No one in all the world understands all that a telephone operator has to go through with except a telephone operator.

The job at the switchboard is usually a faintless job, yet when one considers the mental alertness, the ability to be kind to unkind people, and the knowledge required to be a good telephone operator, one would think that they would receive more praise than they do.

There are many people who appear in public very kind, gentle, and soft spoken people, but when they get on the telephone they are entirely different. They are unkind, harsh, and inconsiderate.

Telephone operators are in truth almost miracle workers, but some people expect them to do more than any human being could possibly do, and there are people who are so selfish that they think that are the only one who is using the telephone that day. If they are making a long distance call, they seem to expect the entire telephone company to stand still until they have finished.

No one can accurately estimate the amount of abuse a telephone operator takes in one day. She is called everything in the book except an intelligent and patient person who is trying to do a good job.

The general public feels like the telephone operator does nothing but listen in on the conversations of others. This is especially true of the thinking of people in small communities.

Now, I would be the last person to deny that some telephone operators would misuse their job in this way, but it is certainly not true of the majority.


