Shakespeare Club Presents "Miss Wool"

The Ballinger Shakespeare Club presented one of the special club features of the year at the Central Hotel last Thursday afternoon. The program featured the presentation of "Miss Wool" of 1953.

Miss Kathryn E. Gromatzky, 20-year-old North Texas State College co-ed was named "Miss Wool" in a pageant at San Angelo in September. As the winner of the second annual "Miss Wool" contest, Miss Gromatzky received a \$5,000 all-wool wardrobe of 33 pieces and all expenses paid trips to the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers' Association annual convention at San Antonio November 2-5, the national convention at Long Beach, California, in December and radio and TV appearances at Houston and Fort Worth. She will also participate in various wool industry growers', manufacturers' and designers' activities.

Mrs. Edgar Boelsche, program chairman, in introductory remarks, stated that wool is superior in standard of quality, service and beauty for clothing, and that the program was not a style show but to show that wool remains a very important industry in West Texas. Mrs. Boelsche presented Mrs. Walter Pfleger, of Eden, president of the T. S. & G. R. A. auxiliary.

Mrs. Pfleger was commended for her garments worn by "Miss Wool" which she wore a straight cut collarless coat in russet beige; an opulent tissue-lined town suit, all wool, in mellow tones of mauve; a cocktail dress of wool chiffon broadcloth in ice blue; and the coronation dress which was created by Gainsborough Fashion in New York. It was of pink wool lace, featuring a strapless bodice with a full skirt. The entire dress was beaded and sprinkled with tiny rhinestones.

Mrs. Pfleger noted especially the beauty and wrinkle-free wearability of each costume as she described the garments.

At the conclusion of the program, which was presented on a runway outlined with covers from leading fashion magazines featuring wool ensembles, and baskets of red roses, Mrs. Boelsche presented Miss Gromatzky with an arm bouquet of gold and bronze chrysanthemums tied with gold ribbon streamers.

# Bearcats Sink San Saba Boys by Score of 61-0

The Ballinger Bearcats bounced back at San Saba Friday night after two defeats showing power, speed and everything it takes to make a good football team. The San Saba Armadillos, undefeated in five games, went down by a crushing 61 to 0 score. The Bearcats used every man on the bench and all the boys played well.

The Bearcats went to work in the first quarter to break into the scoring department. After a downfield drive Richard Tolliver hit through the line 16 yards and then carried over from the 1-yard line. Bell ran the ball over for the extra point.

The Bearcats came right back with Egan turning in a 21-yard gallop to the San Saba 4 and on the next play he carried over. Ferguson missed the kick for the extra point.

Early in the second quarter, Weldon Brevard circled end for 39 yards and Bell on an option play kept the ball to carry into the end zone for the score. Gary Ferguson kicked the point.

Late in the half, Bell passed to Jerry Baker for 39 yards and on the next play shot another to him for 10 yards. Baker gathering it in for the score. James Marek kicked the point.

The Bearcats opened up in the third quarter to score three touchdowns. Mike Egan drove deep into Armadillo territory with a 14-yard jaunt through the line and Bell shot a jump pass to Billy Maedgen for 14 yards and a score. Marek kicked.

Ballinger took 55 yards in penalties. San Saba 15. Ballinger recovered one San Saba fumble and the Bearcats only fumbled once and recovered. Bell kicked twice for an average of 39 yards. San Saba punted 6 times for an average of 23 yards.

City and school offices have also had good collections as many people pay their state, county, school and city taxes at the same time. All three offices have receipts ready to issue and have mailed notices to all property owners showing the amount of taxes due.

The commission received a financial statement on the operation of the municipal swimming pool for the past summer. According to the statement, the receipts totaled \$9,552 and expenses of operation were \$7,294, showing a profit of \$2,258.

Receipts from the concessions were \$3,574, with expenses of \$1,137, showing a profit of \$437. The pool was opened on May 29 of this year and closed the first part of September.

### Instructions Given On Overseas Mail

The date for mailing Christmas parcels to addresses overseas is here and the post office personnel wants to give the best service possible. October 15 through November 15 is the period specified for this mailing. All packages to Korea and Japan must be in the local office by November 1.

Good wrapping and tying and careful addressing will help greatly in getting packages to their destinations in proper condition.

Air parcels should be mailed before November 25 and the size of each package is limited to 2 pounds in weight and 30 inches in size, the length and girth combined.

The post office department stresses good packing in all cases. A strong metal, wood or double-faced corrugated box is desirable. Each box should be securely tied with strong cord, four pieces preferred. Fiber boxes should be wrapped in heavy paper. There is a fifty-pound limit on service parcels. Some will require customs declaration. Foodstuffs and parcels containing materials subject to spoilage and breakage are liable to reach their destinations in an unfit condition unless every precaution is taken in packing the box. It is suggested that most overseas personnel is well supplied with food.

Any further information relative to A. P. O. addresses may be had at the local post office.

### 7,073 BALES GINNED PICKERS ARE NEEDED

Gins of Runnels county had turned out 7,073 bales of cotton to Tuesday of this week. Gin operators reported that cotton was moving slowly in practically every section due to the lack of pickers and pullers. It was the opinion of farmers and ginners that slightly less than one-fourth of the cotton had been gathered and that 1,000 or more pickers could be employed here at once. In some sections strippers are being operated.

Numerous fields in the county have not had a picker in them since the season started and the crop is about 90 per cent open.

The sweeper is modern in every detail and is a vacuum-type machine which uses moisture to pick up everything. One broom operates next to the curb and moves the dirt to the center of the machine. Another large roller-type broom on the rear takes care of about a five-foot strip.
