### **Huddleston Gives Report on Houston** Polio Conference

O. L. Huddleton, secretarytreasurer of the Runnels county chapter of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis was in Houston last week to attend a meeting of voulnteer county chapter workers. The county workers were informed that despite encouraging progress in polio research, all communities must be on the alert and fully prepared to cope with polio outbreaks this summer.

Runnels county was one of only a few represented at the meeting that had no new cases reported in 1953. The county chapter is giving assistance to 12 carry-over cases from other

Speakers emphasized that no polio vaccine is ready for appliation this summer and that gamma globulin, the blood derivative found effective as a temporary preventive of paralytic poilo, is in critical short supply. "Polio will present much the same problem this summer as in recent years," Mr. Huddleton said.

He pointed out that reports howed the disease this year is about 25 per cent more prevaent than in 1952, which was the worst year recorded, with 57,628 cases across the country. Diagnosis, hospitalization and reatments were discussed and eports on new phases of treatnent were explained.

Leaders declared that no one an foretell the number of new cases this year but asserted that the national foundation will not fail any child or adult who needs help.
