Swimming Pool Opening Tomorrow

Pumps Being Operated At Valley Creek Lake

Work on the city's water expansion program had advanced this week, allowing the pumps at the Valley Creek lake to be started again Wednesday night to fill the filtration basin and go into storage. Contractors stated that they did not expect any further interruptions in service from the Valley Creek lake.

Work on the project will be continued several weeks before it is finally completed. The old plant is being operated and water was turned into the municipal swimming pool from the Elm Creek reservoir today. Hourly tests will be made of this water after it is in the pool to see that it is properly treated for swimming.

Memorial Services Set For Sunday Afternoon

The American Legion post with the cooperation of the Ballinger National Guard company will sponsor memorial services Sunday afternoon at 5:00 o'clock at Evergreen Cemetery. These rites will honor the soldiers dead of all wars and all people of the community are invited.

Rev. R. H. Cagle, pastor of the First Baptist Church, will deliver the address. Members of company I, National Guard, will direct the firing squad, the colors and color guard and the raising and lowering of the flag. A company bugler will sound taps at the conclusion of the program.

Memorial services are held each year by the Legionnaires on the Sunday nearest Memorial Day. In the past, attendance has been far short of what it should be, according to post officials and they plead for a show of patriotism and interest in our country by all giving a short time to attend.

Members of the local post are asked to meet at 4:45 wearing caps and be present in a body for these rites.

Three New Producers Reported for County

The Hull-Dobbs oil field was extended one location to the north with completion of S. C. Herring No. 1-W. D. Buford. The initial gauge indicated a daily flowing potential of 447.24 barrels of 40 gravity oil. This potential was based on an actual 12-hour flow. Top of pay was found at 3,920 feet. Operators have asked for a discovery allowable and a field designation as the East Hull-Dobbs.

The Pace (Fry sand) field has been extended one location south and west with finaling of G. W. Strake No. 6-Charity C. Pace for a daily flow of 359.77 barrels of 43 gravity oil with no water. Top of pay is 4,443 feet and casing has been cemented to 4,475 feet.

Texas Pacific Coal & Oil Co. No. AA-W. L. Lafoon, in the Hull-Dobbs field, has been completed for a daily flowing potential of 105.57 barrels of 40 gravity oil. Top of pay is 3,994 feet.

French M. Robertson and Drilling & Exploration Co., Inc., of Abilene, have filed applications for two 4,000-foot wells, Nos. 7- and 8- J. W. Bright, in the Aldridge field.

Big Attendance Assured For Enforcement School

Plans are being perfected for all phases of the law enforcement school to be held here on June 2 and 3. Rannels county officers are arranging the program and sending out invitations and are expecting a large number to represent the 12 to 15 West Texas counties.

On the night of June 3 the Ballinger Chamber of Commerce will serve a barbecue followed by an entertainment program at the American Legion hall in Bruce Field. The local chamber will also assist in various other ways with the arrangements.

Morning and afternoon programs have been prepared for the two days, outstanding speakers being assigned subjects dealing with enforcement problems. The school will be of interest to all county officials and to all those who enforce laws in towns and precincts. To be covered are the legal phases of many issues and a question and answer period will follow each talk.

Sheriff Don Atkins stated Monday that all persons on the program except one had accepted assignments and that a replacement was being secured. He stated that letters of acceptance to attend had been received from most of the counties and that large attendance was assured for both days.

Husbands Gives Program Of West Texas Chamber

Fred Husbands, manager of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, spoke to the Ballinger Lions Club Friday, bringing a picture of the most outstanding projects of the regional organization.

The speaker talked on the chamber's efforts in soil conservation and how it had worked with the associations of the region. He pointed out that the W.T.C.C. had developed ways whereby the business and professional men of the towns could assist in the great work now underway in practically every county in this part of the state. The chamber serves 132 counties and in practically all of them some kind of soil conservation is being practiced.

A highly successful project has been conducted in many towns in the form of meetings to determine what is most needed. As a result many new members have been signed by local chambers of commerce to help carry out the suggestions.

Husbands devoted considerable time to water needs in Texas and stated that the big cities were being hit harder than the small ones. Figures were given on the run-off of streams in the state which revealed that water was controlled in reservoirs it would far exceed the needs of the entire state. The speaker declared that water permits in Texas were in a deplorable condition at this time and needed correcting.

The last phase of his talk was in developing tourist business for West Texas. He declared the tourist dollar was the easiest to get and showed a recent picture magazine which has been published by the W.T.C.C. to be distributed over the country.

Negroes Featured In Criminal News Of Past Week-End

James H. Greer, Coleman negro, was arrested Sunday evening by the state highway patrol and charged of driving while intoxicated were filed Monday morning. The arrest occurred when Greer, driving a 1937 Packard, side-swiped a 1952 Dodge, driven by Chester Hilburn, of Abilene. The negro kept going after hitting the other car but was overtaken at Ballinger and returned to the scene of the crash. The accident occurred 13 miles west of Ballinger on the San Angelo highway. Patrolman Joe Perry estimated the damage at about \$200 and no personal injury.

Grand Jury Finds Twelve True Bills Before Adjourning

The Rannels county grand jury was in session Monday morning, finishing its work at noon. The twelve men were recalled because of a number of cases which required investigation. Most of these resulted from a shooting and theft cases among the local negro population several weeks ago.

The following indictments were reported by District Attorney E. C. Grindstaff after the jury had completed its work: Willie Mae Wiseman, theft; Paul Dabney, theft; Willie Owens, theft; Willie Owens, assault with intent to murder, two counts; Willie Mae Wiseman and Ruby Jewell Harvey, forgery and passing; Willie Mae Wiseman, forgery and passing; Arthur Wesley, theft; Essie Johnson, theft; Ruby Jewell Harvey, receiving and concealing stolen property; Janie Jackson, receiving and concealing stolen property; Thaggar Green, Jr., driving while intoxicated, second offense.

Travis Graves was sent to the state penitentiary last Wednesday after his conviction had been upheld by a higher court. He was convicted here as a habitual "hot checker."

Paul Dabney, local negro, was returned here Saturday by Deputy W. T. Moreland from Oakland, California. Dabney is charged in the theft of money from John Goodman, another local negro.

Dabney was taken Sunday to a location on the Colorado River where he had hidden a box containing war bonds. Recent rises on the river had washed the box and its contents from the hiding place and they will be reported as lost.

Dabney also made a statement Sunday to local officers which resulted in the arrest of R. L. Wesley and Essie Johnson, Jr., each charged with concealment of stolen money. The amounts were not large enough to warrant felony charges and misdemeanors were filed against them Monday.

Johnny Dabney, another local negro, was arrested last week and charged with the theft of a pistol at Martin's Inn. He was held here for Concho county officers and a fine of \$55 and costs have been assessed.

Poppies Sold Here By Auxiliary to Aid Number of Causes

The American Legion Auxiliary sold more than \$200 worth of poppies here Saturday but had a few of the 1,500 blooms left at the end of the day.

The local unit is cooperating with the state department in a two-year plan of assistance to the M. D. Anderson Hospital for Cancer at Houston. This year \$240 per member will be paid to this cause. The Auxiliary sent a total of \$68.40 this year on its 1953 membership and will now send \$62.40 more to take care of the payment on the 1952 membership.

The Auxiliary paid \$52.50 for the poppies it sold last week and will send one-third of the total receipts to the state department to be used in child welfare and rehabilitation on a state and national level. The remainder of the money will be retained by the Ballinger unit and used for such causes as polo, Girl Scouts, heart fund research, Red Cross and other contributions.

The Anderson hospital has a total of 319 beds and Rannels county has referred more than 20 patients there already. The Texas Auxiliary is equipping a complete nursing unit of 34 beds as a cost of \$50,000.

This amount is more than the total fence space and box seats here would bring if all were sold. Mr. Mansell informed Mr. Webb that this amount of money could not be raised here including signs, box seats and opening night.

Webb was due to discuss the matter with Hal Sayles, league president, and local fans are awaiting the next move by Longhorn League officials or Mr. Webb.

The donations received by the association at this time will be used for educational and research work. The association is devoting time and effort for more research, prevention, improved hospital conditions, better treatment methods, more clinics and more trained personnel.

Chamber Offices To be Moved Soon To Sheppard Bldg.

The Ballinger Chamber of Commerce offices will be moved the latter part of June to the E. Sheppard building on Hutchings Avenue, formerly occupied by Smith's Cleaners.

The commission asked that appreciation be expressed to the public for the fine cooperation shown during work on the water system. It was stated that the condition of water and the fact that it was cut off at times in certain sections was something beyond the commission's control. During the entire time, it was declared citizens had shown an understanding which was deeply appreciated. The commission hopes to have regular service established in the very near future.

At 8:00 p. m. Ballinger firms are sponsoring about 75 junior girls in a bathing revue. This will be held at the pool and three elevated stands have been built so that everyone near the pool can see. The children will compete in two classes for small prizes and others on the honorable mention list will be given swim tickets for one week.

Following the revue a television set will be given away, a square dance team will give a special exhibition on the new recreation slab and diving and swimming features will be seen at the pool.

City, county and state highway patrol officers will have charge of traffic at the park tomorrow.

Directors of the chamber had been trying for some time to secure a ground floor location. For several months the traffic in and out of the offices has been heavy because of the listing of apartments and houses by the chamber secretary.



Secretary of State Howard Carney has announced that he will reappoint all persons who now hold Notary Public Commissions and that all such persons must qualify by filing an oath and bond with the County Clerk of their residence between June 1, 1953 and June 10, 1953. The law specifically requires

County Clerks to approve Notary bonds and individuals should not send money or requests for commissions direct to the Secretary of State.

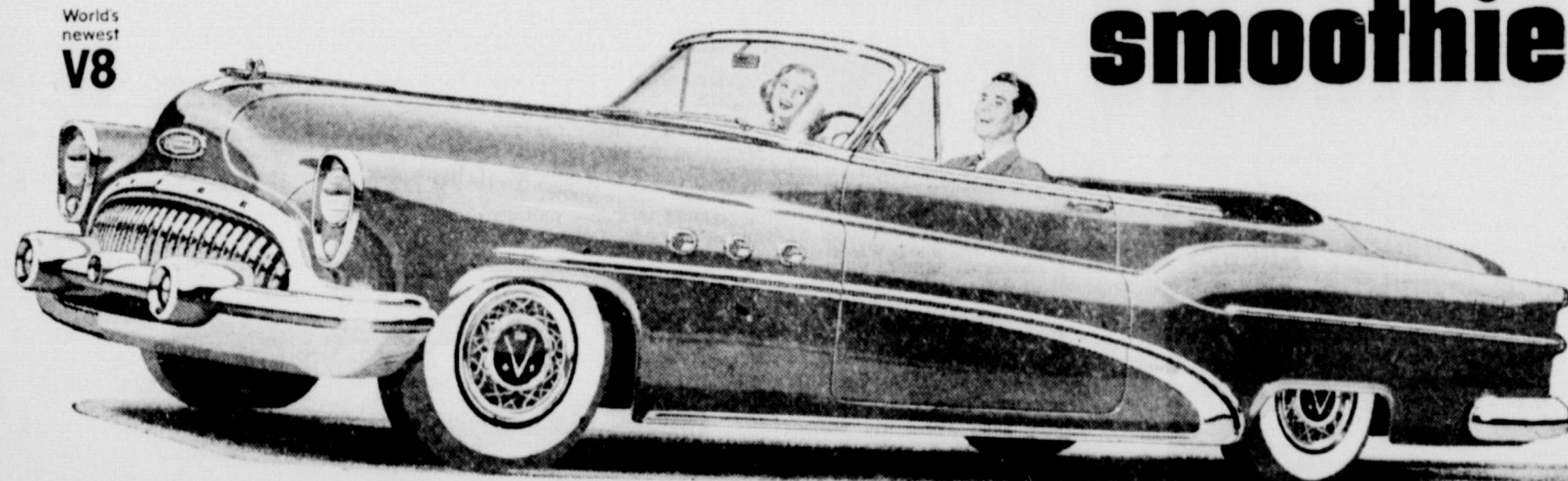
All Notary matters can only be received by the Secretary of State after the County Clerk acts thereon.
