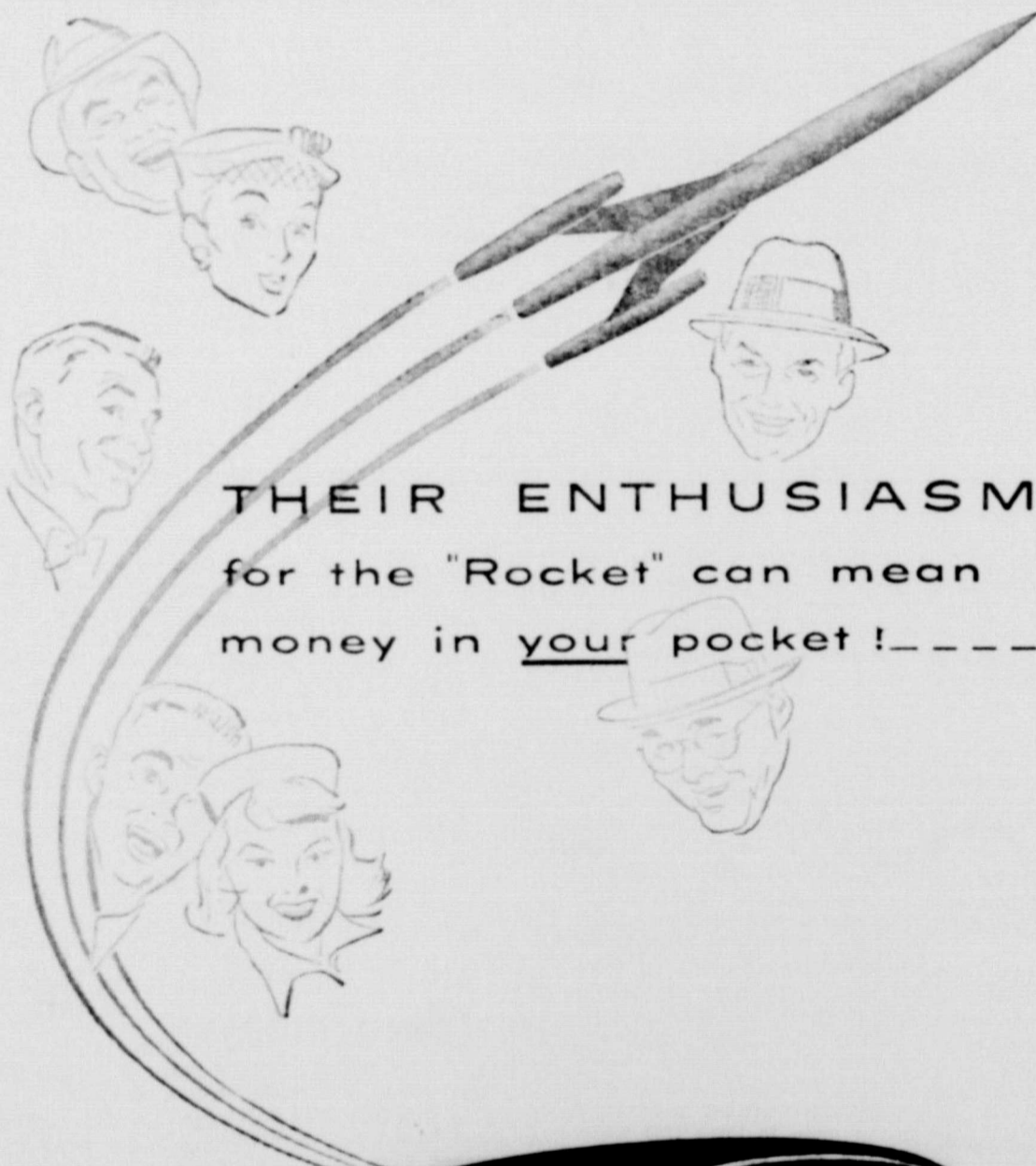

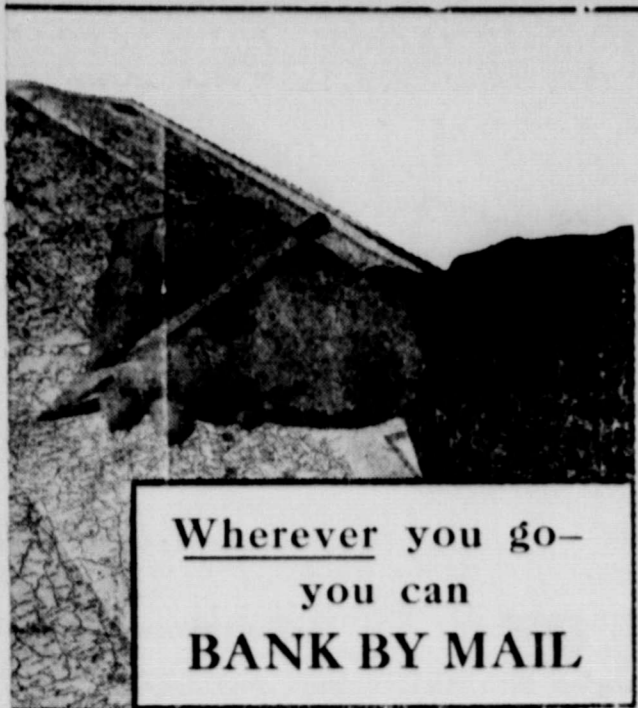


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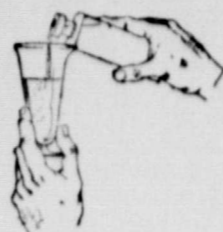

The law specifically requires County Clerks to approve Notary bonds and individuals should not send money or requests for commissions direct to the Secretary of State.

All Notary matters can only be received by the Secretary of State after the County Clerk acts thereon.

Any person who has not heretofore been a Notary Public should apply to his County Clerk between May 1, 1953 and May 23, 1953 if he desires to have this application given prompt attention in the State Department, as the rush of reappointing all old Notaries may slow up the ordinary process of making new appointments and issuing commissions.

Secretary of State Carney said, "Each person applying for a commission as a Notary Public must be at least 21 years of age and a resident of the county to which he is appointed; exact names and permanent addresses should be given to the County Clerk in applying for a commission, as location of the Notary may be necessary long after he has notarized a particular instrument."

Mrs. W. B. Claunch, president, was in charge of the business and Mrs. J. W. Barr, program chairman, presented the guest speaker.

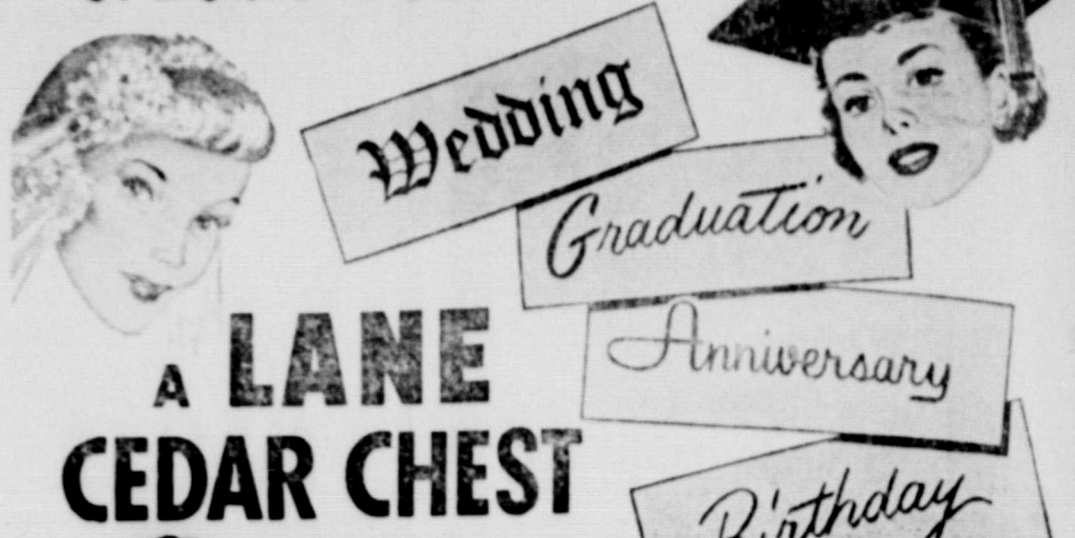

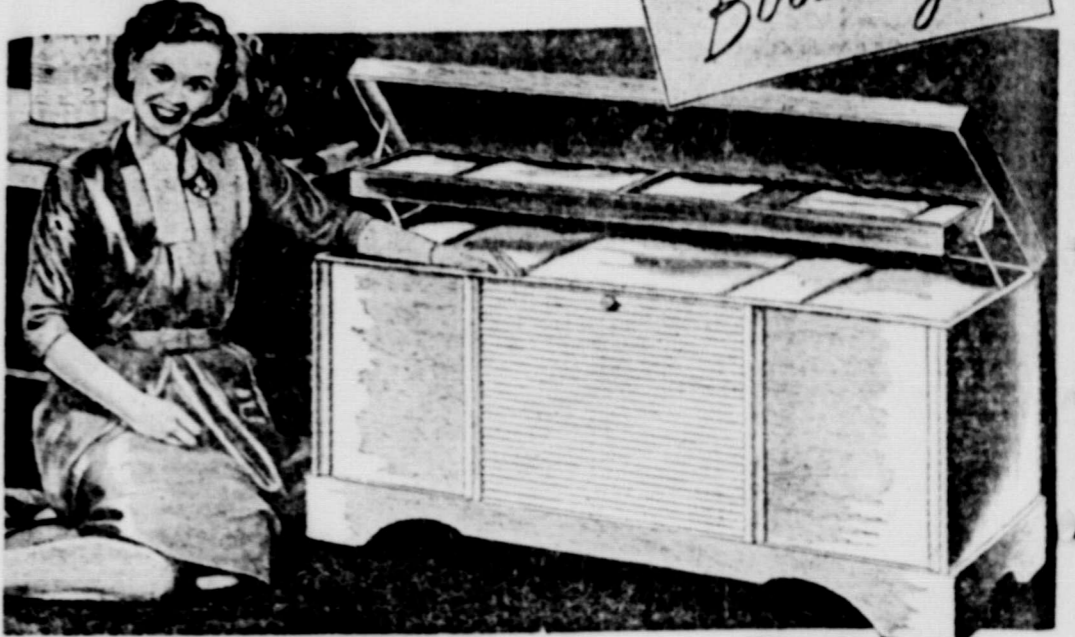

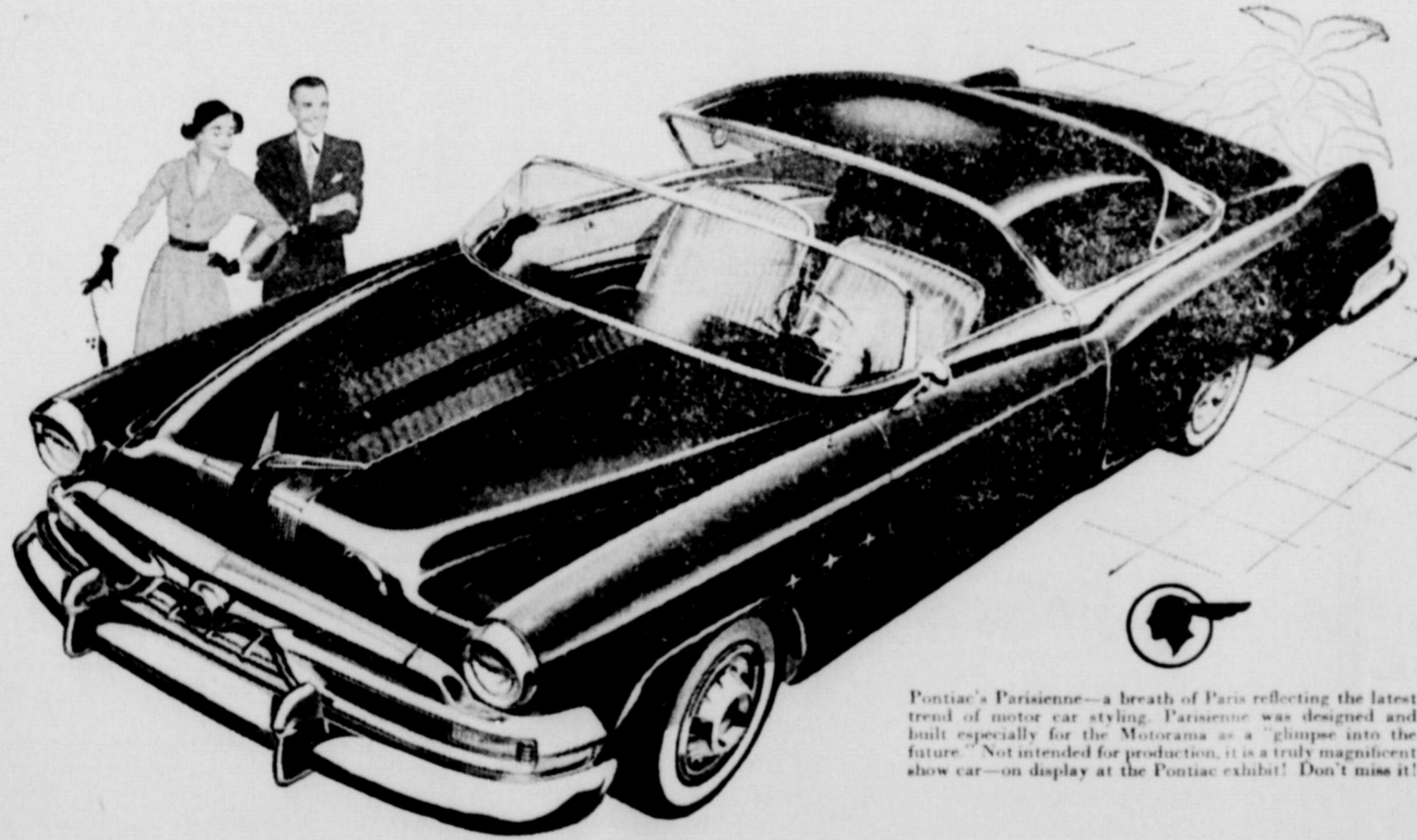

The entire hospital staff and board of trustees guided visitors through the building and pointed out the improvements. New electric wiring, new X-ray equipment, redecoration of rooms and the adding of private baths to some, are a part of the work completed. This hospital was established in 1923 by Martha Overall in memory of her husband.

Brady's business and public buildings averaged less than two

potential fire hazards each, according to the report of the city-wide inspection last week. Members of the Alamo and West Texas division of the Texas Insurance Fieldman's Association found 484 potential causes in inspecting 286 buildings. The most common hazard found was electric wiring which accounted for 181 of the total. Rubbish accumulations, improper storage and other evidences of poor housekeeping were listed. The risks found was far below the average, according to the inspectors.

Members of the Brown county commissioners' court authorized the use of five trucks for one week to assist in the general clean-up. Dr. Paul Wheelis, campaign chairman, stated many were cooperating and as a result many public hazards would be removed.

Oil development in the Santa Anna fields continued last week with one 408-barrel producer being brought in 3 miles west of town. A total of six producers were reported and eleven new trys were started or had received permits for drilling. The newest producer was 1,959 feet deep and the oil was rated at 45 gravity. Other producers in the area gauged from 70 to 112 barrels per day.

A campaign was launched at Comanche this week to raise funds for the construction of a new swimming pool. Committees will attempt to raise \$10,000 for building a pool 60 by 93 feet and every effort will be made to have it finished by mid-summer. The location will be at Lake Eanes and a committee will determine whether the old pool sites will be used or a new one selected. Herb Goodson, president of the chamber of commerce, is urging all citizens of the community to help in the project.

Construction of the 21-mile water pipeline from Stamford to Hamlin has been started and huge machines and men are

laying about 4,000 feet a day. The Ennis Construction Co., of Amarillo, has the contract on a bid of \$500,000. The work was started at Stamford and will proceed to Hamlin Concrete reinforced steel tubing for the line is arriving daily from Dallas and constructors announced that three-fourths of the pipe was on the ground. The entire line will be 12-inch pipe.

Menard citizens are planning a drive to raise funds to purchase a building for a Girl Scout home. The decision to conduct the campaign came after a meeting of leaders last week. The date and amount to be raised will be determined at a meeting to be held tomorrow (Friday) night. For 23 years Menard has had one or more troops of Girl Scouts. So far they have never had a permanent meeting place. At the present there are five organized troops with a membership of 75.

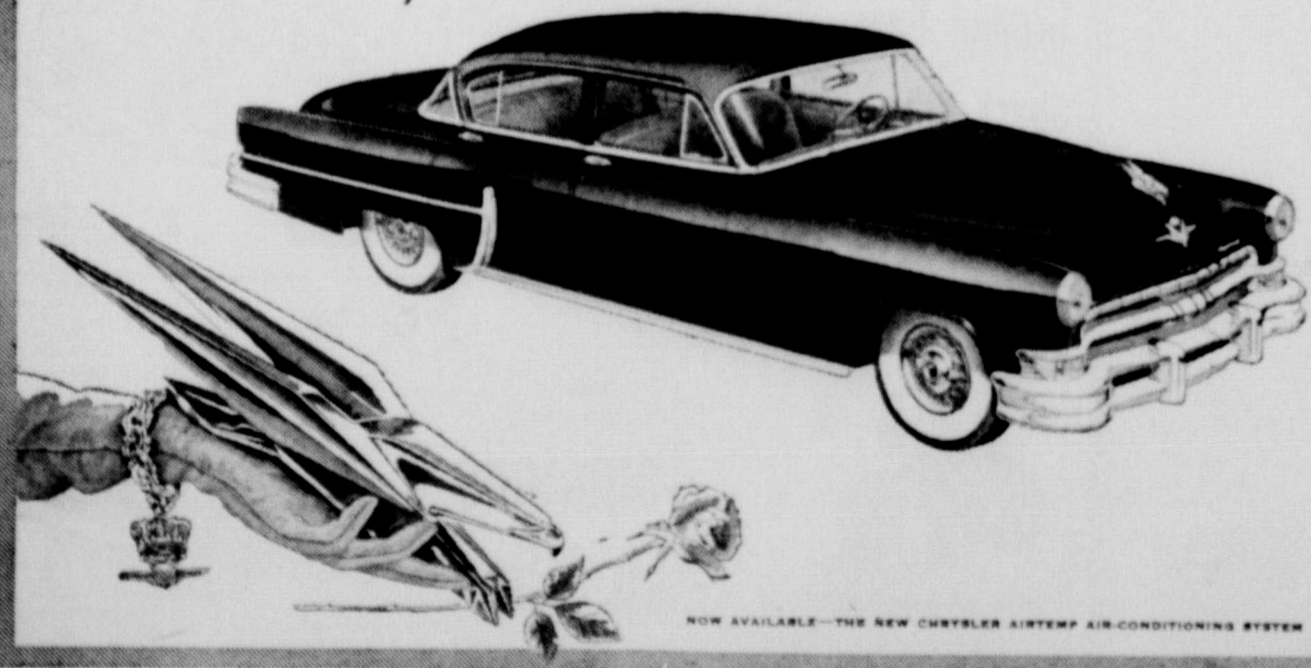

The wading pool will be open at all times and is free.

Concessions handled at the bathhouse will include cold drinks, hot dogs, popcorn, snow cones, candies, gum, ice cream. Drinking fountains will be located at convenient places.
